Mark's Account of the Wilderness Experience / Mark 1.12 - 15

Mark is pithy in his account of Jesus' desert experience. It is almost reminiscent of a grocery list: He was in the wilderness forty days, tempted by Satan; and he was with the wild beasts; and the Angels waited on him (Mark 1.13). It is all 'matter of fact', it happened, now let us get on with what really matters, which is what happens after he leaves the wilderness (Mark 1.14-15). When we turn to the wilderness accounts found in Matthew (4.1-11) and Luke (4.1-12), it is here where we are given a few details as to what were the temptations facing Jesus, and will see that these temptations remain with him throughout his life, up to his crucifixion. But if I may suggest, that there is one small detail that we may unfortunately skip over in this brief gospel passage. It is Mark 1.12, 'the Spirit drove him out into the wilderness'.

In both Matthew and Luke we read, "Jesus was led by the Spirit into the wilderness" (Mt. 4.1a) (Luke 4.1b). The imagery here is quite pastoral, gentle and unhurried. Mark on the other hand says that Jesus was 'driven by the Spirit into the wilderness'. This action of being driven by the Spirit is neither pastoral nor gentle. It is as the word suggests, to be full of having a compulsive or urgent quality to have something happen. This driving force is within God's Spirit. We are given the impression that God's Spirit has within it the determination to succeed with which it has set its mind upon bringing about. We see God's Spirit as a force highly energetic, powerful and motivated with one singular purpose and that is to push, propel Jesus into the wilderness. The Spirit wants Jesus to be in the wilderness, but there is no indication that this is where he wants to be.

When we consider what is meant by the 'wilderness' we may conjure up images of an uncultivated, uninhabited, and more importantly an 'inhospitable region'. It is not a place where one could easily live, but more likely, where one would certainly perish, unless of course you tame it, or domesticate it according to one's own design. People live in Arizona because they have brought the creature comforts with them into the wilderness. But then it is no longer the wilderness, is it? This however is not what happened with Jesus. He was driven into the wilderness and was confronted by the wilderness and everything in it. The question then is why would God's Spirit do this? Perhaps Jesus' entering the wilderness was not something random or inconsequential, but deemed to be urgent and purposeful. If Jesus had not entered the wilderness, who he would become, what he would say and do, might well have never happened. Mark therefore isn't glossing over this event, but perhaps is saying to us, it is essential that we are all be driven into the wilderness by God's Spirit, and there, we discern for ourselves what is to be so urgently awakened within us.
