SPES NON CONFUNDIT

Bull of Indiction of the ordinary Jubilee of the year 2025

Based on the structure of the Bull of Indiction "Spes Non Confundit", Pope Francis presents hope as a central theme in five understanding keys, each offering a unique perspective on how hope is essential to the Christian life, especially during the 2025 Jubilee Year.

1. A Word of Hope

Hope is deeply rooted in God's **infinite mercy**. The **true hope** does not depend on fleeting circumstances or human strength but is secure in the enduring love of God. **The hope that God offers is unshakable** because it is not based on human efforts or temporary solutions but on the **eternal faithfulness** and **grace** of God. **Hope does not disappoint** because it is anchored in God's promise of love and salvation.

2. A Journey of Hope

The **Jubilee Year** as a **journey of hope** is not just a physical pilgrimage but, more importantly, an

interior journey of spiritual renewal. This journey is an invitation to every believer to deepen their relationship with God, engage in **personal conversion**, and experience the transformative power of **God's mercy**.

The **interior journey** calls each person to examine their life and make space for **reconciliation, forgiveness, and renewed hope**.

3. Signs of Hope

The **Church** is called to be a **visible sign of hope** in the world, especially during the Jubilee Year. That **hope** is not only something to be held within the heart but also something that must be **demonstrated** through **actions of mercy** and **reconciliation**.

The Church's mission is to be a **witness to God's boundless mercy**. The true sign of hope is the **active**

ministry of the Church—through its **sacraments**, especially **Confession**, and through its outreach to the most **vulnerable** in society.

4. Appeals for Hope

The Christians are called to embody hope by **being agents of change** in a world that is often marked by **suffering, division, and injustice**. **Mercy and justice** go hand in hand in the Christian vocation. Christians are not called to simply **wait for a better world** but to **actively build it** by reaching out to those in need, fighting for the **oppressed**, and working toward the **common good**.

It is an urgent appeal to Christians to **act with mercy** but **justice** is equally important: Christians must also **work for justice** in the public sphere, advocating for fair treatment, equality, and dignity for all people, particularly those who suffer from systemic injustices.

5. Anchored in Hope

The foundation of all hope is **God's unchanging mercy**, and it is this hope that transforms the lives of the faithful. **Hope is anchored** in the unwavering love and mercy of God, which is always available and never dependent on human circumstances or efforts. It is this unshakable foundation that allows believers to face life's trials with confidence, trusting that God's mercy will always lead them to healing, reconciliation, and ultimate peace. Unlike worldly hopes that may disappoint, **hope in God's mercy** remains constant and enduring.

The Bull of Indiction "Spes Non Confundit", issued by Pope Francis, announces the Ordinary Jubilee of the Year 2025, inviting the faithful to experience a year of mercy, reconciliation, and spiritual renewal. The title, which translates to "Hope Does Not Disappoint," emphasizes the theme of hope in God's enduring mercy and the call for personal and communal transformation.

What is a Jubilee Year?

- **Definition:**
A Jubilee Year is a special period in the Catholic Church dedicated to spiritual renewal, prayer, penance, and acts of mercy. It provides a unique opportunity for the faithful to deepen their relationship with God.
- **Biblical Origin:**
The concept comes from the Old Testament "Year of Jubilee" (Leviticus 25), a time of liberation, forgiveness of debts, and restoration of relationships.
- **Spiritual Focus:**
The Church's Jubilee offers plenary indulgences, allowing the faithful to experience God's mercy and reconciliation.

The Jubilee Year 2025

- I. **An Ordinary Jubilee:**
The Jubilee of 2025, proclaimed by Pope Francis, is an **Ordinary Jubilee** with the theme of "**Pilgrims of hope.**"
- II. **Invitation to All:**
It encourages people from all walks of life to journey toward spiritual renewal, finding hope in God's mercy and grace.

Key Elements

- **Pilgrimage:**
Journeying to designated Holy Doors or sacred sites is a sign of conversion and commitment to God.
- **Sacramental Confession:**
A renewed focus on the Sacrament of Reconciliation to seek God's forgiveness and healing.
- **Eucharistic Celebration:**
Participation in the Holy Mass, emphasizing thanksgiving and unity in Christ.
- **Acts of Mercy:**
Engaging in corporal and spiritual works of mercy to reflect God's love in action.

The pilgrimage in the Christian journey symbolizes the spiritual journey of faith and growth toward a deeper relationship with God. Just as pilgrims travel to sacred sites, Christians embark on their own journeys, seeking purpose, healing, and renewal. This journey reflects the struggles and triumphs believers face as they navigate life's challenges, often leading to transformative experiences.

Pilgrimage serves as a reminder that faith is not a destination but an ongoing process. It encourages believers to engage with their spirituality actively, fostering a sense of community, introspection, and connection with the divine. Ultimately, a pilgrimage is about drawing closer to God, seeking His guidance, and discovering the profound truths that shape one's life in faith.

PLENARY INDULGENCE

Whereas the Roman Pontiff, Pope Francis, has decreed 2025 to be a **Jubilee Year** for all the faithful, an extraordinary year as *Pilgrims of Hope*, beginning on December 24th, 2024, and concluding on January 6th 2026, and has proposed in the bull of indiction, *SPES NON CONFUNDIT* (HOPE DOES NOT DISAPPOINT, May 9th 2024) the Jubilee indulgence as a means of encountering God's mercy.


Whereas the Apostolic Penitentiary, in a decree dated May 13th, 2024, set out the norms for obtaining the plenary indulgence for the Jubilee Year, including the instruction that Bishops should designate churches and sacred places where the indulgence may be attained.

I hereby decree that in the Roman Catholic Diocese of Peterborough four churches throughout the diocese may be visited by the faithful to fulfill requirements for the indulgence – **St. Michael the Archangel**, 379 Division Street, Cobourg; **Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary** (St. Mary's), 40 Russell St. East, Lindsay; **St. Patrick's**, 89 Rain Lake Rd., Kearney and, principal among them, **the Cathedral of St. Peter-In-Chains**, 411 Reid Street, Peterborough.


Further, I remind the Faithful that the granting of a plenary indulgence ordinarily depends on the following obligations being observed, as noted in the decree of the Apostolic Penitentiary of May 13th 2024:


- attend Mass and receive Holy Communion at one of the churches noted above during the Jubilee Year
- make a sacramental confession [within several days of the above-mentioned visit], and
- pray for the intentions of the Supreme Pontiff

Jubilee Year 2025: Events in the Diocese

As Pope Francis points out, we don't have to travel to Rome to participate: dioceses and parishes across the world will mark the Jubilee with pilgrimages, Masses, and other special events throughout the year.

In the Peterborough diocese, the Holy Year is embraced with a vibrant array of activities, reflecting the spirit of pilgrimage and celebration (see the calendar of major events). Parishes across the diocese are hosting special Masses, offering opportunities for the faithful to gather in prayer and reflection. Some jubilee group's celebrations will come to foster a sense of sharing faith, organizing events that span the entire year.

What is the Spiritual meaning of "Pilgrimage" in the Christian journey?

Just as pilgrims journey to sacred sites, Christians embark on their paths, driven by the desire for purpose, healing, and renewal. Pilgrimage is a powerful reminder that faith is not merely a destination but a continuous journey. It inspires believers to actively engage with their spirituality, nurturing a rich sense of community, deep introspection, and a profound connection with the divine.

Pilgrimages and the Plenary Indulgence for the Diocese of Peterborough

His Excellency Bishop Daniel Miehm has issued a Jubilee Year Indulgence Decree (previous page) for the Diocese of Peterborough. The Decree states that four churches throughout the diocese may be visited by the faithful to fulfill the requirements for the indulgence:

- **Cathedral of St. Peter-in-Chains** in Peterborough.
- **St. Michael the Archangel** in Cobourg;
- **Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary** in Lindsay;
- **St. Patrick's** in Kearney;

Among the highlights are the pilgrimages that will be organized within the parishes, where people will embark on local journeys of faith, visiting significant sites and churches, deepening their connection to the holy season.

The Pilgrimage Passport is an essential tool for parishioners seeking to deepen their spiritual journey during the Holy Year. It provides detailed information about the designated pilgrim churches across the diocese, including their locations and the hours they are open for visits, prayer, and reflection. Whether you're embarking on an individual pilgrimage or participating in a group journey, the passport will guide you to each church, ensuring you can fully experience the sacred sites that mark this special time.

Catechetical Resource on Plenary Indulgences during the Jubilee Year

1. What is an indulgence?

"An indulgence is a remission before God of the temporal punishment due to sins whose guilt has already been forgiven, which the faithful Christian who is duly disposed gains under certain prescribed conditions through the action of the Church which, as the minister of redemption, dispenses and applies with authority the treasury of the satisfactions of Christ and the saints." 81 "An indulgence is partial or plenary accordingly as it removes either part or all of the temporal punishment due to sin." 82 Indulgences may be applied to the living or the dead.

In our humanity, weak and attracted by evil, certain residual effects of sin remain. These are removed by the indulgence, always by the grace of Christ, who, as Saint Paul VI wrote, "is himself our "indulgence"

2. What is the Jubilee Indulgence?

- The Jubilee Indulgence, thanks to the power of prayer, is intended in a particular way for those who have gone before us, so that they may obtain full mercy. It is a way of discovering the unlimited nature of God's mercy.[3]
- All other Indulgences previously granted remain in force.

3. How is the Jubilee Indulgence obtained?

All the faithful, who are truly repentant and free from any affection for sin (*cf. Enchiridion Indulgentiarum, IV ed., norm. 20, §1*), who are moved by a spirit of charity and who, during the Holy Year, purified through the sacrament of penance and refreshed by Holy Communion, pray for the intentions of the Supreme Pontiff, will be able to obtain from the treasury of the Church a plenary indulgence, with remission and

forgiveness of all their sins, which can be applied in suffrage to the souls in Purgatory.

4. What are the ways in which a plenary indulgence can be obtained?

- a. Pilgrimages
- b. Pious Visits to Sacred Places
- c. Works of Mercy and Penance

5. What are the specifications for pilgrimages?

- **At any sacred Jubilee site, devoutly participate in:**
 - Holy Mass,
 - A ritual Mass for the conferral of the sacraments of Christian Initiation or the Anointing of the Sick
 - a celebration of the Word of God,
 - the Liturgy of the Hours,
 - the Way of the Cross,
 - the Marian Rosary,
 - the recitation of the Akathist hymn,
 - a penitential celebration with individual confession

6. What are the specifications for visits to sacred places?

- At any Jubilee site, individually or in a group, for a suitable period of time, engage in:
 - Eucharistic Adoration, concluding with Our Father, Profession of Faith, invocations to Mary

What about the elderly, the sick, prisoners, workers in hospitals and care facilities who provide continuous care for the sick?

The faithful who are truly repentant of sin but who cannot participate in the various solemn celebrations, pilgrimages and pious visits for serious reasons can obtain the Jubilee Indulgence, under the same conditions, if they are united in spirit with the faithful taking part in person, especially when the words of

the Pontiff or the Bishop are transmitted through means of communication.

To obtain the Jubilee plenary indulgence in this way the above mentioned faithful are to:

- Offer up the sufferings or hardships of their lives and recite:
 - Our Father
 - Profession of Faith
 - Prayers in conformity with the objectives of the Holy Year

7. What are the specifications to obtain the Jubilee Indulgence by practicing works of mercy?

- Participate in a church or other suitable place, according to the mind of the Holy Father, with a devout spirit:
 - Popular missions
 - Spiritual exercises
 - Formation activities on documents of Vatican II and Catechism
- According to the usual spiritual, sacramental and prayer conditions
 - Feed the hungry
 - Give drink to the thirsty
 - Clothe the naked
 - Welcome the stranger
 - Heal the sick
 - Visit the imprisoned
 - Bury the dead
 - Counsel the doubtful
 - Instruct the ignorant
 - Admonish sinners

- Comfort the afflicted
- Forgive offences
- Bear patiently those who do us ill
- Pray for the living and the dead

8. What are the specifications for penance?

- Rediscover penitential nature of Friday
- Abstain from
 - Futile distractions
 - Superfluous consumption
- Donating a proportionate sum of money to the poor
- Supporting works of a religious or social nature (defense and protection of life)
- Support quality of life of abandoned children, young people in difficulty, needy, lonely elderly, migrants.
- Dedicating free time to voluntary activities in community service

9. Can a second plenary indulgence be obtained in a single day?

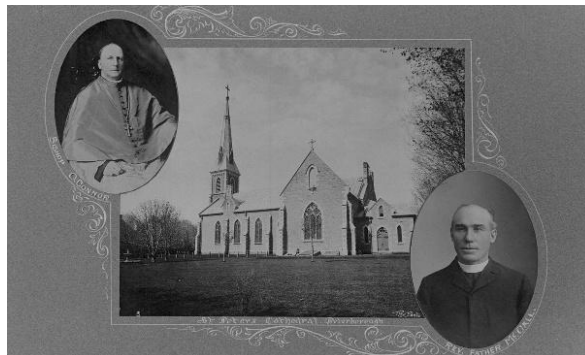
An individual can obtain a second plenary indulgence in a day, which is applicable to the deceased, when he or she:

- Carries out an act of charity on behalf of the souls in Purgatory
- Receives Holy Communion a second time

2025 is the **200th Anniversary of the arrival** of 2,500 mostly Catholic Irish settlers in Peterborough. This large-scale immigration was sparked by two things: decades of famine in Ireland and the British government wanting to prevent the American takeover of Ontario (Upper Canada). 50,000 people applied to come and the lucky few who were accepted were loaded into 9 ships and after a wearying voyage across the Atlantic and up the St Lawrence, they disembarked in Cobourg. Men, women and children walked or took dugout canoes up to Scott's Plains (Peterborough) in August 1825.



The men immediately went out to the homesteads in what is now Douro, Lakefield, Young's Point, Otonabee, Downeyville, Lindsay, Kinmount and points in between. This was the "big bang" of the settlement of Catholics in our area. Within a few years, they had built 14 churches (also used as schools) and in the winter of 1837, they came together to build St Peter's Church in Peterborough which later became our present Cathedral. These brave pioneers were resolute in their determination and firm in their faith.



From the 1st to the 10th of August, there will be the Nine Ships Celebration with Masses, cultural events, trips and

concerts to celebrate. Throughout the year the Diocese is having commemorative Masses and other events in the original settlement parishes. How fitting it is that in this Jubilee Year of Hope, we honour and remember these settlers of faith and hope!

4th Station: Jesus meets His Blessed Mother

Leader: We adore you, O Christ, and we praise you
All: Because by your Holy Cross you have redeemed the World

Passage: Luke 2:34-35

"Then Simeon blessed them and said to Mary, his mother: 'This child is destined to cause the falling and rising of many in Israel and to be a sign that will be spoken against so that the thoughts of many hearts will be revealed. And a sword will pierce your own soul too.'"

Pilgrims of Hope: Love's Comfort

Mary, a pilgrim of hope herself, meets her Son on the road to Calvary. In that moment, the deep love and sorrow they share comfort and strengthen each

other. As we journey through life, we encounter moments where love—both human and divine—reminds us that we are not alone. The hope of the Resurrection is carried in the arms of this love.

Reflection: How does the love of Mary and Jesus strengthen my own faith journey?

5th Station: Simon of Cyrene helps Jesus carry the cross

Leader: We adore you, O Christ, and we praise you
All: Because by your Holy Cross you have redeemed the World

Passage: Mark 15:21

"A certain man from Cyrene, Simon, the father of Alexander and Rufus, was passing by on his way in from the country, and they forced him to carry the cross."

Pilgrims of Hope: The Gift of Companionship

No pilgrim journeys alone. We encounter Simon, who, though a stranger, steps forward to help carry Jesus' cross. In our own lives, God sends us companions—friends, family, or even strangers—to share our burdens. In this moment, we realize the grace of community and the hope that others bring into our lives.

Reflection: Who has been a Simon to me on my journey? How can I offer help to others who are struggling?

6th Station: Veronica wipes the face of Jesus

Leader: We adore you, O Christ, and we praise you
All: Because by your Holy Cross you have redeemed the World

Passage: Matthew 25:35-40

"For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me. Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink?'"

Pilgrims of Hope: Acts of Compassion

Veronica's simple act of kindness—wiping the face of Jesus—reminds us that every small act of love can bring hope and comfort. As we journey through life, we are called to recognize the suffering of others and, like Veronica, offer whatever we have to alleviate their pain, even if it's just a moment of tenderness.

Reflection: How can I show compassion to someone who is suffering today?

7th Station: Jesus falls the second time

Leader: We adore you, O Christ, and we praise you
All: Because by your Holy Cross you have redeemed the World

Passage: Psalm 34:18

"The Lord is close to the brokenhearted and saves those who are crushed in spirit."

Pilgrims of Hope: Rising Again

Jesus falls again, but this second fall teaches us something deeper: that even when we fall repeatedly, there is always the grace to rise again.

Hope is not a one-time event; it is a continual act of trusting in God's mercy. With every fall, we are invited to trust that God will lift us up once more.

Reflection: How do I respond when I fall? How can I trust that God will help me rise again?

8th Station: Jesus meets the women of Jerusalem

Leader: We adore you, O Christ, and we praise you
All: Because by your Holy Cross you have redeemed the World

Passage: Luke 23:27-31

"A large number of people followed him, including women who mourned and wailed for him. Jesus turned and said to them, 'Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me; weep for yourselves and for your children.'"

Pilgrims of Hope: Sorrow and Solidarity

In this station, Jesus, aware of the sorrow of the women of Jerusalem, speaks words of comfort. He recognizes their grief and points them to a deeper hope. Pilgrims of hope know that even in the darkest of days, we can find solidarity in shared suffering and be reminded of the ultimate redemption that awaits.

Reflection: How can I offer hope to others who are grieving or in pain?

9th Station: Jesus falls the third time

Leader: We adore you, O Christ, and we praise you
All: Because by your Holy Cross you have redeemed the World

Passage: 2 Corinthians 12:9

"But he said to me, 'My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness.' Therefore I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may rest upon me."

Pilgrims of Hope: The Depths of Endurance

This third fall is the deepest. It is a moment of complete exhaustion and utter vulnerability. Yet it also marks the point at which Christ draws closest to us in our darkest moments. In the depths of despair, we are often closest to encountering the transformative power of God's love. But where sin abounded, grace did much more abound: that as despair reigned unto death, even so might hope will reign unto eternal life by Jesus Christ our Lord.

Reflection: When have I felt at my lowest? How can I allow God's love to meet me in that place?

10th Station: Jesus is stripped of His clothes

Leader: We adore you, O Christ, and we praise you
All: Because by your Holy Cross you have redeemed the World

Passage: John 19:23-24

"When the soldiers crucified Jesus, they took his clothes, dividing them into four shares, one for each of them, with the undergarment remaining. This garment was seamless, woven in one piece from top to bottom. 'Let's not tear it,' they said to one another. 'Let's decide by lot who will get it.'"

Pilgrims of Hope: Vulnerability and Dignity

As Jesus is stripped of His clothes, He stands exposed, but even in this moment of utter vulnerability, His dignity remains intact. He shows us that we are not defined by what the world sees but by the love God has for us. Our true worth is rooted in this love, and hope remains even in moments of humiliation.

Reflection: When have I felt exposed or vulnerable? How can I find strength in my dignity as a child of God?

11th Station: Jesus is nailed to the cross

Leader: We adore you, O Christ, and we praise you
All: Because by your Holy Cross you have redeemed the World

Passage: Luke 23:33-34

"When they came to the place called the Skull, there they crucified him, along with the criminals—one on his right, the other on his left. Jesus said, 'Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing.'"

Pilgrims of Hope: Suffering and Redemption

On the cross, Jesus bears the weight of all suffering, offering hope to the world. His suffering becomes a pathway to redemption for all who will follow Him. For pilgrims of hope, suffering is not the end; it is the place where salvation begins. In our own suffering, we are invited to unite ourselves with His for the sake of others.

Reflection: How can I offer my own sufferings for the sake of others' healing?

12th Station: Jesus dies on the cross

Leader: We adore you, O Christ, and we praise you
All: Because by your Holy Cross you have redeemed the World

Passage: Matthew 27:50

"And when Jesus had cried out again in a loud voice, he gave up his spirit."

Pilgrims of Hope: The Victory of Love

The moment of death is often seen as the end of a journey, a pilgrimage, yet for Jesus, it is the final victory over sin and death. The cross becomes the sign of eternal hope. For every pilgrim of hope, death is not the end, but a doorway to new life. Christ's death becomes our invitation to trust in the power of resurrection.

Reflection: How can I live in the hope of the resurrection? How does Christ's death transform my view of death?

13th Station: Jesus' body is taken down from the cross

Leader: We adore you, O Christ, and we praise you
All: Because by your Holy Cross you have redeemed the World

Passage: John 19:38-40

"Later, Joseph of Arimathea asked Pilate for the body of Jesus. Now Joseph was a disciple of Jesus, but secretly because he feared the Jewish leaders. With Pilate's permission, he came and took the body away. He was accompanied by Nicodemus, the man who earlier had visited Jesus at night. Nicodemus brought a mixture of myrrh and aloes, about seventy-five pounds. Taking Jesus' body, the two of them wrapped it, with the spices, in strips of linen. This was in accordance with Jewish burial customs."

Pilgrims of Hope: The Gift of Mourning

As Jesus is placed in the arms of His mother, there is deep sorrow, yet there is also profound hope. The act of mourning becomes an act of love, and the hope of new life begins to stir in the hearts of those who are grieving. We are reminded that hope is often born in the deepest moments of sorrow.

Reflection: How can I open my heart to hope in times of mourning or loss?

14th Station: Jesus is laid in the tomb

Leader: We adore you, O Christ, and we praise you
All: Because by your Holy Cross you have redeemed the World

Passage: Matthew 27:59-60

"Joseph took the body, wrapped it in a clean linen cloth, and placed it in his own new tomb that he had cut out of the rock. He rolled a big stone in front of the entrance to the tomb and went away."

Pilgrims of Hope: Awaiting the Resurrection

The tomb is a place of silence and waiting. Yet for pilgrims of hope, it is not a place of despair. The tomb, while a sign of death, holds the promise of new life. As we await the resurrection, we too live in the hope that Christ's victory will be ours. The tomb is empty; death has been conquered.

Reflection: How do I live in anticipation of the new life that Christ offers? How does the resurrection transform the way I live today?
