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



### Not Today

It is said that once there was a man who was the steward of a beautiful, natural garden. It was a garden of forests, rivers and ponds. He tended to it daily. He was told that he would be released, only if he would give the wealthy man the garden. Every day his jailer would ask him if he was ready to acquiesce, but every day his response was the same. With a smile he would say, "not today."

Day after day, year after year, his friends came to him and begged him to reconsider. His reply to them was the same, "not today."

Now many years had passed, and a young woman who had come to visit him for many years from the time she was a little girl, asked him two questions, "why do you continue to refuse to sell the garden, and how is it you can continue to smile as you do?" He answered, "I continue to smile, because I see all things through the lens of hope, beauty, and wonder. Even in this darkened cell I can see in my mind's eye the garden, both as it was and as it is to become. My physical body is in this cell, but my mind, my imagination, my spirit never left the garden. It is those who do not appreciate what is right in front of them who are keeping company with me in this cell. “Compassion, in which all ethics must take root, can only attain its full breadth and depth if it embraces all living creatures and does not limit itself to humankind.”

*Jesus saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them (Mark 6. 34) pub*

Compassion is a most curious emotion, in that it can be multiple states of being at once; both loving and sad. When one feels compassion for another it causes a change within us, unlike pity or sympathy. The latter are fleeting and though there is an emotional component that we feel for the other, there is also an intellectual aspect that helps one to maintain a distance, so that we do not become overwhelmed.

What is compassion? It literally means to suffer together. There is no safe distance from the other who is suffering. Rather, the feeling that arises when you are confronted with another’s suffering, leads one to feel motivated to relieve that suffering. Not because I feel sorry for them, or I need to “fix it”, but because I appreciate it intuitively and physically; I am in it with them. Compassion is overwhelmingly powerful, but it does not paralyze us. Just the opposite. It compels us to act in unison with the other, to not merely relieve their pain or sorrow, but to help them address what would be the necessary steps to move through their present situation. We work with them.

What is required of one to have compassion for another, is what is spoken of in our gospel today. It says that Jesus saw them. He saw not merely an overwhelmingly large crowd, but he saw the individuals before him. He was not put off by his own fatigue and personal desire to get away for some rest with his disciples, nor the thought that he had to “fix the crowds problems.” Rather, through the eyes of compassion, he would engage one person at a time, and together they would begin the process of moving from suffering and pain, to healing and restoration. This is not something that comes naturally to us, but is something that we must first accept as gift, and then nurture it.

What is required of an individual to become compassionate, is that one has first embraced their own inner pain, struggle, anguish and suffering. I find no better words than those of Henri Nouwen as he wrote in his book, “The Wounded Healer.”

Nouwen said, “*Nobody escapes being wounded. We are all wounded people, whether physically, emotionally, mentally, or spiritually. The main question is not, 'How can we hide our wounds?' so we don't have to be embarrassed, but 'How can we put our woundedness in the service of others?' When our wounds cease to be a source of shame, and become a source of healing, we have become wounded healers. Compassion asks us to go where it hurts, to enter into the places of pain, to share in brokenness, fear, confusion, and anguish. Compassion challenges us to cry out with those in misery, to mourn with those who are lonely, to weep with those in tears. Compassion requires us to be weak with the weak, vulnerable with the vulnerable, and powerless with the powerless. Compassion means full immersion in the condition of being human.*”

Jesus had compassion for the crowd, because he had addressed the woundedness in his past. This allowed him to be free to be one with the person before him, being both sad and loving at the same time, so that joy may return to them both.
