Anne and Dave's Christmas Letter for 2017

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Season's Greetings to our friends and family - we hope you all had an enjoyable year as well as good health. Sadly, this year we have lost Kevin and Frank, two dear friends from the Port Macquarie area who are missed. We have also lost Bryan from Newcastle and some of Anne's school friends have slipped away.

Our year has been very eventful with Australian travel and local days of entertainment and exploration, culminating in a most memorable European visit to the Channel Island of Jersey, Portugal and Spain. The Christmas Letter has grown so much it is now in 3 parts with our European visit taking two of these.

Five days at O'Reilly's Rainforest Retreat (on the Queensland-New South Wales border) at the start of March found us enjoying the scenery, walks and tours. We were there a few weeks before Debbie (an enormous tropical cyclone) blew through causing a lot of damage in the area.

At the end of March, we drove to Canberra for a couple of days and then continued south to Lake Crackenback in the Snowy Mountains near Thredbo – it was cold but sunny apart from a huge storm while we were enjoying ourselves at the top of the chairlift. The remnants of Debbie affected the weather in most of NSW but we managed to avoid most of the worst except for a horrendous drive down to Canberra – and of course Anne was driving when the deluge came!

Little River near Tumut Plains, where Anne had spent a lovely Christmas many years ago. We then took the Snowy Mountains Highway to Talbingo, now a tiny settlement but once an important Snowy Hydro town.

The weather improved so we embarked on an exciting and nerve wracking drive through the Talbingo State Forest towards Adelong – a fabulous experience. After another night in Tumut we headed off to Orange, for a quick stay at the farm with nephew Derek and Lisa (both working very hard now that they have an additional property to look after).


