Newcastle was visited a few times during the year for shows and music, and on several occasions, we took the impressive Anzac Memorial Bridge Walk along the cliff-tops.

Nelson Bay has some beautiful coastline and we had time to explore some of it.

Later in March we had a pleasant couple of days in the Hunter en route to visiting Derek and Lisa at the farm. It was impressive to see the progress they have made with improvements at Daleside, but there were no photos as the day dawned somewhat cold and windy. Lisa shows remarkable ability to be an active cattle assistant! Immediately after Easter we took our customary trip to Canberra to see Paul, who had survived having both knees replaced at the same time. He was recovering well under Heather's watchful eye and without too much stress! We returned via Sydney and lunch with Bev, husband of Anne's late brother Peter.

Derek and Lisa were able to slip away from the farm in May to MacMasters Beach, which is quite near us, so we spent a very enjoyable day with them. It was shortly after some enormous storms hit the Central Coast and the whole area was devastated – although the sand was pristine and good for 'exercising the toes'.

We had been to MacMasters beach a few weeks earlier and the amount of sand removal and damage was hard to comprehend. This encouraged us in June to see

what had happened to the waterways at The Entrance – a lot of damage to properties and movement of sand-banks were evident with a completely new channel cut right through the main beach!!

In early June, we had a blissful five days on Hamilton Island off the mid-north coast of Queensland. We left home in violent weather — wind and rain which followed us to Sydney and drowned us on the way to the airport. The sun was shining brightly in Queensland and on the reef, and so we had a relaxing time walking, exploring and eating good local products, especially the fish and seafood. Two thirds of the island is preserved as native bush with steep hills and magnificent views — a hiker's paradise — although some of the tracks allow noisy quad bikes which we didn't really appreciate.

We indulged in a seaplane trip to view the outer barrier reef and returned with a stop at beautiful Whitehaven Beach with its extremely fluffy white seashell sand – it was interesting trying to get back onto the seaplane while it was being moved around in the waves! All worth another visit one day.

In mid-August, we spent a wonderful 17 days touring the Kimberley in a small four-wheel coach with Outback Spirit – Broome to Broome, but covering Cape Leveque, Derby, onto the notorious Gibb River road, Mornington Wildlife Sanctuary, Drysdale River Station, up to the very far north on the Mitchell Plateau to see the Mitchell Falls.




