The Season after the Epiphany is a season of Ordinary Time, in that it stands between the great Christological cycles of Advent-Christmas-Epiphany and Lent-Easter-Pentecost. The Gospel readings in the lectionary center on stories from the early ministry of Christ. The liturgical color is green, symbolizing growth in Christ.

January 20 is also Human Relations Day on the United Methodist calendar. Observed on the Sunday before the celebration of Martin Luther King, Jr.'s, birthday, this day calls the Church to recognize the right of all God's children to realize their potential as human beings in relation to one another. Last Sunday's Congregational Meeting to preview the Special Session of the UMC General Conference in February was very well attended. Thank you for your interest and concern about the direction of our denomination in relation to the issue of homosexuality. Special thanks to my ministry colleague, *Rev. Paul Hibbard*, for preparing and guiding us through a PowerPoint presentation highlighting the 3 plans for "A Way Forward" which will be considered at the General Conference.

At the end of the meeting, I announced that the Adult Ministry Team will offer a special class on "Homosexuality and the Church" over the four Tuesday nights in February (6:30-8:00 PM). I'll be leading the class, assisted by Paul Hibbard. The aims will be (1) to clarify the underlying issues which have produced the impasse in the United Methodist Church regarding homosexuality, and (2) to provide an opportunity for participants to voice their own concerns and convictions about this matter, as well as to hear and learn from the views of others. More details are forthcoming.
