A brief presentation was given at the end of Masses last weekend by Mr. Grant Mantha, Parish Coordinator of the Development and Peace Ministry. These words are worth repeating, and taking time to sit with and reflect upon ...

LENT is a time for three things ... Penance, Prayer, and Almsgiving. I am here to ask that you consider, as part of your Lenten Alms Giving, to support our Annual SHARE LENT, SHARE LOVE campaign. This year's campaign is appropriately called, **RECOVERING TOGETHER.**

This pandemic has put our human family in a global crisis. Severe malnutrition and extreme poverty are increasing around the world as people get sick and jobs are lost. Refugees, women and Indigenous peoples face the worst impacts of the pandemic, as the challenges of the virus add to their extremely vulnerable situation. The pandemic began while we were already facing another threat - the global climate crisis.

Both COVID-19 and climate change have exposed the deepening inequalities in our country and around the world. The people who were already living on the front lines of the climate crisis, especially in the Global South, are also the most vulnerable to the risks of the COVID-19 pandemic, and they have the fewest resources to recover.

The COVID-19 crisis / the climate crisis, have exposed the deep inequalities in the economic and social structures throughout the world. In order to rebuild in a way that ensures justice for all people and care for our common home, we must address the basic needs of the most vulnerable and marginalized. The virus has reminded us that we are all interconnected, and that we must ensure that all of us are part of the solution.

The response to the pandemic has also shown just how fast and powerfully governments can respond when there is an emergency. We know that it is possible to have a just recovery that will reduce global inequality, while respecting our planet's limits by dramatically reducing carbon emissions.

We are at a critical juncture for our common home.

The challenge is clear, "to live the love that would make us one great family, where all of us can feel at home" (Pope Francis). How we respond, right now as one human family, could determine the future of life on our planet. We must come together to support a global recovery to the pandemic that moves us towards a more sustainable, and more equitable future for all.

Pope Francis' new encyclical "Laudato Si," meaning "Praise be to You," is the second one he has released during his two year pontificate. Laudato Si' takes it's name from St. Francis of Assisi's medieval Italian prayer "Canticle of the Sun," which praises God through elements of creation like Brother Sun, Sister Moon, and "our sister Mother Earth." Here are but a few quotes from Pope Francis' encyclical "Laudato Si"

"Since everything is interrelated, concern for the protection of nature is also incompatible with the justification of abortion. How can we genuinely teach the importance of concern for other vulnerable beings, however troublesome or inconvenient they may be, if we fail to protect a human embryo, even when its presence is uncomfortable and creates difficulties?"

"Learning to accept our body, to care for it and to respect its fullest meaning, is an essential element of any genuine human ecology. Also, valuing one's own body in its femininity or masculinity is necessary if I am going to be able to recognize myself in an encounter with someone who is different."

"Our insistence that each human being is an image of God should not make us overlook the fact that each creature has its own purpose. None is superfluous. The entire material universe speaks of God's love, his boundless affection for us. Soil, water, mountains: everything is, as it were, a caress of God."

"The universe unfolds in God, who fills it completely. Hence, there is a mystical meaning to be found in a leaf, in a mountain trail, in a dewdrop, in a poor person's face. The ideal is not only to pass from the exterior to the interior to discover the action of God in the soul, but also to discover God in all things."

"All of us can cooperate as instruments of God for the care of creation, each according to his or her own culture, experience, involvements and talents."

"Politics must not be subject to the economy, nor should the economy be subject to the dictates of an efficiency-driven paradigm of technocracy. Today, in view of the common good, there is urgent need for politics and economics to enter into a frank dialogue in the service of life, especially human life."

"Because all creatures are connected, each must be cherished with love and respect, for all of us as living creatures are dependent on one another."
