Lesson For The Week

This week's lesson will be about birds. It will be a wonderful topic whatever time of the year. But in spring, we can bring them to explore chicks and eggs or even discover that there are kinds of birds that migrate to other places when the weather changes.

Goals for this week:

1. Trace the upper and lower case letter J,
2. Recognize object names that begin with the letter J,
3. Match pictures and name words with initial "j",
4. Recognize and trace the numbers 12,
5. Begin counting items and draw objects up to 12,
6. Try putting two groups of objects together that will be equal to 12,
7. Use blue to color things they see around them,
8. Trace and cut diamonds,
9. Make logical connections while working with patterns,
10. Recognize rhymes using pictures while reading after the teacher,
11. Develop phonemic awareness through pictures.

Domains and skills developed:

1. Fine motor skills: Tracing, writing, drawing, cutting, and coloring
2. Social & emotional: Identifying, observing, and naming things that they see around them
3. Cognitive: Recognize numbers, letters, colors, and shapes
4. Language & communication: Talk about their favorite color and shape, developing simple answers to simple questions, naming the four kinds of weather
5. Physical: Action songs and reciting nursery rhymes

Writing Activities will be linked with other fine-motor developing skills like coloring, cutting, tracing and drawing. (<https://kidscountryinc.com>)



Tracing: Before children learn to properly write each letter or number on their own, they need to be able to control the pencil and move it to where they would want it to go. Tracing worksheets are a wonderful way to help them practice this important skill.

Coloring: It helps children develop good finger grip. It also provides an opportunity to practice holding their pencil the correct way. It helps them develop their length of concentration.

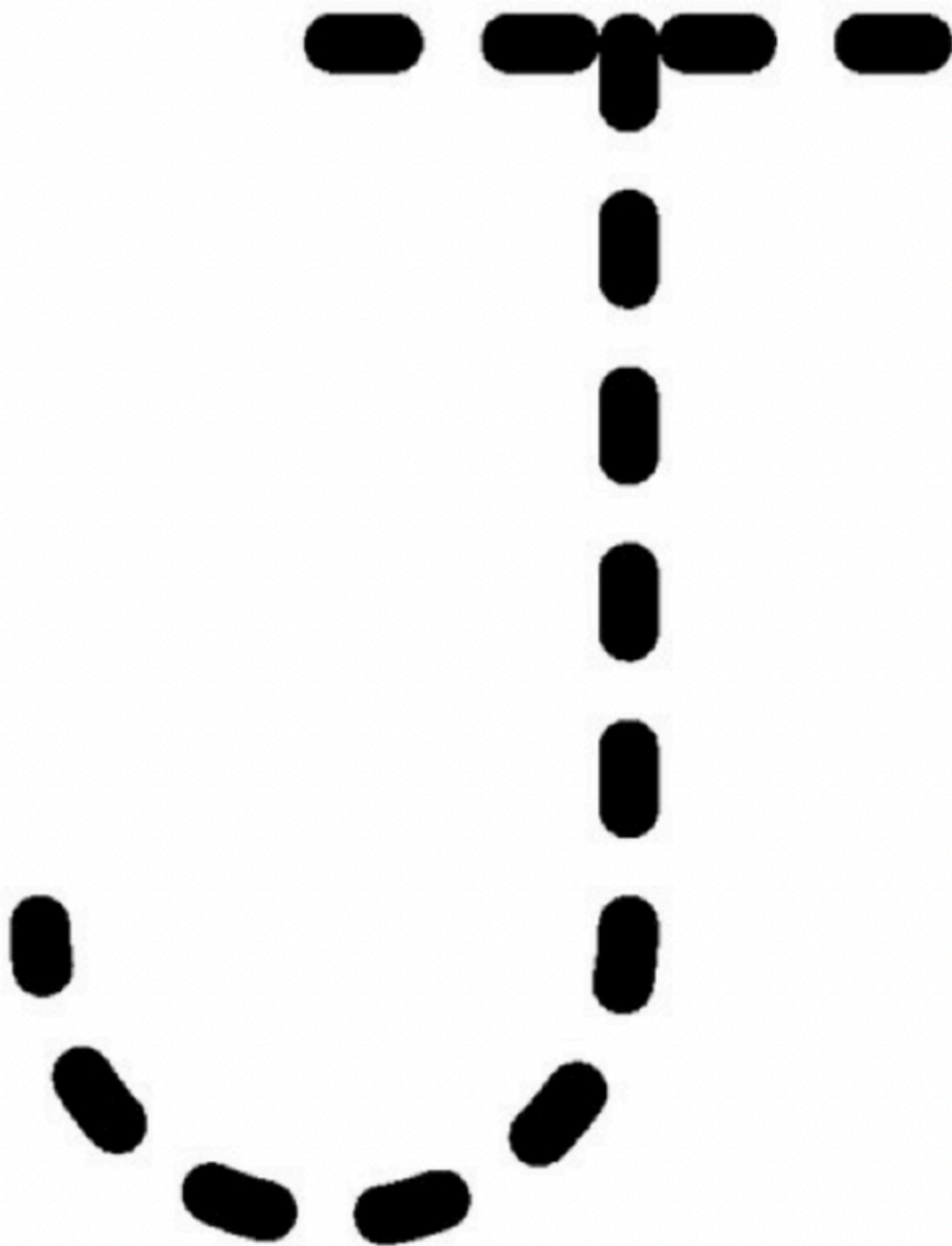


Cutting: It helps children develop small muscles in their hands specially the opening and closing motion of cutting with scissors. These muscles are crucial for holding a pencil or crayons and gripping and manipulating objects.

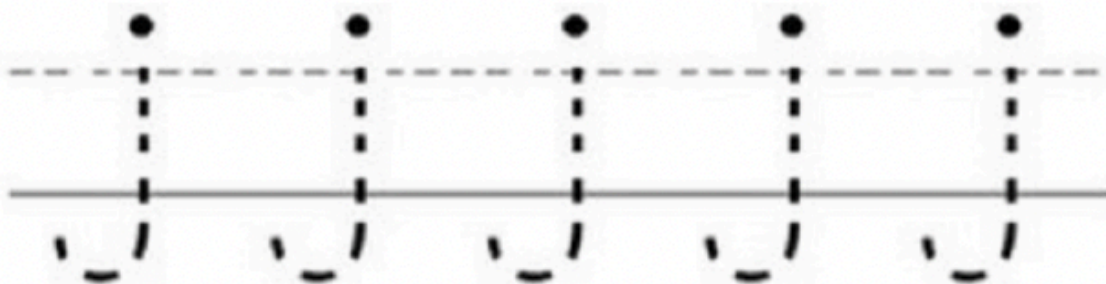
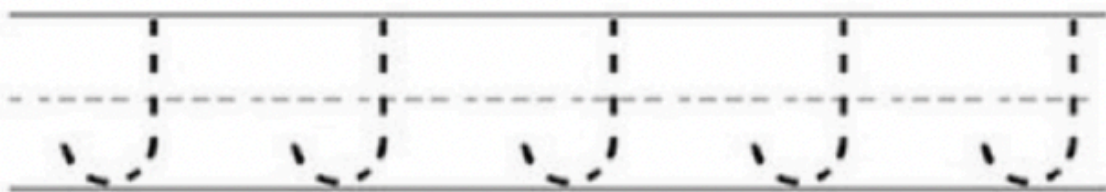
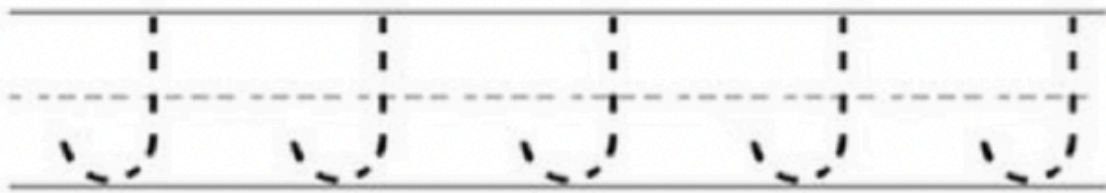
Drawing: It helps children create immediate feedback that changes depending on the tool they use. This feedback helps them identify the best ways to produce the desired result. Drawing also enables them to draw connections between what they see and does. It develops hand-eye coordination which is important in athletic and recreational situations, as well as in academic scenarios such as penmanship lessons.

1. Mother's Day Handprint Art Flowers

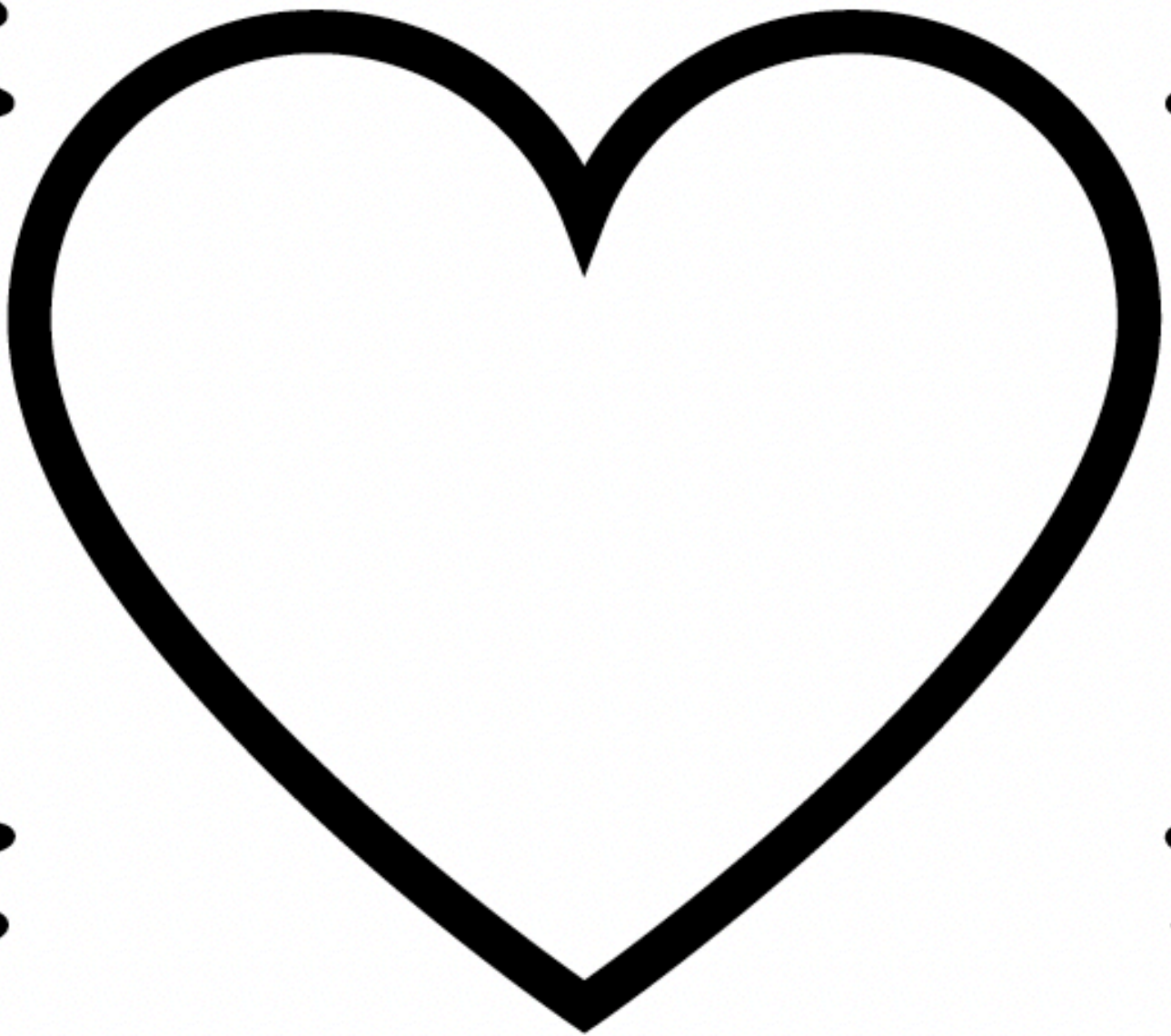
- What you need:
