The Saving - New Wine/New Wine Skins - Mark 2:21-22

Fundamental to Jesus' ministry, was to teach the people about the Kingdom of God. From the very beginning of his ministry, He is setting a new course for those who would choose to follow him, and for good reason. He begins with a number of healings: a man with an unclean spirit (Mk 1:21-26), as well as many at Simon's house (Mk 1:29-34), the cleansing of a Leper (Mk 1:40-42), and the healing of a paralytic (Mk 2:1-12), all done in an un-orthodox manner, because he has no title, position, or recognized authority. He will further challenge the crowd by welcoming Levi, the tax collector, to be his disciple (Mk 2:13-17) and refuses to observe the matter of fasting (Mk 2:18-20). In a very short time, He has caused a stir among the crowd, and garnered the attention of the religious elite. There is an intentionality in what Jesus is doing and He will sum it up in these words, 'No one puts new wine into old wineskins; otherwise, the wine will burst the skins, and the wine is lost, and so are the skins; but one puts new wine into fresh wineskins' (Mk 2:21-22). What may have Jesus been trying to teach them, and us?

Those listening to him were aware that to make new wine required new wineskins. The reason for this, is that there is a build up of gas produced during the fermentation of the grapes into wine. What is required is that the wineskin be both flexible and moist, so as to withstand the multiple expansions and contractions, that take place during this process. A new wineskin conforms to and allows itself to be transformed by this process. What started out as grape juice, water, sugar, and yeast, will become wine, but only if the wineskin can expand. However, as one consumes the wine, the wineskin itself will shrink and dry out becoming rigid and inflexible. It would never occur to one to re-use an old wine skin to make new wine since the skin would burst, and the wine wasted. They understood the analogy, but this does not mean they liked what he was saying.

Jesus is providing a new teaching, like new wine, unlike anything they have seen or heard before. In order for them to appreciate and accept what he is saying and doing, they will have to discard their old wine skins: their well established and accepted understanding and interpretation of their scriptures and traditions. He is both instructing and inviting them to become like new wineskins. They will only be able to understand and grasp the deeper meaning of his teachings, if they are prepared and willing to be stretched a great deal, and so conform to the transformation that will take place within. If, however, the person refuses to become open (flexible) to this new teaching, but remains staunch in their beliefs, then any attempt to make sense of what Jesus was saying and doing would simply tear them apart - His teaching is lost on them because it does not suit them. They will see this new wine (teaching) that is causing them discomfort, as the problem, and not themselves. For them, their teachings and traditions have served them well all this time, so why should they change? In fact, any change that poses a contradiction to their traditions, would be seen as an affront to their beliefs. In their minds, they are quite content with their beliefs and are not interested in anything new. Since they will not change, they have no need of the new wine. What they fail to realize is that this leaves them dry and rigid, now, and for future generations. But at least they are comfortable.

Jesus is aware of the dilemma that faces the people, and himself. He came to teach us, in a new way, about who God is, and how we can relate to our God. Knowing that many would reject what he had to offer, this does not stop him, because God desires to know us, and to be known by us. For those who will accept this new wine, it is not a one-time event, but will occur, over and over again throughout our life. Once we have drunk in his teaching, we are presented with a new wine once again. If we accept it, then we let go of our old wine skins (mind sets), allowing our awareness of who God is and what He calls us to do and become, is further stretched .

Humor is observed in all cultures and all ages. But only in recent decades has experimental psychology respected it as an essential, fundamental human behavior.

Historically, psychologists framed humour negatively, suggesting it demonstrated superiority, vulgarity, Freudian id conflict, or a defense mechanism to hide one's true feelings. In this view, an individual used humor to demean or disparage others, or to inflate one's own selfworth. As such, it was treated as an undesirable behavior to be avoided. And psychologists tended to ignore it as worthy of study.

But research on humor has recently come to light, with humor now viewed as a character strength. Positive psychology, a field that examines what people do well, notes that humor can be used to make others feel good, to gain intimacy, or to help buffer stress. Along with gratitude, hope, and spirituality, a sense of humor belongs to the set of strengths positive psychologists call transcendence; together they help us forge connections to the world and provide meaning to life. Appreciation of humor correlates with other strengths, too, such as wisdom, and love of learning. And humor activities or exercises result in increased feelings of emotional well-being and optimism.
