
HOUSEKEEPING NOTES FROM THE OFFICE...

THE STORY OF THE CANDY CANE

Legend has it that in 1670, the choirmaster at the Cologne Cathedral in Germany handed out sugar sticks among his young singers to keep them quiet during the long Living Creche ceremony. In honor of the occasion, he had the candies bent into shepherds' crooks.

In 1847, a German-Swedish immigrant named August Imgard of Wooster, Ohio, decorated a small blue spruce with paper ornaments and candy canes. It wasn't until the turn of the century that the red and white stripes and peppermint flavors became the norm.

In Indiana, a candy maker wanted to make a candy that could be a reminder of Jesus Christ, so he made the Christmas candy cane. He started off with a stick of pure white hard candy. The white color symbolized the virgin birth and the sinless nature of Jesus, and the hard candy symbolized the solid rock which was the foundation of the church, and firmness of the promises of God.

The candy maker made the candy in the form of a J, which represented the name of Jesus and the staff of the Good Shepherds. He then stained it with three stripes which showed the scourging Jesus received, and symbolized the blood shed by Christ on the cross. When you break the cane, it reminds us that Jesus' body was broken for us.

SITE TO BEHOLD ON CHRISTMAS EVE

HOW DID IT ALL BEGIN?

Anyone traveling through Woodbury on Christmas Eve can't help but feel an awesome glow as they pass through miles of ethereal "lights" lining each side of Main Street.

The tradition of luminaries dates back many centuries and has been used predominantly in the Southwest of the United States as a means of illumination to guide the Christ Child on Christmas Eve.

These "Christmas Fires" were originally small bon fires made of criss-crossed stacked pinion logs, a nut pine indigenous to the western United States and Mexico. But how did this tradition come to Woodbury? The truth should be known; the truth should be shared.

One of this church's members, Sasha Dickenson, now passed on, was very instrumental in starting this tradition. While living in Trumbull, CT for years Sasha kept an illustrated article on luminaries she saw in a Better Homes and Garden magazine vowing one day to line her driveway with them. Initially she used the idea in 1977 to grace the circular driveway and walkways of the Nichols Church where she was then a member. This was the year President Nixon banned unnecessary use of outside electricity. The Dickenson's eventually used 144 luminarias to line their driveway on Christmas Eve and continued to do so for the remainder of the years they lived in Trumbull. The beauty of these "lights" quickly spread throughout the Village of Nichols and thousands of these lights were displayed throughout Trumbull.


The luminaria tradition was brought to Woodbury in 1986 when luminaries once again lined the walkways of this church. And as you know, the Lions Club of Woodbury eventually picked up on the idea and for many years has been responsible for setting up the luminaries that grace Woodbury's streets on Christmas Eve.


