elect our leadership. A Church Conference is an open meeting. All members have voice and vote. Our new District Superintendent, Rev. Mike Harrell will preside by Zoom.




What values do we want our celebrations to reflect?



Naloxone Training:

Sunday, November 9th 11:30am

Our community has the highest per capita rate of opioid overdose in the state. Our pastor, Rev. Dr.

Amy Beth Durward, our Lay Leader, Dan Dionne, and Pam Coen have been participating in a program that is training religious leaders in addiction and recovery issues. One step in that program was being trained not only to give naloxone to reverse an opioid overdose, but to take that training back to our congregations.

This training will prepare you to reverse an opioid overdose with naloxone nasal spray. We have free naloxone to distribute. Our hope is that this training is never needed, but that if needed the resources will be there to save a life.

We'll do breakfast for


brunch! French toast casserole, fruit salad and pigs in a blanket.

What do you know about the Methodist Men's organization in the Eureka Methodist

Church?

In the archives we have a certificate of Charter for Methodist Men dated 19 Aug 1947.

From the early 1920's, we have a list of "Methodist Men." The list is undated but the Rev. D.O. Lockwood tops the list. He served Eureka's Methodist Church from 1920-1923. The other men listed were: George F. Phreanor, George W. Watson, J.L. Kennedy, Roy S. Melvin, J.T. Manon, M.B. Hanson (or Hansen), Herbert Christie, Aaron Smith, Arthur M. Smith, Frederick Johnson, W.C. Shuster, Mr. McDermott, B. T. Clark, John Morehead, Wm. McClaskey, L.M. Burnell, J.S. Burnell, Len Blackburn, W. L. Miller, Walter Thomas, J.C. Harrison, W. A. Hepler, and M. W. Stringfield.

We also have a collection of "prayers and sermons" (variously dated late 1960's and through the 1970's) that were delivered at the jail and/or the rescue mission. The notebook they were originally in, was labeled "Methodist Men Sermons." The notebook was also labeled, N.L.O., which may stand for Nile L. Olsen a former member of the church and chair of the trustees. Nile died in Sept. 1987.

The handwritten sermon dated 11 Feb 1968, begins, "We of the Eureka Methodist Church are here this afternoon to share with you some of the Great truths of our Christian Faith." Was this an out-reach of the congregation or a project of the Methodist Men? Who participated?

Denomination-wide there were Methodist Men's groups of various kinds in America from 1898. The earliest group being the Methodist Brotherhood. For many decades "Brotherhoods" going by a variety of names spread across the M.E. church and the denominations that would in time unite with the M.E. Church.

Methodist Men as a group emerged in the early 1940's. In 1968, after unification with the Evangelical United Brethren, men's groups changed their names to United Methodist Men.

Over the years, Methodist Men's groups were more often identified with their sponsored projects.

Most widely was their sponsorship of scouting ministries. Less widely remembered is their sponsorship of the Methodist Layman, (a precursor of the Together magazine founded in 1962) which began in the 1920's and the Methodist Men's Radio Hour which began in 1952. Though the Methodist Men's Radio Hour no longer exists, it would give rise to a number of independent evangelistic radio and internet outreaches (mostly originating in the southern conferences of the Methodist Church) but designed for a global audience.

The archives would love to have more information on First Church's connections to United Methodist Men. What can you add to what we know.

What is a "CLM"?

In some recent conversations, several people have voiced some confusion about just what my role as a "CLM" actually means. And I realized that the questions make very good sense. This congregation has never had a CLM assigned until me, so has no expectations, and that is confounded by my wider role within the North Coast Circuit.

Let's start with definitions. A CLM is a Certified Lay Minister within the United Methodist Church. There are many of us—four now within our Circuit of six churches—and the number is growing in our Annual Conference every year. But what does it mean to be a "Certified Lay Minister"? That gets really confusing, because, being Methodists, we have a lot of labels for a lot of different roles, and those labels often change. For example, I became a Lay Speaker over 30 years ago, a Certified Lay Speaker 16 years ago, was "transitioned" to become a Certified Lay Servant about 10 years ago, became a Trained Lay Minister five years ago, and am now a Certified Lay Minister.

The difference between Lay Speaker/Servant and Lay Minister is training and commitment. A Lay Minister does 100 hours of coursework, the equivalent of several college classes, that teach the range of duties and responsibilities of running a church. When the training is completed, we are judged to be duly ready to take on running a church or other critical duties. The District Superintendent then looks for a suitable role for the candidate. Upon appointment at Annual Conference, the role is committed, and the Lay Minister becomes a Certified Lay Minister.

The traditional role for a CLM is to take on a church that, for financial or other reasons, is unable to support an ordained pastor, or one where no suitable pastor can be found. These tend to be small churches in isolated places. Without CLMs, there would be no one to run these small but vital churches.

That's the traditional role—but not mine. Figuring out what to do with me when I became a Lay Minister caused a

lot of head-scratching. Eureka has a full-time pastor, so didn't need me to step into that role. Nor was I anxious to take on a full-time church role somewhere else, having just retired from a demanding career.

So they decided, in a burst of insanity or inspiration (time will tell!), to assign me to all six churches in the North Coast circuit. In order from south to north, those churches are Fortuna, Eureka, Arcata, McKinleyville, Crescent City, and Smith River. But what do I actually do with these churches?

The obvious part is preaching. If a pastor needs to take a weekend away from their church, they can ask me to step in, and I will certainly do so if I'm available. These calls are fewer than you might expect, only one or possibly two a month.

Another part of the job is helping to connect our circuit pastors so we can share ideas and experiences; my role in that is as "Circuit Secretary" to help with meetings, agendas, and resources.

The rest of the job is whatever we—me, the pastors, and the congregations—make of it. This is new territory for all of us. What that means for Eureka First, which is my home church as well as one of the churches to which I'm assigned, is that I am here to fill needs. So if there's something you need, just ask!
