## Child Safety in America Means Turning to Family First: How Men Have Stepped Up as Primary Caregivers

Historically the obligation to care for and to keep safe one's child was deemed a private matter, not subject to government regulation or interference. In 1875 the New York Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children (NYSPCC) was founded, and since then the focus of US child welfare policy has oscillated between removing children from unsafe homes and stressing family preservation. The confusing legal and social services system envelopes grandparents, siblings, aunts and uncles, neighbors and friends from all walks of life. Keeping children with family is indisputably a noble goal. But meeting that child's needs, and the needs of their new families, is the hard part, and the part we have thus far largely failed to rise to.
