



Judges Viewpoint

Presenting Your Orchid

Last month we talked about the qualities that make for good orchid flowers but there is a hidden side to making a good plant look even better. That hidden element is "Presentation".

Dress Me Up

When I speak to orchid groups about what judges like to see in a displayed orchid, I always stress presentation. Whether on the show table, show exhibit or in the AOS judging room, presentation can improve or distract the quality of any plant.

Here are a few tips on how to take your favorite plant and make them even more desirable.

Face the Viewer

Stand in front of your plant, eyes on the flower. What do you see? Make sure your flower or flowers are oriented to meet the viewer's gaze straight on. It may take some work to do that, but in the end the resulting plant will "show" even better. Sometimes that will require some work to get the flower oriented in the best way. Other times it is impossible because the presentation work should have started months ago when the flower spikes were just starting. This is especially true for Phalaenopsis and slipper orchids. Many orchid spikes resist rearrangement as the spike matures. Also, if not arranged before the buds mature, the flowers will not be oriented relative to the final staking.

Staking

Other than buying plants with high quality flowers this step is the single most important thing to do prior to displaying your plant. Note in the attached photo that there is already a stake in the pot for every single emerging inflorescence even if only ¼" tall. It accomplishes two things. First, it alerts me to be more careful around the plant so not to break it. Second, as the spike grows, the staking process begins and continues as it lengthens which may take as much as four to six months on some orchids. It can be staked straight or with a curved wire which becomes a personal choice.



Housekeeping

Staking has been separated out due to its importance. Next comes making the best possible plant presentation. There are a couple easy steps to grooming that make a huge difference. Clean the dust and dirt off the leaves. DO NOT USE LEAF WAX. Leaf waxes and orchids tend not to co-exist. Instead, use dilute milk or lemon juice solution and a soft cotton to wipe down the leaves. Personally, I frequently use insecticidal soap for insect maintenance and find it better than either of these other products.

Next, clean any loose debris out of the leaf mass and the media surface. Now, look at all the leaves for bad spots or injury and prune those away using a sterile razor blade. Only part of the leave need be taken off. But, if the plant only has three leaves, cutting one leaf off should not be done. Be sure to cut the tip of the leaf in the same shape as the original leaf as there is nothing worse than looking at a plant with blunt cut leaves. The photo on the left shows staking early and it also has bad leaves from frostbite. These leaves will fall anyway so cut them off before showing the plant.

A last note on this topic. Particularly in Phalaenopsis, a leaf will roll over or be twisted. It surely can be fixed but requires a little creativity. In the photo a wire attached to a stake was used to keep the leaf from rolling back to where we do not want it to be. Carefully roll it to normal position and use the wire to hold it there. After two weeks it will be normal orientation and the apparatus can be removed. The front stake remains as it is guarding the emerging spike.




