



COMMUNITY HEALTH APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAM

The Chicago House Community Health Apprenticeship Program is a hands-on training and certification program to assist young people from communities most affected by HIV to start their careers as community health workers in the HIV field, providing education, testing, supportive services, prevention and care.

Cohorts occur roughly every three months. People interested in applying are encouraged to contact us at any time, and we will keep your information and contact you during the next recruitment. Participants will be expected to commit around 15 hours a week to the program with some optional weekend and evening hours.

Our 6-week training will explore:

- HIV and STI 101 and HIV testing techniques
- Counseling strategies around HIV testing and referrals
- Social determinants of health, or how one's communities and identities affect their access to health
- Working with the diverse communities affected by HIV
- Advocacy for clients, services and policy
- How to perform outreach in communities and to individuals

Those who participate in the program will be offered:

- Monthly Ventra Cards OR Gas Cards, and a weekly stipend of \$100
- An HIV Counseling, Testing and Referral Certification from the Chicago Department of Public Health
- One-on-one support in weekly meetings with the program supervisors
- Career services to help find a job in the fields of HIV and community health
- Ongoing support provided for six months post-employment

Eligibility:

- Ages 18-34
- Black and/or Latinx
- Gay, Bisexual, Lesbian, Transgender and/or Gender Nonconforming identified
- High School Diploma or GED
- Interested in starting a career in HIV and community health
