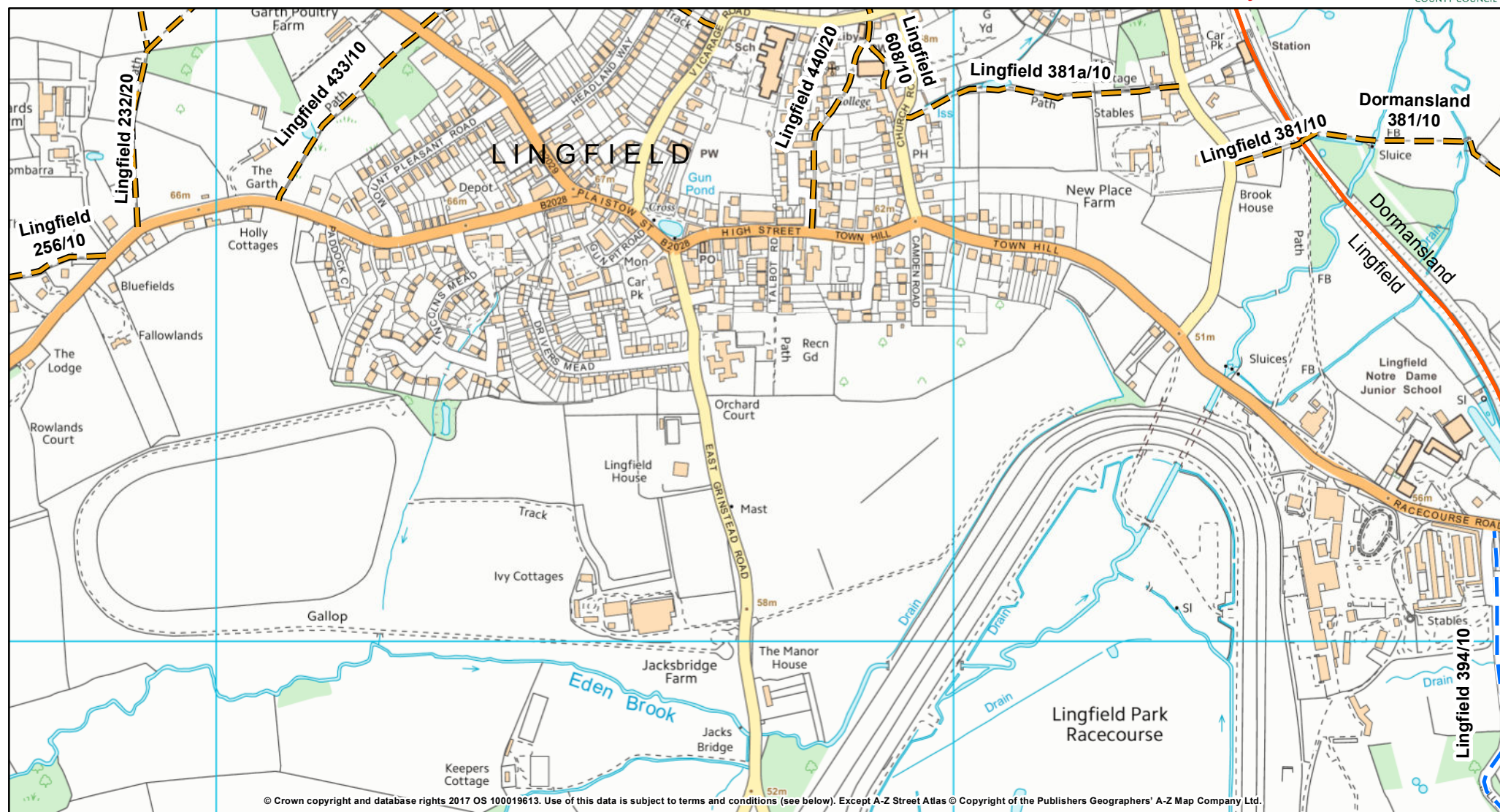

PLEASE READ BEFORE COMPLETING YOUR FORM

- The purpose of this form is to help establish whether or not there is a public right of way over the route(s) claimed, and if so, what kind of way it is (i.e. footpath, bridleway, restricted byway or byway open to all traffic). Please complete the questions as **fully and as accurately** as possible, making it clear where the given dates are approximate. Try to avoid generalities where possible.
- The information you give in this form will **NOT** normally be treated as confidential unless specifically requested. The legal procedure requires that evidence is available for public inspection. If requested any statement or evidence form can be submitted without name and address so long as it is accompanied by an identifying covering letter.
- This form should be completed by **ONE** person only and relate to **ONE** route only (except where forms allow for this). If multiple routes have been used this should be made as clear as possible. If you need extra forms the County Council will supply them.
- Each person filling in a form should **PERSONALLY** draw the route they used onto the **plan on the back of this note** using a **black or dark coloured pen¹** and draw **only** the route relevant to this claim. They should also then sign and date this plan. Any claim should pass from one public place (or right of way) to another.
- Each person should also indicate on the plan the location of any **gates, stiles, notice or obstructions**.
- If the County Council proceeds with the claim and it is contested, there may be a Public Inquiry. These are usually held locally (e.g. in the Village Hall etc.). The evidence you give on the form will be presented at the Inquiry but it would carry much greater weight if you could attend to answer questions about it. That is why you are asked on the form to say whether you would be prepared to attend. Inquiries are kept as informal as possible and you do not need to be available for the whole Inquiry.
