What is National Coming Out Day?

National Coming Out Day was founded by Robert Eichberg and Jean O'Leary on October 11, 1988 in celebration of the second national march for equailty for persons of all gender and sexual identities in Washington D.C. a year earlier. The purpose of the march and of National Coming Out Day is to promote public awareness of gay, bisexual, lesbian and transgender rights and to celebrate gender and sexuality as a good gift.

Why talk about this in church?

LGBTQ people are still targets of violence, with young people particularly at risk of bullying and other types of harm. LGBTQ people can be denied services in many states, ranging from homeless youth programs and veterans services to shopping centers and taxi cabs. We believe that the church has no business mimicking the prevailing prejudices of the society around it.



Here at Woodbury UMC, we welcome all people in Christian love. This service is a way to take that welcome and offer it explicitly to those who have every reason to view us with suspicion, and to answer that with clear actions and not just words. Through the very act of having a LGBTQ welcoming worship service, our congregation is showing an interest and determination in making the world a better place for LGBTQ people.

By pushing for LGBTQ acceptance and equality, we can make the world a better place for LGBTQ people. The institutional church has been a source of great harm over the years—we as the Woodbury UMC are able to be a source of healing and love—whatever those steps are, however big or small.



Vision Statement:

- Handyman projects (e.g., carpentry, painting, simple plumbing/ electrical/car repairs, computer troubleshooting)
- Home upkeep (e.g., spring/fall cleanup)
- Transportation and delivery
- Family crisis support (e.g., child/elder/respite care, meals)
- · Friendly visitor

Nominal Constraints:

- Short-term crisis support: 4-8 hours; 1-2 days
- Work projects: Ideally done in 1 day; up to \$200 for material cost
- Application approval predicated on resource availability and schedule



God and the Pandemic: A Christian Reflection on the Coronavirus and Its Aftermath by NT Wright


