

Searching for Winnetou Drew Hayden Taylor (Ojibway) • 2018 • 44m • Canada • English & German

This film is author and humourist Drew Hayden Taylor's quest to understand the roots of the German obsession with Native North Americans. Inspired by 19th century author Karl May and his series of Winnetou novels, thousands of Germans attempt to live and dress as First Nations people. These "Indienthusiasts" have inspired an entire industry of live performance, film. "authentic" collectibles and "Indianer camps", (to borrow the German terminology). This fascination forces us to confront the question of Appreciation vs. Appropriation. Are these curious hobbyists or cultural thieves? The eagerly anticipated project explores the controversy surrounding cultural appropriation in an innovative, hilarious, disturbing, inspiring, and touching way.



Drew Hayden Taylor is originally from the Curve Lake First Nation, in Central Ontario, and has spent the last two decades traveling the world and writing about it from the Indigenous perspective. An award-winning playwright, author, columnist, filmmaker and lecturer, he has managed to bridge the gap between cultures by tickling the funny bone.

Pemba is a Himalayan Sherpa, the Nepalese ethnic group famous worldwide for giving support to western mountaineers on the highest peaks in the world. However, Pemba has never climbed a mountain; she is a folk singer who fled her country years ago due to the civil war in the 1990s, and that now has a new life with her family in Catalonia, Spain. Twenty years later. Pemba decides to return to her hometown. Goli, a tiny village located on a secluded plateau in the heart of the Himalayas, to organize a concert and discover what remains of the home where she grew up.

Set in the Nurkum village, a remote Everest region of Nepal at an altitude of 4000 m above sea level, this documentary tells the story of a nomadic Sherpa family who are the last people in the region to hold the traditional profession of Mountain cow husbandry. This documentary shows their redemption and pain, as they hold onto the old traditions in the backdrop of modernist way of life.

They gather testimony and bear witness to the devastating impact of the state's child welfare practices on families in Maliseet, Micmac, Passamaquoddy and Penobscot tribal communities. Collectively, these tribes make up the Wabanaki people. The feature-length documentary Dawnland follows the TRC to contemporary Wabanaki communities to witness intimate, sacred moments of truthtelling and healing. With exclusive access to this groundbreaking process and never-before-seen footage, the film reveals the untold narrative of Indigenous child removal in the United States.

She's prepared to handle all of the challenges the wildlife, the weather, the water, and her gear have to offer up. The most challenging of all is that she has to bring her dysfunctional family with her. Her neurotic aunt, her cranky uncle, her wayward cousin, and the memory of her late uncle all come along for the ride to make it a fun and amazing adventure. From Tla'Amin to Klemtu, BC, this family navigates their blend of cultures and desires, while their spirits honour the coast as a place for each of us to call home and protect.

Zoe Hopkins is a Heiltsuk/Mowkawk Canadian filmmaker born in Bella Bella, a Heiltsuk fishing village on the coast of BC. She is now raising her son in her father's community of Six Nations, Ontario, where she learned to speak and teach Kanyen'kéha (the Mohawk language.) Hopkins holds a BAA in Film from Ryerson University, and is an alumna of the Sundance Institute's Feature Film Program. Her films have screened Internationally at festivals including Sundance and Berlinale. Hopkins is a member of the Embargo Collective; creators of the omnibus feature. The Embargo Project, which included her short film Skyworld (Best Short Film, Niagara Integrated Film Festival). Zoe is currently in development with her sophomore feature, Running Home, with Toronto's Big Soul Productions.

Merle Robillard is a Cree filmmaker from Hay River, NWT and member of the Mistawasis Nêhiyawak Band. Merle worked as a photojournalist and photo editor before studying filmmaking at Ryerson University.

This Filmmaking Masterclass will be divided into two sections that cover Screenwriting and the craft of Directing. It will include useful tips that all Writers and Directors should consider during their creation and preparation process. Renae will also share the Screenplay & Directors treatment from her last film *Waru* as a tangible guiding example. Renae Maihi (Ngati Whakaue & Nagapuhi Maori) is an award winning writer and critically acclaimed director in theatre and film. Renae wrote her debut play, Nga Manurere, which the NZ Herald Best of 2009 favored as the "surprise jewel of the year". Her play PATUA won the Adam NZ Playwright Award for best play by a Maori playwright. She co-wrote the



short film Redemption, which went on to screen at the Berlin Film Festival. Sundance, and won Best Short Film at the 2010 imagineNATIVE Film Festival. Her film Mannahatta, was shot entirely in New York City and screened at the imagineNATIVE Film Festival, as well as the NZIFF. Renae has also written for television and worked alongside some of the top writers in Aotearoa. In 2017 she wrote and directed the feature film Waru, in collaboration with 8 other wahine filmmakers, which had its World Premiere at NZIFF and it's international Premiere at TIFF. She is currently working on her debut feature film with her company, Ms Mana Films, focused on the topic of a significant Maori leader.

Adam Khalil, Bayley Sweitzer • 1h17 • 2018 • USA • English

Set in the abusive police state of the contemporary United States, Empty Metal follows five groups of characters, each emblematic of a different extreme political ideology, as they attempt insurrection against the status quo: A punk band is coerced into a dangerous assassination plot by a family of militant Native Americans who are aided by a Rastafarian computer hacker who is old friends with a Buddhist hermit whose son is a local militia leader.

This tangled web of marginalized voices is as diverse and contradictory as the nation that spun it, but there is a common thread: All the characters teeter on the dull knife blade that is contemporary American politics, but they refuse to fall right or left. Instead, they lash out from the soul, and under the radar, in an attempt to achieve what their mainstream predecessors have yet to accomplish. And all the while, the drones are watching...

Adam Shingwak Khalil (Ojibway) is a filmmaker and artist. His practice attempts to subvert traditional forms of ethnography through humor, relation, and transgression. Khalil's work has been exhibited at various national and international art galleries. Khalil is a 2017 Sundance Art of Nonfiction grantee, 2017 Sundance Institute Indigenous Film Opportunity Fellow, UnionDocs Collaborative Fellow, and Gates Millennium Scholar. In 2011 he graduated from the Film and Electronic Arts program at Bard College.



Bayley James Sweitzer is a filmmaker from Southern Vermont, currently based in Brooklyn. His practice revolves around a dynamic, highmobility engagement with the margins; a practice in which techno-formal precision is secondary to heartfelt vigor. His work has been shown at SEFF Binghamton, Anthology Film Archives (New York), Rochester International Film Festival, Motel Gallery (New York) and MIIT House (Osaka).

In 2014 Lydia's son, Colten Pratt, went missing off the streets of Winnipeg. In the weeks that followed, Lydia was met with adversity as she tried desperately to find her son. It seemed to her, that the plight of a lost Aboriginal man fell on deaf ears. Weeks turned to months, months turned to years. After the disappearance of her son, Lydia suddenly became all too aware of the desperate state of Aboriginal Men's rights. But no matter what she did, no one seemed to care about her son. Colten has yet to be found.

Sage (Status Indian, Ojibwe), is an emerging filmmaker and comedian located in Winnipeg Manitoba. Graduating from the University of Manitoba with a degree in Film and Literature, Sage

is well versed in narrative structure and writing. Also as a twice Alumnus of the National Screen Institute, Sage has a large skill set in the filmmaking world.

This is the newest music video from Vancouver's Quanah Style, and follows Ms. Style downtown from Sunset Beach to Davie St, where love is in the air.



Hot Culture is an art show focused on Indigenous made fashion, textile and crafts, bringing together designers and creators working with traditional and contemporary materials. Hot Culture is a play on the term "Haute Couture", meaning "high fashion", and the creation of priceless, handmade, highquality, custom-fitted clothing. Excluding the classist implications of this term, these are concepts that strongly match the traditional ways that Indigenous peoples have always created cultural objects, crafts, clothing, jewellery, and regalia, that is, with the utmost skill and attention to detail. These items are often embedded with knowledge of the cultures from which they originate, in the harvesting of materials, in the methods of creation, and the symbols and stories they tell. They are also reflections of the artists who made them, and the relationships that exist in families and communities, through the collaborative and dialogic ways that they are often designed and created for a specific individual. They are also items that use contemporary materials, and that can challenge stereotypes by engaging with popular culture in playful and ironic ways. They support the continuation of culture, and the affirmation of Indigenous peoples as modern people with ancient and beautiful traditions. They are objects of utility, with meaning and spirit that are created, worn, and displayed with pride. They are "hot" (read as gorgeous, pretty, beautiful) manifestations of Indigenous Culture.

In the late 1960's, the Kwadacha First Nation, a small Tsek'ene community located on the Peace River in Northern British Columbia, were flooded out of their traditional territory by the W.A.C. Bennett Dam - one of the largest dams in the world. The flooding came with no warning, notice, or compensation. Ironically, Kwadacha has not been provided with access to electricity from the dam, and continues to pay B.C. Hydro for a diesel generator – at a cost much higher than average provincial rates. Due to cost, many homes on the reserve cannot afford the electricity. With construction of a new dam underway on the same river, further flooding is imminent. It's time for Kwadacha to tell their story.





MANCHAR THE LAST OF THE LAKE PEOPLE Aftab Abbasi • 4m • 2017 • Pakistan • Urdu

This film is aimed to raise awareness about the dire ecological situation that Machar faces. Manchar is one of the biggest lakes of Asia that used to be home to thousands of fishermen, migratory birds, and sustained wide varieties of fish and fauna . It is a story of a paradise lost due to the pollution caused by an industry.

FLAT ROCKS Courtney Montour (Mohawk) • 10m • 2017 • Canada • English

79-year-old Louis Diabo battles against the construction of Canada's St. Lawrence Seaway during the 1950s to save his farm and the Kahnawake Mohawk community. Flat Rocks weaves together breathtaking present-day footage of Kahnawake with archival photos dating back over 80 years revealing the community's way of life threatened by the Seaway. A poetic narration in the Kanien'kéha (Mohawk) language voices the community's connection to the water.

This is a film about what happened to the Inuit community of Kivitoo in 1962. Three of the camp leaders had died while sleeping in an igloo in February, the coldest time of the year. Three days after the men were buried, while the community was in deep grief, a plane came and forced people to move the camp to Qikittajuaaq. "Kivitoo. What they though of us", is the story of this community. Zacharias Kunuk uses stock footage from 1999 of the elders that have passed on, and visits the old settlement of Kivitoo in 2017 with the last living people from the community.

Zacharias Kunuk (Inuit), was born in Kapuivik in the eastern Canadian Arctic, he is a filmmaker, artist, and hunter that spent his childhood summers traveling and hunting with his family, and his winters going to school in Igloolik, where his family were involuntarily settled when Kunuk was nine years old. Kunik is a renowned filmmaker; his films are widely known, including Atanarjuat/The Fast Runner, The Journals of Knud Rasmussen, and Searchers (Maliglutit).

Kim O'Bomsawin (Abenaqui) • 52m • 2018 • Canada • French & English w/Eng. subs.

In the hands of contemporary singer-songwriters Pakesso Mukash (Cri/Abénaki), Shauit (Innu) and Moe Clark (Métis), teweikan (traditional drum) is still a powerful tool of communion. By following the three musicians in their respective communities, we will discover the vitality of Canadian Indigenous artists, the causes they cherish and their deep aspirations. We trace the history of First Nations music, and witness how the teweikan is being revived, from Montreal to the Hudson Bay, from the Plains to the Côte-Nord.

Kim O'Bomsawin completed a master's degree in sociology before launching her career as a documentary filmmaker. As an Abenaki filmmaker, she collaborated on the development and production of several documentary series such as La Cité (APTN), Je ne veux pas mourir (APTN / Canal D) and Le rythme des nations (APTN). Kim is currently developing a feature length documentary about the poet Joséphine Bacon.





Bush Baby is an intimate conversation between a grandparent and a deceased child. Translated from Aboriginal Kriol to English and then to lcelandic, it is a contemplation of how we care for the dead and how that is expressed within the natural environment.

This is a fractal of the settler-colonial-genocidal agenda. It is a broken up animated poor image of a sunset from Grand Council Treaty #3 Territory.

Laka is a cross-cultural love story that starts with a first kiss in Sydney, Australia, and ends with a birth in the remote Arnhem land bush. For too many years Lily, a Yolngu woman from the Northern Territory, has suppressed her yearning to go home. Now heavily pregnant, visions of her ancestral land have taken over her waking life. Lily's husband Siddhartha, a Sri Lankan Australian, is unwilling to disrupt their stable life in Sydney, forcing Lily to choose between her land and her love. One night Lily leaves Siddhartha, and begins the long drive back home. Understanding now the duty one has to future generations, Siddhartha begins to follow Lily across the country to the remote Northern Territory.

MERMAID WHISPERING Hsu-Hu Yuan • 79 minutes • 2017 • Taiwan • Mandarin/ Tao • Canadian Premiere

Neville, the son of a fisherman, meets a mermaid and an underwater photographer named Pei during an accident at sea. To thank Pei for saving his life, Neville, who is a master in free diving, promises to be her guide on the ocean. They see a brand new world through each other's eyes. Pei presents Neville with potential future opportunities as a competitor in free diving competitions, giving him a reason to leave his home of Orchid Island. In actuality, it was the mermaid who really saved Neville in his accident, and she sheds off her tail fin to walk in the human world and meet Neville again. Neville is confronted with a choice, to stay for the ocean's embrace? Or leave for bigger opportunities outside his community?
