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How Parents Help Students

"My mom would always be cheering me on whenever I felt that I wanted to give up." - Martha




"My parents always encouraged me to never give up and continue learning as hard as it was." **- Ana**




1. Encouraging & Praising

Parents described the importance of education to students in order to be successful in the future. Students found motivation from their parents' excitement to continue their classes.




"Obtaining a higher education was something that was instilled in me since I was very young." -Selena

"I realized from a very young age that my parents sacrificed a great deal so that my sister and I could get an education and so that we could have opportunities that they never had."


"I learned to appreciate their actions from a very young age. I decided that the best thing I could do to repay them was to do the best that I could in school." -Lesly

7. Role Modeling

Students fondly remembered how their parents introduced and showed them the value of a given career. As a result, students saw their parents as role models who set the example for them to go into a certain career path.

"Growing up, I always wondered how my father was capable of fixing and constructing things. As a young girl, my father took me to a construction site where he was building a house. On this day, my curiosity grew for understanding how to build and take things apart." -Maribel



"My parents both started work early and ended late, I remember most of middle school and high school they would have to drop me off as early as 6:30 AM just so they could make it to work and I wouldn't be picked up till after 5PM...Seeing all the trouble and effort they were going through to provide for my brother and I is what really motivated me to work hard in school so I could go to college in the future."
