The Greater Good versus the Common Good

One might assume that these two terms are interchangeable, but if I may suggest, they are not. When one considers the meaning of the word greater, it implies to see that what one wishes to do or bring about is in extent, amount, or intensity considerably above the normal, the average of what is presently occurring. This denotes then that it is not merely better than something else, but it is what one ought to strive for because it is such an improvement over what we now have. So, when we say that we are striving for the greater good, this is better than good; it is beyond good. What is better than good? A definition then of "the greater good" is that what is intended, is to be a benefit to the public, ideally to more people than oneself, making the new situation much better and desired. On the surface, this appears to be both noble and desirable, something that we ought to all work for. But when you look more closely, historically whenever this term has been invoked, it has been used as a justification for unimaginable crimes against another.

The greater good rarely if ever, is concerned for what is good. Rather, what it has in mind is to sustain and maintain, what is favourable (good) for those who presently hold power and desire to sway influence over the masses. We have seen this throughout history, how in the name of the greater good, it has been used to justify the death of anyone who imposes those presently in power. You only have to look at all empires, all dictatorships, all ideologies, all "isms", all systems, and any and all relationships that refuse to subject themselves to any all forms of interior reflection or to the external scrutinizing by others. Those who are proponents of the greater good function within a closed system, sharing power only with those who will neither challenge their authority, nor attempt to disrupt their way of living. They are creating the illusion that what they are doing is in your best interest. Whenever challenged they will use multiple tactics to discredit, humiliate and undermine the criticisms put against them as being illegitimate. They do this by attempting to "demonize" or "criminalize" those who challenge them. If successful, enough (the majority) of the people will fall into line and continue to accept the present rhetoric without question, seeing the protestors as being "unfaithful", "dangerous" and "the enemy" who must be stopped. The greater good then is not about ensuring what is in the best interest of the people, but is self-serving and the antithesis to what is in fact good. The common good differs from the greater good in one fundamental way: the common good is a universal benefit and enhancement to all because everyone is willing to change and be changed.

The Common Good is the fundamental basis of Jesus' teaching. The key is that this good is for everyone, without exception. It is to be held in "common" and as the word suggests, that which is common is the most basic and accessible to all. It is intended not to be exclusive or hierarchical, but inclusive and barrier free. Anyone who is a proponent of the common good, desires to seek what is best for everyone, beginning with the last, the least, the lost, the most vulnerable, and the most forgotten. This is not solely for the poor, the marginalized or the disenfranchised to have a token seat at the table, but all who wish to keep others poor, marginalized and disenfranchised, come to that table, and together dismantle it. The common good is embodied in every word and action that Jesus gives us. He showed us how to do it. It is possible then, to move from a "greater good mindset" to "the common good lifestyle" but only when we both understand and internalize the value and the necessity of becoming the Common Good. Anyone who desires the common good must fundamentally change, by dropping all allegiances to anything and everything that condones the diminishing of another or the promotion divisiveness. The moment we accept the common good as our informing principle to our being, then everyone moves to a new place of being, and the old falls away and is no more. The common good then becomes our nature and there is no other.

Loving the "True You" / Richard Rohr daily meditations

I very much enjoyed my time with Bishop Michael Curry, the Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church, when we worked together on the Reclaiming Jesus project and when I had dinner at his house in New York City. He reminds us why we must accept God's love for us before we can love another:

I've come to see that the call of God, the love that bids us welcome, is always a call to be-

come the true you. Not a doormat. The true you. Not an imitation of someone else. The true you: someone made in the image of God, deserving of and receiving love.

There is a Jewish proverb, "Before every person there marches an angel proclaiming, 'Behold, the image of God." Unselfish, sacrificial living isn't about ignoring or denying or destroying yourself. It's about discovering your true self—the self that looks like God—and living life from that grounding. Many people are familiar with a part of Jesus's summary of the law of Moses: You shall love your neighbor as you love yourself [Mark 12:31]. Yourself. Loving the self is a required balance. If we fail in that, we fail our neighbor, too. To love your neighbor is to relate to them as someone made in the image of God. And it is to relate to yourself as someone made in the image of God. It's God, up, down, and all around, and God is love.

Sometimes we can only recognize God's love for us through the love we receive from another person (whom God has loved well). The important part is that the flow of love gets started. Bishop Curry continues:

The ability to love yourself is intimately related to your capacity to love others. The challenge is creating a life that allows you to fulfill both needs. . . .

I've seen it happen enough times to be confident in saying it. Perhaps loving others saves us from the confusion, the frustration, and ultimately the neurosis that comes when we try to center the world around ourselves. Or perhaps it allows us to step outside the self enough to see ourselves with some distance, for a better perspective on what's missing. Or maybe when loving ourselves is hard, practicing loving others strengthens the muscle enough to turn the force inward. . . .

Love is a commitment to seek the good and to work for the good and welfare of others. It doesn't stop at our front door or our neighborhood, our religion or race, or our state's or your country's border. This is one great fellowship of love throughout the whole wide earth, as the hymn goes. It often calls us to step outside of what we thought our boundaries were, or what others expect of us. It calls for us to sacrifice, not because doing so feels good, but because it's the right thing to do. . . .

God's love is everywhere, in all things, and that includes you.
