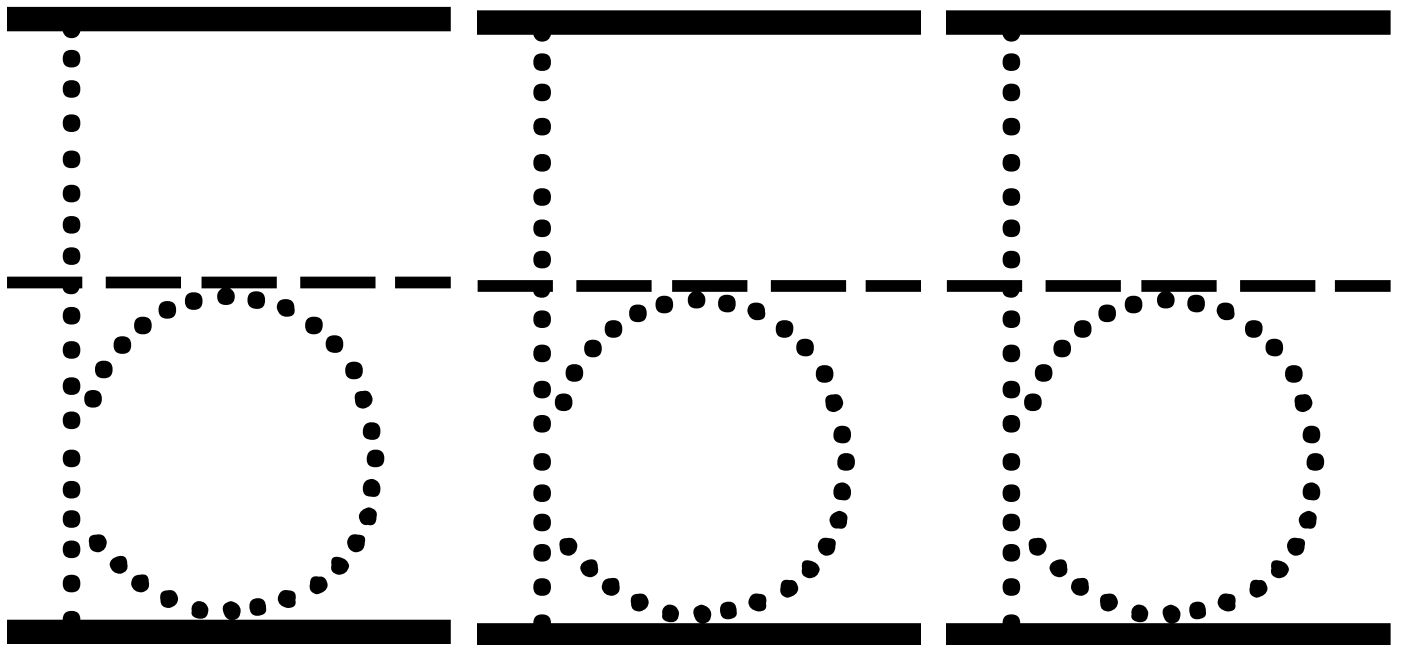
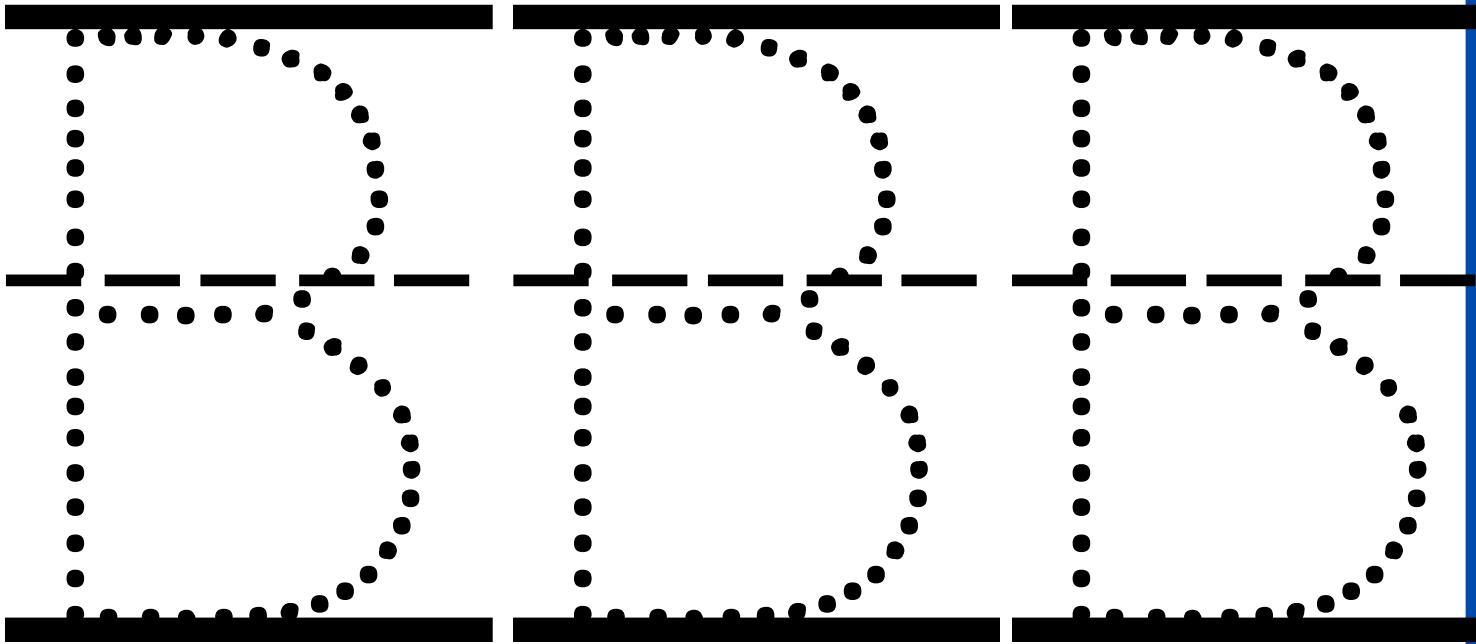
Goals for the week:

1. Trace the upper and lower case letter "B",
2. Recognize object names that begin with the letter "b",
3. Match pictures and name words with initial letter "b",
4. Recognize and trace the number "12",
5. Begin counting items and draw objects up to 12,
6. Try putting two groups of objects together that will be equal to 12,
7. Use purple to color things they see around them,
8. Trace and cut triangles,
9. Make logical connections while working with patterns,
10. Recognize rhymes using pictures while reading after the teacher,
11. Develop phonemic awareness through pictures.

Domains and skills developed:

1. Fine motor skills: Tracing, writing, drawing, cutting, and coloring
2. Social & emotional: Identifying, observing, and naming things that they see around them.
3. Cognitive: Recognize numbers, letters, colors, and shapes.
4. Language & communication: Talk about their favorite color and shape, developing simple answers to simple questions, naming colors of birds.
5. Physical: Action songs and reciting nursery rhymes.

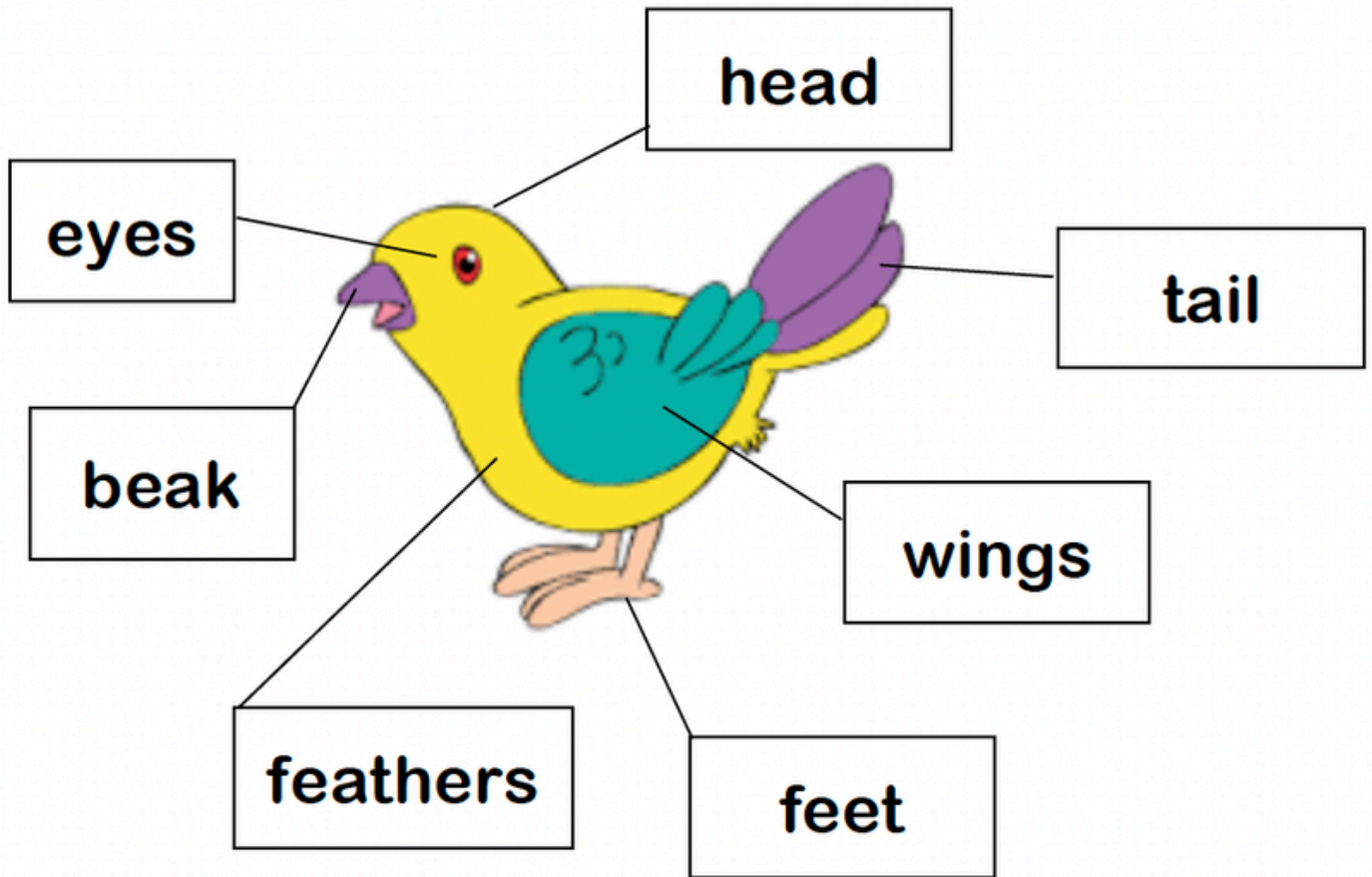
Introduction of the theme

Talk more about the picture.

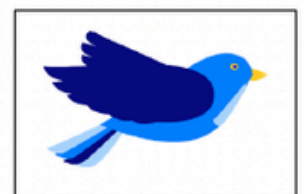
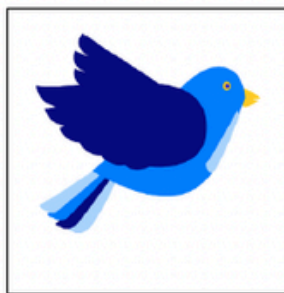
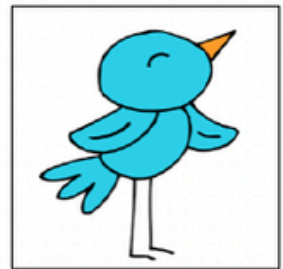
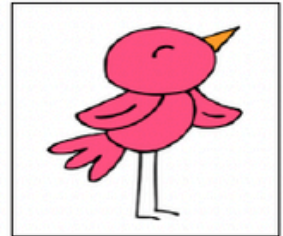
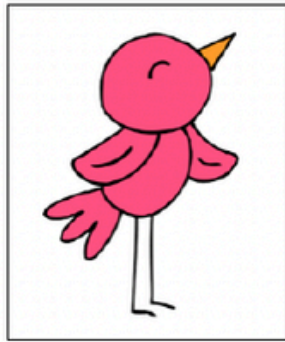
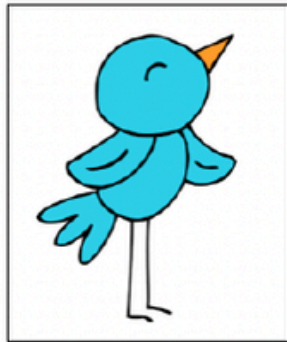
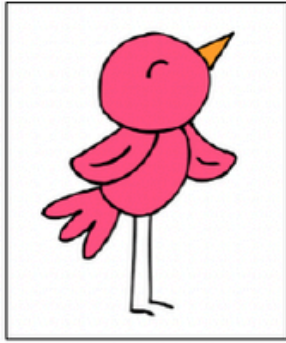
Body Parts of a Bird



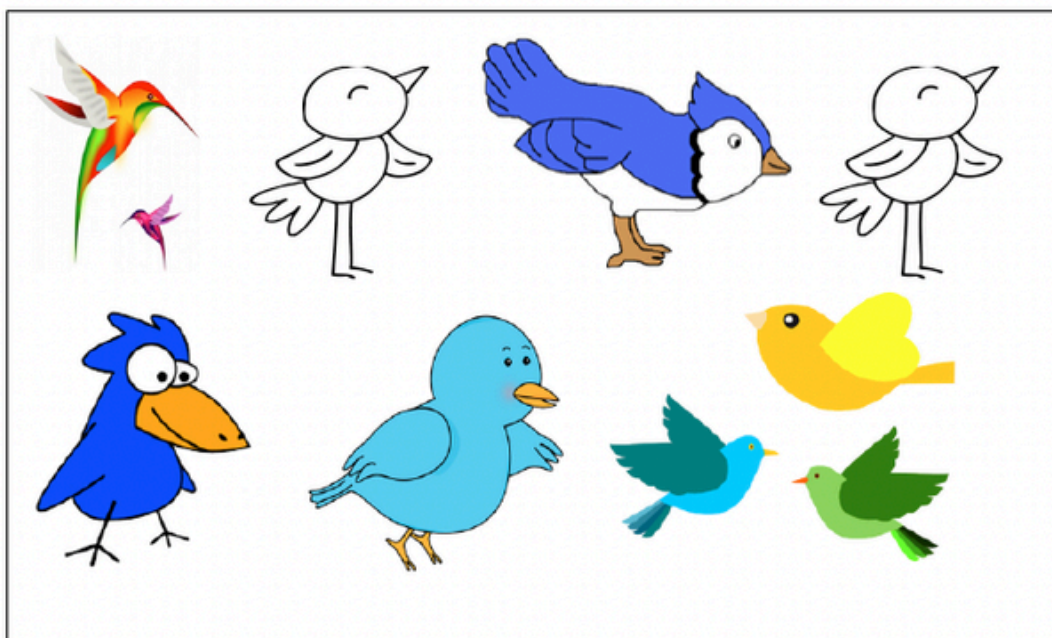
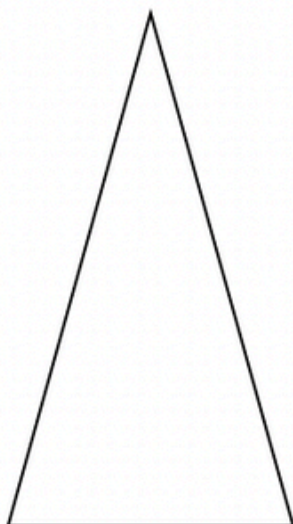
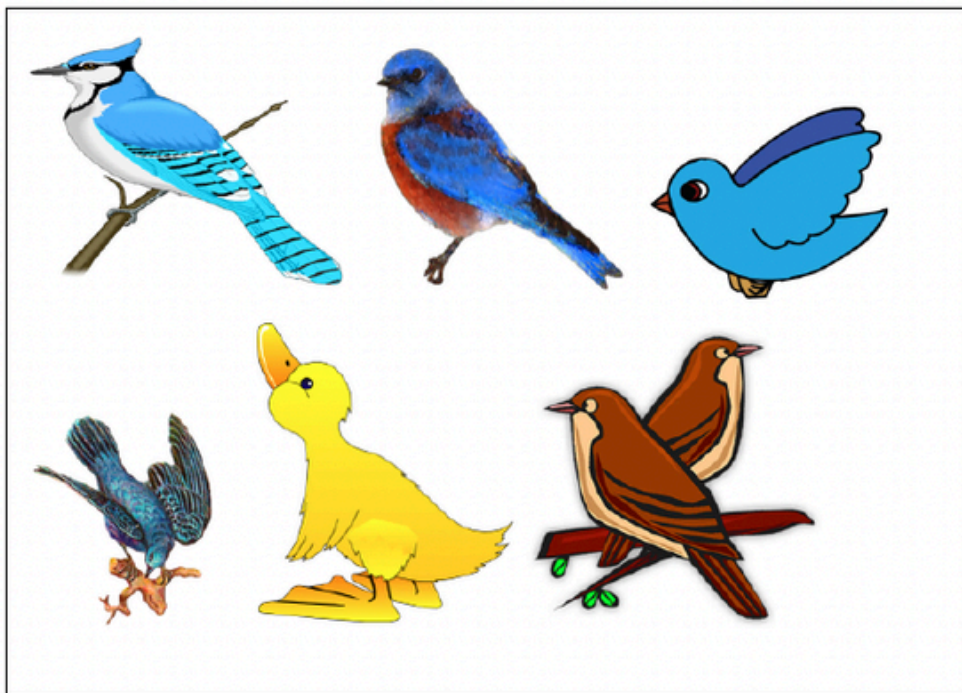
Birds eat worms, seeds and honey.

Stories to Read to Young Children:



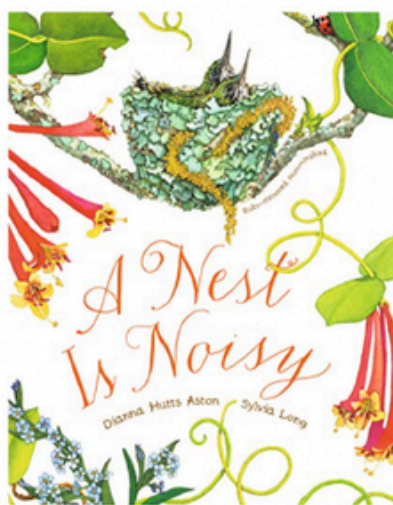
Little Red Hen by Jonathan Allen
