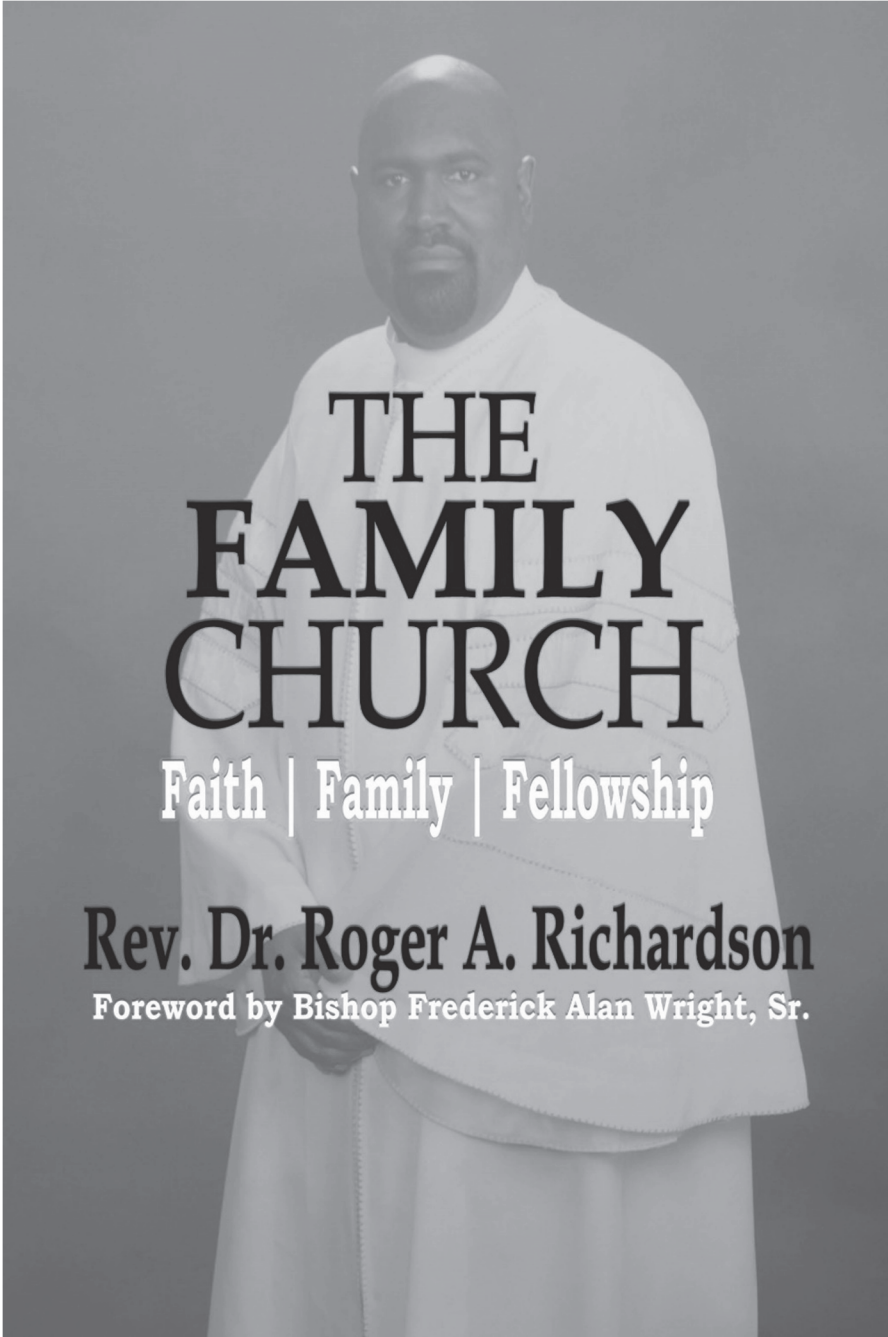

REVIVAL IN UNCERTAIN TIMES

Setting the Stage: A Sea of Change



We stand on the precipice of a new era, an era where the familiar ground beneath our feet feels like shifting sand. The anchors of community, family, and institutions that once held firm seem to be slowly giving way. While change has always been an inseparable thread in the human mosaic, the transformations swirling around us today carry a unique potency, a transformative weight unlike any before. It's not just the world around us that is in flux. We are in constant metamorphosis, ourselves, and caught in the ever-churning current of moral relativism and materialism.

Once, faith was a sturdy lighthouse, its beacon slicing through the darkest fog, guiding generations across uncharted waters. But the tide has turned, churning with a force unseen before. Hymnals gather dust, their melodies drowned out by the cacophony of a

secular world. Pastors, once shepherds of light, grapple with the shadows of relevance, their voices barely audible above the din of a thousand competing philosophies.

Where are the pillars of strength, the voices that once thundered conviction, the hands that reached out with unwavering grace? Where is the sanctuary, the solace, the whisper of redemption in the storm's roar?

Challenges of the African American Community



Within this swirling landscape, the African American community faces a multitude of challenges and solve society's *puzzle of social issues* in order to identify viable, fair-minded, and sustainable solutions.

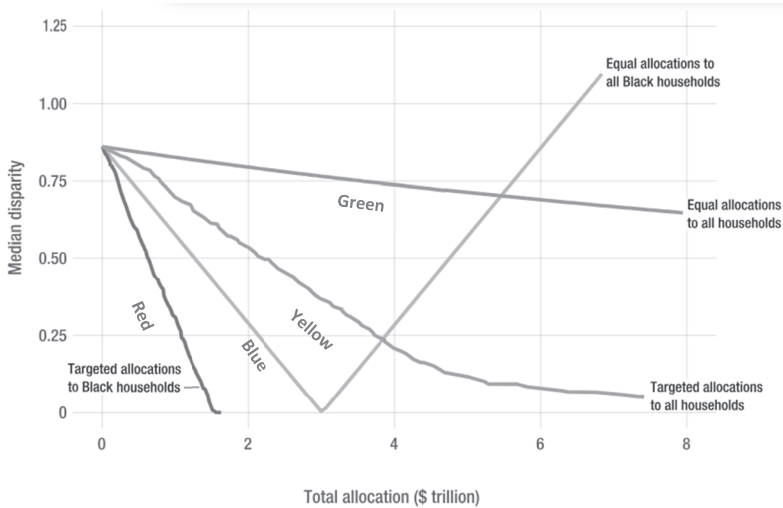
Here are just a few of the most glaring challenges within this paralyzing puzzle.



Widening Economic Disparities.

A recent 2023 Pew Research Center study [see chart below] reveals a staggering wealth gap, with the median white family holding ten times the wealth of the median Black family. This disparity translates into limited opportunities, stifled dreams, and a constant struggle for stability.

Impact of Wealth Allocations on the Median Black-White Wealth Disparity, By Policy



This chart shows how Black-White wealth disparities would change under four scenarios the researchers considered. The blue line shows equal allocations to all Black households, a scenario most similar to proposed reparations policies. It would reduce the median disparity to zero at \$3 trillion; allocations beyond that would reverse the disparity, as shown in the chart. The red line shows a more-targeted allocation to Black households based on need. The yellow and green lines show allocations to all households, regardless of race. One example would be baby bonds given to all newborn children (or targeted to all children below a certain wealth threshold).

Family Structure.

The lack of robust support networks leaves many families teetering on the edge. In 2021, the Brookings Institution reported that 61% of Black

children were raised in households by a single parent, compared to 20% of white children. This absence of a two-parent structure often leads to increased poverty, lower educational attainment, and higher incidences of behavioral problems.

Political Disenfranchisement.



The feeling of limited influence over governing institutions festers. A 2022 Brennan Center for Justice report found that Black voters face a disproportionate share of voting restrictions, with states adopting measures like voter ID laws and reduced polling locations that hinder their ability to exercise their fundamental right.

Social Media's Grip.



Social Media's pervasive influence, across all ages, poses significant emotional challenges. A 2020 Kaiser Family Foundation study found that Black teens spend significantly more time on social media than their white counterparts, exacerbating anxieties and depression, particularly among girls.

Educational Hurdles.



Affordability, access, and the quality of education remain significant barriers. A 2022 Education Trust report revealed that Black students are 3.5 times more likely than white students to attend underfunded schools, perpetuating a deep and continuing cycle of educational disadvantage.

Housing Injustices.



Systemic biases still continue to haunt and plague financing, appraisals and ownership. For example, a 2021 Urban Institute study found that Black homeowners are denied mortgages at a rate two times higher than white homeowners, even when controlling for factors such as family income and credit score.

Family Fragmentation.



Divorce, single parenthood, and grandparent-led households are on the rise. A 2023 Census Bureau report showed that 64% of Black children have lived in a single-parent household at some point in their lives, compared to 28% of white children. This instability can negatively impact children's emotional well-being, and academic performance.

Moral Shifts.



Moral shifts fueled by consumerism, materialism, and secularism threaten community cohesion and breed individualism. A 2022 Pew Research Center survey found that only 45% of Black adults identify as religiously affiliated, down from 84% in 1990. This decline in religious participation can weaken social bonds and erode a sense of shared purpose.

The Church at the Crossroads



Amidst these challenges, the church, once a haven and a pillar of the African American community, finds itself at a crossroads. The statistics paint a stark picture of its decline.

Here are some of the driving factors.



Shrinking Congregations.

Carey Nieuwhof's research shows that the median congregation size in the United States has shrunk dramatically, from 135 in 2000 to just 60 in 2023. Online attendance does offer a slight bump, but the downward trend is undeniable.

Fading Relevance.



A 2022 Gallup poll found that only 72% of Americans with a religious affiliation belong to a church, down from 79% in 1998-2000. This most significant decline is particularly pronounced among younger

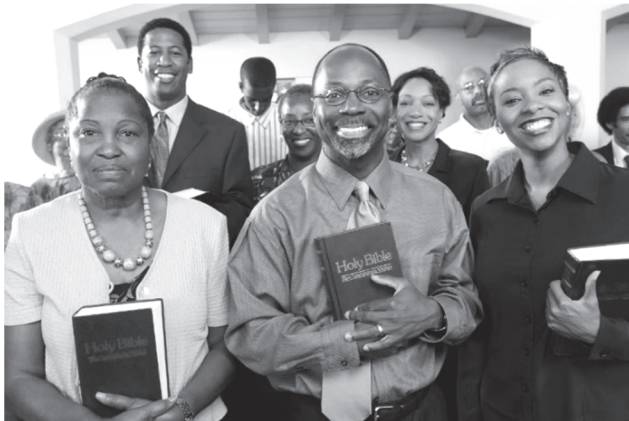
generations, with only 27% of Gen Z identifying as religiously affiliated compared to 56% of Boomers (Pew Research Center).

Financial Woes.



A 2023 National Council of Churches report revealed that unbelievably one in five U.S. churches are seriously facing financial difficulty, struggling to keep their doors open. This financial instability hinders their ability to serve their communities and fund vital programs.

The Call for Revival



This is the crucible in which we, as African American pastors, and community leaders, find ourselves. We strive to strengthen a community besieged by challenges while simultaneously reviving an institution facing its own existential crisis. The data on church decline, especially acute within the African American community, paints a grim picture. Regardless of the denomination or the location, church attendance, resources, participation and capacity have plummeted.

We stand at a crossroads, an institution besieged by obstacles yet desperately clinging to relevance. In the face of such daunting odds, one could easily succumb to despair.

But like Isaiah, we gaze upon the barren landscape, envisioning what could be, asking ourselves: *“Can these bones live again?”*

I believe the answer to this question is “yes.” Here are three actions that could lead the way.



1. Rekindle the Fire.

Revival is our only hope for lasting relevance and survival. We need a fresh wave of the Holy Spirit, an anointing that transforms us into fearless champions of the Gospel,

eternal optimists, and unwavering advocates for God’s transformative power. This revival won’t come through ignoring our current realities. It demands bold preaching, inspiring teaching, and a call to action that compels our members to offer God their best service.



2. Reconnect with Community.

Revival necessitates the reconnecting with the communities we serve. We must tailor our programs and ministries to address their specific spiritual and temporal needs. The church must be a beacon of love,

peace, integrity, and safety – a place where souls can find solace and work out their salvation.



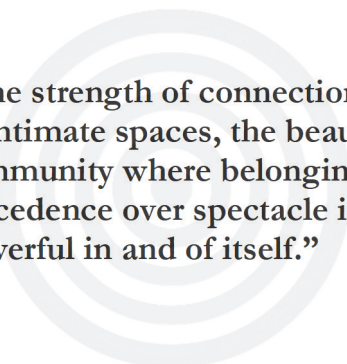
3. Revitalize our Facilities.

We must revitalize our physical spaces, transforming them into welcoming, functional, and inspiring sanctuaries that beckon people in – not just on Sundays, but throughout the week. Most of the Black community today experiences vibrant architecture and welcoming spaces in all walks of their life. They yearn to worship in environments that mirror their dedication to progress and their pursuit of personal and spiritual fulfillment. To welcome a new generation of faith, we must revitalize our facilities. Not just as houses of worship, but as hubs of fellowship, engagement, and accessibility built for the ministry of today.

This book is my attempt to offer answers and perspectives on ministry, gleaned from my journeys as an itinerant preacher. It's not a definitive solution, but rather an invitation to re-examine what it means to do ministry. Whether pastor or layperson, we are all engaged in this sacred work. Our understanding of ourselves and the church's purpose will determine how we approach this task.

My hope is that this book will spark a self-evaluation, prompting us to redefine who we are and what we offer to the communities we serve. The more we engage in this dialogue, both locally and beyond, the better equipped we'll be to foster the change we desire and bring about a true revival.

Together, let us rise to the challenges, rekindle the flames of faith, and watch the bones live again.

INTRODUCTION

PASTOR'S JOURNEY INTO THE HEART OF THE FAMILY CHURCH



The catalyst for this book, the foundation of my ministry, isn't etched in stone or enshrined in a grand theological treatise. It emerges from a seemingly simple conversation, a casual remark from my mentor, a man who shepherded a fledgling church into a beacon within our denomination. As we discussed our ministries, sharing the triumphs and tribulations of life in the pulpit, his words landed with a surprising weight: *"You pastor a family church."*

Initially, a tinge of confusion clouded my mind. Was this an offhand comment, or casual observation? Or perhaps, was somewhere, nestled within those syllables, lurked a subtle critique,

and a gentle nudge towards loftier ambitions? My mentor, however, was far removed from the realm and depth of veiled pronouncements. Our bond, forged in years of shared laughter and theological wrestling, assured me his words emanated from a pure source – a keen eye for the essence of things.

Days, then weeks, then months unfolded, and his statement continued to resonate within me. Had I, in my quest for growth, strayed from the fundamental nature of this place I served? Was this label, *Family Church*, a badge of limitation or a hidden gem waiting to be unearthed? This seemingly incidental remark became a koan, a constant meditation that nudged me towards a deeper understanding of ministry, my congregation, and ultimately, myself.

To truly grasp the power of this revelation, we must first navigate the murky waters of classification. Researchers, ever eager to quantify spiritual experience, have devised various systems to categorize churches based on size. The National Council of Churches, while lacking a universal system, might label yours as “large” if a thousand souls grace your pews, “medium” if a few hundred gather, and “small” if your community hums with less than two hundred and fifty. Others, like Hartford Institute for Religion Research, paint broader strokes, defining megachurches by the thousands they draw, large churches by the hundreds, and medium churches by the tens.

However, as I delved into these classifications, a curious reality began to glimmer. Regardless of the chosen yardstick, most churches in the US fall within the medium to small range. The Hartford Institute reports that over 90% of Protestant churches boast less than 500 attendees, while Lifeway Research, in their insightful 2020 FACT study, reveals that a staggering seven out of ten U.S. churches see less than a hundred souls gather for weekly

worship. These statistics painted a different picture, one where *family church* wasn't the exception but was the rule.

This concept of *Family Church* wasn't merely a size designation, but a vision of something deeper, a murmur of intimacy that transcended numbers. Arlin Rothauge, another voice in this ongoing conversation, offered a fascinating perspective. He argued that program success depended on the unique dynamics of each congregation, and the most potent predictor of these dynamics is *size*. His primary focus, as I understood it, lay in uncovering the intricate dance between a church's character and its interaction with both its members and the broader community. Rothauge, while using similar size descriptors, primarily concerned himself with the connection between size and operation. He contended that churches of certain sizes offered distinct experiences, catering to specific needs within the greater community, their programming shaped by their very stature.

Yet, as I dug deeper, another truth emerged. *Family Church* wasn't a neatly defined box, but a kaleidoscope of interpretations. It could shimmer with the promise of programs tailored to children, their laughter echoing through the halls. Or it could pulse with the warmth of intergenerational connection, where grandparents and grandchildren sat shoulder to shoulder, reciting stories and sharing faith. For some, it embodied the spirit of their denomination, the values and structures passed down through generations, finding fertile ground in this intimate setting. And for others, it might simply be a matter of size – a cozy haven compared to sprawling megachurches, a place where faces were familiar and greetings were personal.

This inherent ambiguity, I realized, wasn't a weakness, but a strength. It allowed for churches of all shapes and sizes to embrace the essence of "family" without being confined by rigid definitions. It offered a space for the organic flourishing of community, where

connections blossomed not from forced programs or imposed structures, but from the fertile ground of shared faith and genuine human connection.

However, within this ambiguity lurked a danger. As long as a disconnect existed between our perception of ourselves and who we truly were, we risked losing sight of our unique strengths, our inherent value. When a family church yearns to mimic the megachurch, it unwittingly abandons the intimate, venturing into a space it's neither equipped for nor meant to occupy. This pursuit of bigness often overlooks the quiet power of smallness, the strength of connection forged in intimate spaces, the beauty of a community where belonging takes precedence.

The **strength of connection** forged in intimate spaces, the beauty of a community where belonging takes precedence over spectacle is powerful in and of itself. It's like neglecting a delicate wildflower garden for the allure of a manicured lawn, sacrificing the vibrant, diverse ecosystem for a uniform expanse of green. Instead, embracing **our role** as family churches requires a radical shift in perspective, a conscious decision to celebrate the unique offerings we bring to the world of faith.

Our strength lies not in numbers, but in intimacy. Imagine a bustling marketplace, each stall overflowing with goods. Megachurches are the glittering department stores, offering dazzling displays and a vast array of choices. Family churches, in contrast, are the quaint, tucked-away shops, specializing in handcrafted wares and personalized service. We don't offer the sheer volume of the mass-produced, but the warmth of the hand stitched. Within our walls, names are remembered, stories are shared, and burdens are lifted, one soul at a time. We prioritize depth over breadth, fostering bonds that go beyond Sunday greetings, extending into shared meals, communal prayers, and a constant presence in times of need.

Our value lies not in programs, but in presence. The allure of big-box ministry often lies in its organized efficiency, its streamlined programs catering to every conceivable need. Family churches, however, offer a different kind of value. We prioritize presence over programming, recognizing that the most transformative moments often arise not from scripted activities, but from the spontaneous encounters, the shared laughter over coffee, the quiet words of comfort offered between pews. In our smaller communities, the pastor isn't just a distant figure on a stage, but a familiar face, a shepherd who knows his flock, tending to their individual needs with patient attentiveness.

Our uniqueness lies not in size, but in spirit. Size may be a convenient metric, but it fails to capture the essence of a family church. At our core, we are not defined by the number of chairs in our sanctuary, but by the shared spirit that animates them. We are the church where everyone knows your name, where the door is always open, and where a helping hand is never far away. We are the church where children's laughter mingles with the wisdom of elders, where tears are not judged, and where vulnerability finds a safe haven. We are the church where faith isn't merely professed, but embodied in everyday acts of kindness, compassion, and service.

This unique spirit resonates deeply with a segment of the population yearning for authentic connection, for genuine community, for a place where they are seen and heard, not as numbers on a spreadsheet, but as individuals woven into the fabric of something larger than themselves. This is the niche family churches excel in, the space where we have a competitive advantage, the market we are uniquely positioned to serve.

success is often measured in celebrity status and megachurch empires, can we, as shepherds of smaller flocks, find fulfillment in tending to our intimate gardens? Can we draw our self-worth not from the size of our budget or the breadth of our programs, but from the depth of our connections, the authenticity of our presence, and the transformative power of the gospel lived out in everyday moments?

This is the challenge and the privilege of leading a family church. It is not a path for the faint of heart, but it is a path brimming with meaning, purpose, and an unparalleled potential for impact. It is a call to cultivate fertile ground for genuine community, to celebrate the quiet power of intimacy, and to offer a haven of belonging in a world often defined by isolation and anonymity.

This book is an invitation to explore this calling, to delve into the heart of the family church, to uncover its hidden gems, and to challenge the misconceptions that hold it back. BLUEPRINT FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY

But this familial bond isn't merely sentimental. It translates into action, guided by the principles laid out in Scripture. Ephesians 4:1-6 (NLT) beautifully outlines the blueprint for living in unity:

“As a prisoner for the Lord, then, I urge you to live a life worthy of the calling you have received. Be completely humble and gentle; be patient, bearing one another in love. Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace. For there is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to one hope when you were called. One Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all.”

This passage lays bare the foundation for genuine Christian community. Humility, gentleness, patience, love, and unity, bound together by the “bond of peace,” the very peace offered by Christ himself. Within the family church, this isn't merely an aspiration, but a lived reality. All these are the work of one and the same Spirit, and he distributes them to each one just as he determines.”

Christ’s first miracle wasn’t a grand spectacle, but a quiet blessing at a wedding feast. Let’s revisit John 2:1-3 (NLT):

“On the third day there was a wedding celebration in the village of Cana in Galilee. Jesus’ mother was there, 2 and Jesus and his disciples were also invited to the celebration. 3 The wine supply ran out during the festivities, so Jesus’ mother told him, They have no more wine.”

In these verses, a seemingly mundane event – a wedding celebration running short on wine – sets the stage for a momentous act. Notice how subtly Jesus enters the scene, invited amidst family and friends. His first miracle isn’t performed on a grand platform, but within the ordinary occurrences of life, amidst laughter and celebration. This deliberate setting holds a profound truth: God’s miracles unfold not just in dramatic pronouncements, but in the very fabric of our lives, especially when woven with threads of faith and shared joy.

The family church embraces this truth, becoming a haven where life's moments, big and small, are intertwined into a sacred symphony. Here, marriages are blessed, vows recited in the presence of loved ones, a family united under the banner of faith. Baptism becomes a joyous initiation, welcoming newborns into the embrace of God's community. Birthdays bloom with laughter and shared memories, reminding us of the gift of life itself. Anniversaries recall tales of love's endurance, a testament to the power of commitment. Retirements mark the culmination of dedicated work, celebrated with gratitude and well wishes. Graduations become beacons of hope, launching young lives into the world with the blessings of community. Baby showers echo with anticipation, as a new life prepares to join the community of faith.

In each gathering, a miracle unfolds. Not always a spectacle, but a subtle dance of God's grace woven into the fabric of our lives. Laughter shared strengthens bonds, stories exchanged deepen understanding, and tears shed together bind hearts in empathy. These seemingly ordinary moments become mosaics of divine intervention, drawing us closer to one another and to God.

The family church is the canvas upon which these miracles are painted. It's the gathering place where life's celebrations resonate with faith, where milestones become steppingstones on our shared journey. 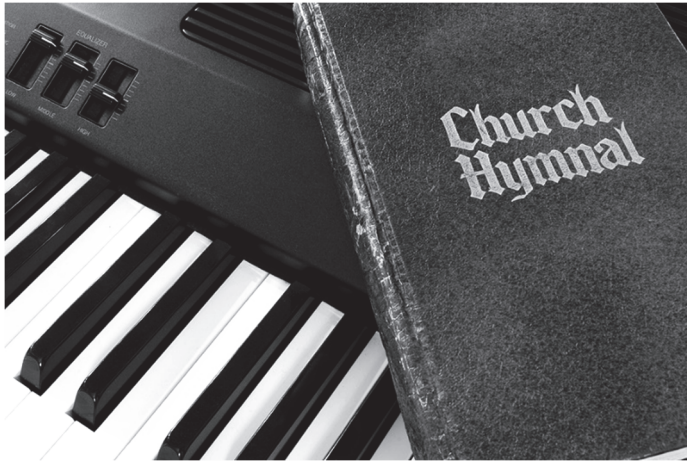

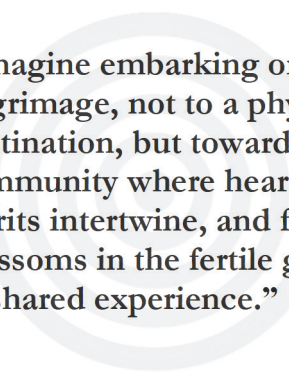

A Family Church Blossoms in a Mega-Church Era



A BUMPY START

Fourteen years ago, when I arrived at Christ our Redeemer, I encountered a church in crisis. What had been a strong and vibrant ministry since its founding was teetering on the brink of collapse. This wasn't the result of wrongdoing but the aftermath of a painful separation, akin to a marital dissolution. The long-term pastor, the church's founder, had been unexpectedly moved on. Though a shroud of confusion and anger clouded the details, one thing was clear: *the people were hurting*.

Following this beloved and long-serving leader might have been the prudent path. However, during the interim period,

another pastor came and stayed for a mere two weeks. This deepened the wound. It wasn't just the loss of a friend, leader, and familiar face; it was the sting of rejection. To be abandoned after this much investment, after overcoming adversity and establishing themselves within the community, was a bitter pill to swallow.

Adding to the shock was the news that the church was financially strapped. Despite past generosity and successful ministry, they were running on fumes. The internal turmoil led to conflict, departures of key members, and a desperate struggle to keep the doors open. The needs of the facility itself, ever-present in any church, compounded the challenges.

Further complicating matters, I was an outsider brought in from beyond the conference and district. Unaware of their hardships, I arrived at a crossroads with a congregation reeling from loss and uncertainty. Though the opportunity presented itself to reassign me elsewhere, I felt called to stay. The thought of this faithful community suffering another abandonment in such a short time fueled my resolve. So, I committed myself to mending their hearts, minds, and souls.

Those early days were indeed difficult, but also a period of immense personal and spiritual growth. I commuted every weekend from Huntsville, Alabama, with my young children, a seven hour each way journey for four years. This commitment forced me to hone my preaching and deepen my understanding of what truly makes a church "*church*."

There was an unspoken undercurrent at Christ our Redeemer. They would talk about being a loving church, about the strong youth ministry and dedicated elders, but they couldn't quite articulate what it meant. They reminisced about past members and a more vibrant era, hinting at a yearning for something intangible.

As I examined the various programs and ministries, I saw potential for growth but also recognized a breadth that stretched the church's resources thin. Yet, amidst the programs, a few stood out like the monthly birthday cards and senior medicine contributions. These seemingly simple programs resonated with something deeper, a desire for connection and care. Initially, I overlooked their significance too, but upon reflection, something began to crystallize. It wasn't the flashy programs that were the lifeblood of this church, but the quiet gestures of love and support.

In its early days, Christ our Redeemer thrived under the founding pastor's masterful balancing act. He wove together the warmth of a family church with the welcoming arms of a commuter haven, satisfying both desires through diverse programs and an inclusive spirit. It was a perfect recipe for success at the time. However, when I arrived years later, the landscape had shifted dramatically. Mega-churches, like imposing fortresses, had sprouted up around us, casting long shadows across the community. Smaller churches, desperate to echo their grandeur, mimicked the spectacle.

Faced with this evolving terrain, I made a bold choice: we would not chase trends or build a mini megalopolis. We would double down on what made us true – *a sanctuary of family, where faith intertwined with kinship*. It was a risky move, perhaps even foolish in the face of such overwhelming grandeur. Yet, as families blossomed, children found new friends, and seniors reveled in renewed belonging, my conviction only strengthened. Choosing the path of a family church wasn't easy, but the rewards were immeasurable.

BUILDING THE FAMILY CHURCH



Once I grasped the identity and desires of the church, the path ahead became clear. The hardship of my early ministry began to fade. We paid off the mortgage, stabilized membership, and focused on the ministries that would shape our future. My vision was clear: *a church built on faith, family, and fellowship.*

We implemented weekly attendance tracking, followed up with absent members, and structured the calendar around events fostering connection. We consolidated programs to encourage shared activities and eliminated isolated afternoon programs, making worship service the hub of celebrating ministries and holding annual “days.”

Youth programs became family affairs, incorporating Bible study with praise dancing, African drumming, and music tutoring. Every open door was an invitation to fellowship. We reduced standalone programs, opting for combined offerings to maximize participation. Slowly, through trial and error, we refined our approach, prioritizing fellowship not just on Sundays, but

throughout the entire week. Birthdays, anniversaries, and holidays became communal celebrations, transforming the church into a haven for families to grow together spiritually and find like-minded friends.

Building and maintaining a family church was arduous but incredibly rewarding. Walking into Sunday morning and seeing believers of all ages, eager and excited to be in God's house, brought immense joy. This place wasn't just about attending services; it was about inviting friends and experiencing a vibrant spiritual and social community.

We embraced faith and understood family to a degree, but fellowship was often undervalued. The need to connect with those who care, to be accepted and loved, to find joy in the company of like-minded individuals – this is an essential element of Christian faith. It's how we find mentors, support, and strength to navigate life's journey. The church must be a space where believers connect and cultivate meaningful relationships.

Those who drifted away in the early days were mourned, but many more arrived. While I lament those who found their paths elsewhere, I believe every believer seeks something specific, and a church specializing in one niche might not cater to all needs. For those seeking the commuter experience, soaring worship, or hurried connections, other churches exist within the community. They fill their unique niche. However, for those yearning for the warmth and intimacy of a family church, Christ our Redeemer became a haven. We weren't striving to be ubiquitous or trendy; we embraced our distinct calling.

Building a family church wasn't without challenges. Some questioned our focus, yearning for past programs or grander productions. Some felt the shift too drastic, missing the anonymity of a larger congregation. But amidst the anxieties, a quiet

transformation unfolded. Families blossomed, children found new friends, and seniors reveled in the renewed sense of belonging. The church walls buzzed with life, not just on Sundays, but throughout the week. Laughter echoed from game nights, support circles offered solace, and shared meals fostered deep connections.

In a world often characterized by loneliness and isolation, we offer a beacon of hope, a reminder that belonging, acceptance, and love are cornerstones of the Christian faith. Christ our Redeemer may not be the grandest cathedral, but within its walls, a living testimony unfolds. We are a testament to the power of faith, the nurturing embrace of family, and the transformative energy of genuine fellowship.

CHAPTER SIX

TRANSFORMATIONAL SERMONS More Than Memories: Rekindling the Family Church Vision



Leviticus 6:8-13 (NLT)

⁸ *Then the LORD said to Moses,*

⁹ *"Give Aaron and his sons the following instructions regarding the burnt offering. The burnt offering must be left on top of the altar until the next morning, and the fire on the altar must be kept burning all night.*

¹⁰ *In the morning, after the priest on duty has put on his official linen clothing and linen undergarments, he must clean out the ashes of the burnt offering and put them beside the altar.*

¹¹ *Then he must take off these garments, change back into his regular*

clothes, and carry the ashes outside the camp to a place that is ceremonially clean.

¹² Meanwhile, the fire on the altar must be kept burning; it must never go out. Each morning the priest will add fresh wood to the fire and arrange the burnt offering on it. He will then burn the fat of the peace offerings on it.

¹³ Remember, the fire must be kept burning on the altar at all times. It must never go out.

INTRODUCTION

The Day of Pentecost was a fiery baptism, the Holy Spirit descending upon the church like tongues of flame. This image resonated deeply with the Jewish people, for throughout their history, fire had been a potent symbol of God's power and presence. They had witnessed it flicker in the burning bush that spoke to Moses, rise like smoke from the fiery summit of Mount Sinai, and guide them through the wilderness as a pillar of light. They had seen Elijah command fire from heaven to vanquish the prophets of Baal, and witnessed its miraculous descent to consume the temple offering upon its completion.

This was the fire that the temple priests meticulously nurtured, ensuring its perpetual blaze through the night to prepare for the morning sacrifice. It was a living symbol of God's ceaseless presence amidst His people. And now, that same fire burns not just in stone temples, but within the very hearts of every Christian.

The care and attentiveness with which the priests tended the temple fire offers a lesson for us all. We, too, must nurture the spiritual fire that fuels our ministry and imbues our actions with holy power. We must be wary of churches where the embers have lost their glow, where choirs lack fervor and pews sit tepid. I've seen those churches, felt the chilling absence of passion, and as a pastor, I know the temptation to simply walk away.

But fire is a force that ignites, that compels us to run with an unseen wind at our backs, dance to an unheard rhythm, and raise our voices when silence reigns. It's the spark that propels us to choose right when tempted to stray, the force that crackles within us when the Holy Spirit takes hold. It's like fire shut up in our bones, a consuming energy that drives us to serve, to love, and to share the unwavering light of faith.

This is the fire we must tend, fanning its flames and ensuring its radiance. And it all starts with remembering, with actively stoking the embers within us so that their glow may illuminate the world around us.

❖ POINT 1: WORKING THE FIRE

The temple priest wasn't just a fire starter; he was a fire artist. Once the evening sacrifice blazed, his job became a delicate dance of maintaining the flames without adding more fuel. He'd fan the embers, gently coaxing them to lick higher, and expertly stir the coals, ensuring even heat throughout. This intricate process held a profound lesson: sometimes, the solution to our problems isn't more resources, but working with what we have, igniting the existing passion and enthusiasm.

I used to think a church needed more people, more money, a bigger building to truly thrive. But then I understood the priest's quiet power. Without fanfare, he kept the fire alive, and in its warmth, everything blossomed. Passion? It's the fuel that makes the impossible seem possible. Witnessing it was like hearing the same story of Jesus' sacrifice every Sunday, but through fresh eyes. Each preacher, in their own way, fanned the flames, reminding us of the transformative power within the fire – the power to save, heal, forgive, and bless.

This truth resonates beyond the pulpit. The hymns we sing, the stories we share, the acts of kindness we perform – all these are embers we tend, waiting for the moment they erupt into blazing love for Jesus and His grace. People don't crave endless fundraisers; they hunger for the embers of faith to be fanned, for reminders that they met the Man from Galilee, that the balm of Gilead still soothes, and that Jesus' love remains the one constant friend in this ever-changing world.

❖ POINT 2: TAKE OUT THE ASHES

The temple fire demanded not just tending, but cleaning. The priest's duty wasn't merely to keep the flames dancing, but to clear the altar of ashes, ensuring they didn't smother the life-giving blaze. This carries a profound lesson for us: we too must learn to navigate the delicate dance between respecting the past and embracing renewal.

Yesterday's victories, like treasured ashes, deserve reverence. But clinging to them can't fuel today's fire. We must find the sacred balance, the sweet spot where past wisdom informs our journey without becoming fossilized burdens. Sometimes, our attachment to the ashes can choke the present, like the boy mourning his goldfish, unable to move on and let new life bloom.

I am reminded of a man in the back yard one day. As he peered over his fence and spotted his neighbor's little boy digging a hole in the backyard, tears streaming down his face with each shovelful. Concerned, the man called out, "*What are you doing there, young man?*" The boy sniffled, "*My goldfish died, the one I loved dearly, and I'm burying him.*" The man chuckled, "*That's an awfully big hole for a goldfish, isn't it?*" The boy wiped his eyes, patted down the final mound of dirt, and declared, "*That's because he's still inside your cat!*"

This can happen when churches become museums of past glories, clinging to outdated methods instead of adapting to the ever-changing needs of a new generation. Jesus himself said, "*No one puts new wine into old wineskins; otherwise, the wineskins burst, and the wine is spilled, and the wineskins are ruined. But new wine must be put into new wineskins.*"

Letting go of the ashes doesn't mean forgetting history; it means understanding that God isn't confined to yesterday's embers. He is the ever-flowing fire, constantly evolving, blazing with boundless potential. Programs, music, technology – these are mere vessels, and like the wineskins, they must adjust to accommodate the ever-fresh outpouring of His grace.

People don't come to church seeking yesterday's ashes; they crave the warmth of the living fire. They yearn to know that the Lord remains a healer, a savior, a miracle worker, a shelter in the storm. They come to feel the presence of that "*wheel in the midst of a wheel,*" that unyielding rock in a weary land.

So, let us be wise stewards of the fire, respecting the embers of the past while fanning the flames of the future. Let us embrace the dynamism of faith, knowing that God's story isn't confined to dusty pages but unfolds with each new sunrise, each whispered prayer, each act of love. We are not caretakers of a museum; we

are stokers of a fire, and its radiance depends on our willingness to embrace both the ashes and the flames.

CONCLUSION: STIR IT

We all know the sting of a disappointing conference, the hollow echoes of empty pews, and the whispered anxieties that creep in when the only faces filling the church are the same unwavering few. We travel miles, invest hope, and pour prayers into building a flame, only to sometimes feel like it's sputtering its last. What then, when doubts whisper about the church's future, when Sunday mornings turn into a monotonous parade of familiarity, and passion seems almost gone?

I am reminded of a little boy who'd been begging his dad for a camping trip for years. But Dad was always traveling, never having time.

Then, one Saturday morning, Dad's boss called about a scheduling mistake — he had the weekend off! It was ecstasy, not just for the break, but because it was the boy's birthday. So, they packed the car, the boy's whoops echoing through the air, and they were off to the campsite.

They fished, hunted, and collected rocks. At night, they sat around the crackling campfire, stories weaving between them like smoke, marshmallows melting into gooey perfection.

Morning arrived too soon, the fading embers carrying a bittersweet scent. The boy, heart heavy with the thought of leaving, wandered to the campfire's remains. In a silent outburst of melancholy, he began flinging his collected treasures, rock by rock. One sharp stone, misdirected by grief, ricocheted off a charred log. Bark exploded, revealing a vibrant heart of fire beneath. Sizzling embers scattered, and the boy stumbled back, startled by the

sudden heat. His Dad's voice, sharp with concern, cut through the air: "*Be careful!*"

It looks like the fire is out, but if you stir it, it will burn again.

When the flames flicker and doubts arise, remember this: *Preach Jesus. Preach his miracles, not as dusty lore, but as embers ready to blaze. Preach his parables, not as riddles to solve, but as windows to His grace.*

Preach his transfiguration, not as a spectacle, but as a glimpse of glory to come. Preach his crucifixion, not as morbid tale, but as the bridge to boundless love. Preach his resurrection, not as distant echo, but as hope that conquers darkness. Preach his ascension, not as farewell, but as promise: He walks with us still. When you have preached all this start over again. Stir the fire, friends. Work the embers, fan the flames.

For when we preach Jesus, not as fading memory, but as ever-present light, the fire within us, and within our churches, will never truly die. It will crackle, it will dance, it will illuminate the path forward, generation after generation.

INTRODUCTION

After a holiday feast or any big celebration, you know what I love? Leftovers. Those last bits of the good stuff, sitting there on the plate. But sometimes, there's just enough to make you miss the party all over again, without quite filling you up. Those scattered bites spark nostalgia, like faded photographs of happy faces around the table. But their dwindling portions hold a

hint of melancholy, a reminder that the party's over and the plates soon empty.

This widow, facing debt and the threat of losing her sons, approached Elisha in tears. Her story resonates with many of us. We, too, have felt the sting of scarcity, the nagging worry that our once-sufficient resources just don't stretch far enough. We see it in the fading grandeur of old churches, the echoes of hymns sung by larger choirs, the empty pews where vibrant faith once flourished. Memories of a fuller past remind us of what is missing, leaving us to wonder, *"How did we end up here?"*

But fear not friends! Our scripture offers a beacon of hope in the midst of *leftovers*. Through the widow's story, we discover a path to not just survive, but thrive, even when living on what remains. This is not simply about scraping by and making do; it's about a radical transformation, a multiplication of faith that turns scarcity into abundance. So, let us open our hearts to the wisdom of this ancient tale and discover how, even with seemingly empty flasks, we can fill our lives, and our churches, with a wellspring of hope and renewal.

❖ POINT 1: SURVEY THE HOUSE

Facing down a mountain of debt and the looming threat of losing her sons, the widow stood before Elisha, her spirit as crumpled as the clothes clinging to her frame. Tears blurred the world, and despair whispered its suffocating song in her ear. *"What can I do?"* she cried: her voice raw with helplessness. *"Nothing,"* she sighed, the word heavy like a stone settling in her stomach.

But Elisha, with the gentle wisdom of a prophet who'd seen the ebb and flow of life's tides, wouldn't let her answer stand. *"Tell*

me,” he asked, his gaze unwavering yet kind, “what do you have in your house, anything at all?”

In this wasteland of fear and loss, could there possibly be anything left? She cast her mind back, sifting through the wreckage of her shattered world. Then, a faint memory flickered, as fragile as a butterfly wing. *“Just a flask of oil.”*

It was little, barely enough for one final anointing, a meager echo of her husband's ministry now silenced. Yet, in that humble flask, a spark of hope refused to be extinguished. For even in the ashes of tragedy, God speaking blessings, waiting to be discovered, like treasures buried beneath the rubble. Shifting our focus from lack to abundance unlocks a world of possibilities. Focusing on what we lack blinds us to God's blessings. I recall a conversation between a husband and wife during their hard times.

Wife: *“I’m ashamed of the way we live,”* she said to her lazy husband who wouldn't get a job. *“My father pays our rent, my mother buys all of our food, my sister buys our clothes, my aunt bought us a car. I’m just so ashamed.”* Husband: *“You should be ashamed,”* he said. *“Those two worthless brothers of yours never give us anything!”*

Life has a funny way of making us fixate on what we lack, causing us to overlook the blessings right under our noses. We might yearn for fancy cars and diamond rings, but forget the warmth of the roof over our heads and the comfort of a full belly. Mama used to say, *“Child, you can cry about the hole in your shoe, or you can dance in the sunshine it lets in.”* It's all about perspective, isn't it?

Remember that old church on the hilltop? They couldn't afford a fancy organ, so the carpenter's son beat out a rhythm on a washboard while Mama Mary's hum filled the air. The blacksmith built the pews with his own sweat, and the farmers brought their

harvest to fill the cupboards. They had little, but they made it work, fueled by faith and community. They knew true abundance wasn't about wealth, but about the bonds they shared, the work they did, and the simple joy of a shared meal.

❖ POINT 2: SHUT THE DOOR

Just like the prophet instructed the widow to gather her vessels and shut the door, sometimes the Lord works in quiet, requiring us to close out the din of the world. There's a time for open arms and vibrant conversation, but when God paints His path on our hearts, when He sets our steps on a new journey, it's crucial to slam the door on negativity.

Oh, we can hear them already, the naysayers and gossips, their voices sharp and cutting like rusted blades. *"Why borrow all those pots? You haven't got a morsel to fill them!"* they sneer. *"No money? Leave that crazy prophet alone! Your poor husband, worn out chasing shadows of salvation!"* Their doubts dance a jig on our insecurities, their skepticism a poison seeping into our faith.

But listen closely, for in the hush of closed doors, God often plants the seeds of His greatest miracles. He lets us reach the edge of desperation, strips away the distractions, until we finally stop caring who sees us weep and what they whisper behind cupped hands. It's in that raw vulnerability, when we're down to our very last drop of hope, that we finally turn our weary eyes heavenward and rasp, *"God, it's all yours."*

Oh, believe it, for when we're down to nothing, God is up to something. He's the potter who molds us in the quiet kiln of solitude, crafting vessels of purpose from the clay of our brokenness. He's the alchemist who turns our tears into liquid gold, refining our faith in the crucible of doubt.

So, when life throws its punches, when insomnia paints shadows on your ceiling, don't count sheep – talk to the Shepherd.

Have a little talk with Jesus
tell Him all about our troubles.
(He will) hear our fainted cry
(He will) answer by and by.

Remember, Jesus himself said, *“When you pray, enter into your closet, and when you have shut thy door, pray to your Father who is in the secret place, and your Father who sees in secret will reward you openly.”* So close the door on negativity, open your heart to His presence, and watch as He transforms your emptiness into a vessel overflowing with His grace.

CLOSE: HOW BIG IS YOUR FAITH?

Always remember the widow, clutching the prophet’s word, her mind likely swirling with questions. Why borrow so many pots when her cupboard gaped empty? Everyone knew her plight, the bitterness of debt clinging to her like a shroud. Yet, she obeyed, faith a whispered ember in her heart.

Oh, if she’d held back, borrowed just a few vessels, her blessing would have been a meager trickle. But she cast doubt aside, embracing possibility. And as the oil flowed, surpassing the rim of each borrowed pot, her faith erupted into a roaring flame. *“Fill that vase!”* she cried, *“Bring every mug, every jar, every basin!”* Her trust painted the room with a golden tide, each vessel overflowing, a testament to her unwavering belief.

In the end, that widow not only drowned her debts, but lived a life nourished by the oil’s bounty. God, you see, doesn’t just fill

our needs, He turns our leftovers into abundance. He rewards not the size of our possessions, but the magnitude of our faith.

My son strolled into the living room one day, eyes wide with a question on his mind. *"Dad," he asked, "where's the Tooth Fairy? I left a tooth, but there's no money under my pillow!"* Then, with a glint of suspicion in his gaze, he added, *"Are you the Tooth Fairy?"*

Caught off guard, I chuckled and explained the protocol. *"You let me know when you lose a tooth, and I'll telegram the Tooth Fairy so she can schedule a visit. Just leave your tooth in a bag under the pillow, and It'll be filled with money in the morning!"*

See, children have this remarkable way of taking things literally, unburdened by cynicism or doubt. So, that night, I tiptoed into his room, expecting a small pouch or maybe a plastic snack bag. But guess what I found? A full-blown garbage bag, housing his lost tooth like a trophy in a display case! You see, when I promised a treasure trove of money, his faith envisioned mountains of it, demanding the biggest container he could find. He didn't hold back, didn't limit himself to small expectations. He believed with his whole heart, and that's the point,
