# June 23: 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday after Pentecost Peace with Justice Sunday

**The Season after Pentecost**, also called Ordinary Time, begins the day after Pentecost and ends the day before the First Sunday of Advent. The Gospel lessons in the lectionary for this half of the year cover Jesus' teaching ministry and tend to center on the theme of the kingdom or reign of God. The other scripture lessons go in a semi-continuous cycle through books of the Bible rather than follow a specific theme. The liturgical color is green, symbolizing growth in Christ.

On June 23 we will observe **Peace with Justice Sunday** in United Methodism. This day witnesses to God's demand for a faithful, just, and secure world. The special offering supports peace with justice ministries through the General Board of Church and Society and the annual conferences.

### Report on Annual Conference

#### FROM THE PASTOR...

The New York Annual Conference convened for its yearly gathering June 6-10 at Hofstra University in Hempstead, NY. *Paul Hatch* served as our church's Lay Delegate, and I participated as WUMC's Clergy Delegate. This year's Annual Conference came at a watershed moment for worldwide Methodism, given the inability of our denomination to find "A Way Forward" on the issue of homosexuality that will keep our Wesleyan connection intact.

A Special Session of General Conference last February narrowly reaffirmed the UMC's traditional stance, which regards the practice of homosexuality as incompatible with biblical teaching and forbids the ordination of openly-avowed gays and the performance of gay marriages by Methodist clergy. The "traditional" plan adopted at the Special Session strengthens the enforcement of the current rules and also provides a path for dissenting churches to exit the denomination. Those favoring an open posture toward the LGBTQI community are now exploring alternative alignments.

Acrimonious debate and political maneuvering will no doubt continue leading up to next year's General Conference in Minneapolis (May 5-15, 2020). One of the major business items at our recent New York Annual Conference was the election of delegates to the next General and Jurisdictional Conferences. Those elected are identified in the latest edition of the NYAC newsletter, *The Vision*, which is attached to this week's *Messenger*.

In his Episcopal Address to the NYAC, *Bishop Thomas J. Bickerton* described the UMC's current position as "untenable" – a way of saying that the differing viewpoints within the Church are irreconcilable and that some structural change is inevitable and perhaps even necessary. But the Bishop went on to say that "we're together until we're not" – a reminder that we are still the <u>United Methodist Church</u>, and that as long as we remain one body we have the opportunity and obligation to relate to one another in civil, respectful, and loving ways, even if the end result is a split. In my view, the Bishop practiced what he preached during the Annual Conference sessions. Although he and much of the NYAC lean toward the progressive posture, he fully acknowledged the diversity of opinion within our Conference and made every effort to be inclusive in both speech and action.

I want to commend our own Church Council for being open and proactive about all these developments. They have created an "Our Way Forward Together" team consisting of *Bud Behlman, Kathy Craig, Theron Kissinger, Catherine Mason, Rick Richardson, Carolyn Shay,* and *Pete Vindigni*. Their goals are (1) to keep our congregation as informed as possible about the issues that divide the UMC, (2) to facilitate healthy discussion of these issues in our own local church, and (3) to help us take the journey together in a spirit of love and fellowship. Please avail yourself of these opportunities for dialogue as they are offered. In the meantime, feel free to communicate your concerns to any of the team members or to me.



We seek a closer relationship with Jesus Christ. Inspired by His example, we strive to be God's hands in this world.



#### "Plant a Row" this year for the Woodbury Food Bank: Summer 2019 schedule for fresh produce donations

The Woodbury Food Bank has scheduled special donation collection periods on Thursday and Friday mornings from July 11 through the end of September to accept fresh produce donations from home gardeners in the community. Volunteers of the Community Services Council of Woodbury, an independent nonprofit agency that provides food bank access yearround to low-income households in Woodbury, will receive donations of fresh vegetables, fruits and herbs from 9 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. each Thursday and Friday during the peak growing season in July, August and September.

Donations should be delivered to the Woodbury Food Bank, located at the rear of the LaBonne's shopping plaza on Main Street South in the portion of the building housing the Woodbury branch of Newtown Savings Bank. Driveways on the north and south sides of the plaza complex provide access to the rear delivery lot.

We invite our community to share in the bounty of this year's harvest with local families who face economic hardship in meeting their basic nutritional needs and financial obligations. Our clients have benefited greatly from our home gardeners' generosity in their produce donations in recent years, and we are very grateful to be able to provide these gifts of the growing season at the food bank.
