We hope you are getting through this dry, smoky summer with no ill effect. It certainly makes a person long for autumn, which is, after all, just around the corner.

The Garden has had a busy season, with several classes and tours offered. Nearly 100 people attended the June 26, Hospice Visions Butterfly Release, and our annual May Open House and Plant Sale were highly successful and well attended.

The garden is open every Friday and Saturday from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

On July 11, the Times-News (daily newspaper serving the Twin Falls area) provided a 5-page feature story about the Orton Botanical Garden and our mission to educate about water conservation in the garden. The story also featured our emphasis on gardening with native plants, and the use of plants that support wildlife and pollinators. Just nine months into our first year of offering a membership program, we are pleased to report that 78 of you have joined us. **Thank you for your support!** Because Orton Botanical Garden belongs to the Reciprocal Admission Program of the American Horticultural Society (AHS), our members have the added benefit of access to free or reduced cost admission at more than 300 US public gardens.

We continue to fill our calendar with a variety of interesting activities which we hope you

will be able to take advantage of, including: **Upcoming Activities:**

 August-September Weekly Garden Tours: From 10-11 am on each Saturday in August and September, we will offer a free garden tour. Tours will emphasize our favorite drought tolerant plants, and how you can conserve water AND grow a beautiful garden at the same time.



No registration is required for these free tours.

- August 19: Cacti and Succulents for Southern Idaho. This class will be taught by LaMar Orton via Zoom, from 7 to 8 pm. Although the class is free, registration is required through our website. This class will introduce you to some of our favorite cacti and succulents that thrive in our region.
- September 28: Lewis and Clark in Idaho. This class will be taught by two board members via Zoom, from 7-8:30 pm. Registration is required for this free event. You can find more information about this class and how to register on our website.

Other Developments:

This fall, we will prepare two brochures about the Garden's native plants and native buckwheats. The Idaho Native Plant Society generously funded our grant request to develop these brochures, which will feature a number of the species on display at OBG.
