
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Opening Might

The Asinabka Festival aims to highlight works that examine Indigenous issues and topics, to support media artists and filmmakers, and to promote Indigenous cultures and languages.

The Festival seeks to educate people about First Nations, Métis, and Inuit issues in Canada, and about Indigenous issues internationally. The Festival also provide an entertaining and innovative space where Indigenous peoples can tell their own stories and see their own cultures reflected back at them.

But when her father returns from a long stint in prison and her drug money goes missing, Aila's world is turned upside down and she must defend herself – and her crew – from the ruthless Popper. Set against the stark and brutal backdrop of Canada's residential school system, Barnaby crafts a landmark film that strikes first, challenges conventions and takes no prisoners.

The title for this Art Exhibition "Noongwa (Now/Today)" is based upon an Anishinabemowin (Ojibwa) word meaning "Now or "Today". The curatorial theme of this exhibition celebrates and examines the work that is being created by Indigenous peoples that often traverse between the space of the urban and rural, in a literal sense, but also in a figurative sense through connections and ties to their traditional lands, cultures, and communities. Through these artists' works as well as their many contemporaries, hip-hop culture is turned into a vehicle for self-determination, decolonization, the embracing of Indigenous cultural identities, and challenging the sexism, racism, and homophobia that exists in society.





A personal reflection on how depression takes over ones life and the journey to get out of it.




Flooding Hope

"Nogojiwanong" is the original Anishinaabe name for what has become the city of Peterborough, Ontario. This Music Spotlight highlights some of the talented Indigenous Musicians who call this place home.



Tara Williamson is a poet and provocateur- the spark that ignites the flame, from Winnipeg, by way of Peterborough. A First Nations singer/songwriter, her music is an unflinching document of self: the truth that hurts before it heals.



Sean Conway is an entertainer from Curve Lake First Nation, currently residing in Peterborough, Ontario. He is an avid musical explorer bridging classic country music, rockabilly and jazz as a guitarist, singer, songwriter and bandleader.



Sarah DeCarlo is an artist and musician from Peterborough, ON. Her songwriting abilities are diverse, and her music is upbeat with catchy tunes, it moves across the spectrum of emotions and intensity and offers the listener a vast pallet of sounds to enjoy.




