## Valley Parish Lenten Prayer Vigil A Prayer by Rynn Naylor

The Valley Cooperative Parish held a Lenten Prayer Vigil on Tuesday, March 23. Nineteen people participated in the Zoom gathering. Prayers were offered for a number of current concerns. *Rynn Naylor* represented WUMC at the Prayer Vigil and offered the following prayer about the challenges created by the COVID pandemic:

Lord God of all creation,

Such havor has been released upon this world, from hustling and bustling to quarantining and solitude, all had stopped. - Pastoral Support Providing a supplement to achieve a fair and just salary for pastors. #3021092

During the season of Lent please consider making a donation to one of these mission opportunities in Ecuador. You can decide which Advance project you feel most passion for and send/bring a check made out to the Woodbury UMC to the church with the project name & number (#) in the memo line. The WUMC will then send cumulative checks for each project to the Advance where 100% of each gift will go directly to the designated Advance project.

Also please consider praying with the churches of Ecuador every day at 3:00 pm (4:00 pm after Daylight Savings Time which they don't observe in Ecuador). Sara wrote the following about their prayer ministry: "Every day at 3 pm from home, all the Ecuadorian churches remain in a prayer chain. Our world needs this unity in prayer and spirit. We hope that you feel blessed, as daily, many friends remember you and pray for you."

May we join our voices with our sisters and brothers in Ecuador as often as we can, remembering that they are lifting us in their prayers. May we be a blessing to one another.

# NEW KID ON BLO

Nonnewaug High vo-ag program gets back to work with animals

WOODBURY ach spring brings the arrival of newborn animals at Nonnewaug High School, and vo-ag students are also returning to the hands-on learning of raising livestock

learning of raising livestock after missing out last year due to the COVID-19 outbreak. New to the department so far this year are five kids, three baby lambs, chicks and piglets, said vo-ag Director Ed Belinsky.

Piglets born March 3 feed off their mother Tuesday afternoon at Nonnewaug High School in Woodbury.

## BABIES: Online learning just not the same

A calf is due in the next few weeks and another goat is expecting kids soon.

He said spring is always a busy time of year in vo-ag, and he's happy that Nonnewaug students are able to get back to the in-person learning.

When schools moved to online learning last March, students — especially those studying ag production and veterinary science — missed out on much of the hands-on experiences, which are a huge part of vo-ag education, Belinsky said. Students have been back in school full time for about a month now, and have their hands full with all the new arrivals.

Also, a mother goat died from delivery complications, so her five kids must be bottle fed by students and staff every two to three hours, 24 hours a day, Belinsky said.

He said it's a sad occurrence but something that sometimes happens and can't be prevented. He said it

helps students learn that life and birth and death are all part of the process when it comes to raising livestock. He said the hand-on learning is "incredibly important" in the vo-ag educational experience, and also "it's a really fun time of year."
