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Introduction

This is an accumulation of the complete material found from many sources for the finalisation of our line of the Hubert ancestors' story beginning in the Channel Island of Jersey. It was made following a two week visit to Jersey in September 2017 by Anne Molver and Dave Johnson, assisted by Nicola Stephens.

Prior to travelling, contact was made with Pam Phelps from the Channel Islands Family History Society who was most helpful. Pam was able to supply us archived information on certain long deceased family members, with dates of baptism or death and details of where they were buried, including tracking down old graves and houses. This information was incorporated into the document 'Life Notes: Our Hubert Line in Jersey including John (Jean) Hubert and his son Horatio Hubert'. The Jersey Archives also proved to be a valuable resource, and the Societe Jersaise and Coutanche Library held interesting reference books.

An account of this visit formed part of our Christmas letter for 2017 and the first part of this document is derived from that account. Additional material which was obtained during the visit is included as appendices to this document.

Life Notes

A number of documents have been created to capture information on some members of the Hubert Line. Anne's father and mother (John and Mag), as well as John's siblings (her aunt Marjorie and her uncle Donald). The last document presents the history of the Hubert Line and details of John (Jean) Hubert (Anne's great-grandfather) and his son Horatio Hubert (Anne's grandfather).

This Jersey Revisited document is intended to capture all the information from our visit and key items have been incorporated into the Life Notes.

Two weeks in Jersey, September 2017

We had variable weather in the first week, some of it fine and windy and the rest very wet, particularly at the end. However, we were still able to visit many well-known coastal spots, driving to the north, east and later south and west coasts. The island is small enough to enjoy its range of scenery and history without too much driving, although Dave did find the narrow roads and amount of traffic hair-raising at times (saved by the local drivers who are politer than in most other places).

Our first foray was to Greve de Lecq, a small picturesque town on the north coast with a beautiful beach and one of the many Jersey Round Towers.

The town of St Helier was most interesting, historic and confusing, with parking meters and congestion everywhere in spite of the fewer than normal visitors this late in the holiday season.

We drove eastwards along the southern coast of Jersey from St Helier and explored the Round Towers of Le Hocq and La Rocque, both good examples of the many defensive fortifications that can be found around Jersey. The Seymour Tower south of La Rocque appears to be well out to sea at high tide but actually marks the outer edge of a large area of very shallow (and sharp) rocks.

The town of Gorey is situated at the southern end of the east coast of Jersey and is home to the impressive castle of Mont Orgueil - we climbed up many sets of steps exploring the castle and taking in the views (including glimpses of nearby France).

We also visited the Samares Manor House and, after a scrumptious lunch at their café, explored their wonderful Botanic Gardens. This was a working manor farm

until recently and the main building and a collection of farm buildings now provides accommodation for visitors.



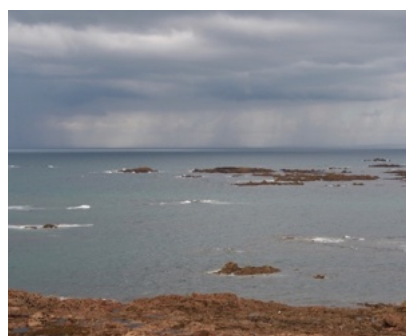
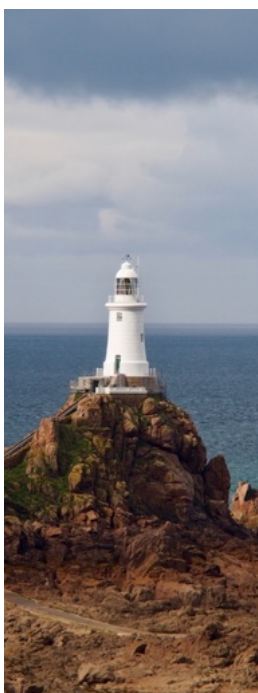

On 14th September we visited the Jersey Archives, a most impressive set-up and very well used by many worldwide visitors looking for details of their own ancestry, supported by a number of volunteers and office staff. We also visited the Museum which depicted scenes of island history and memorabilia.

Pam from the Channel Islands Family History Society helped us a lot with chasing down information on the Hubert's in Jersey and took us to St Saviour's Church, in the north east of St Helier, to see the grave of Anne's paternal grandfather Horatio John Hubert.

The end of the first week was an extremely wet and windy day but we did manage to explore the southwestern part of Jersey including La Corbière

lighthouse, which is accessible only at low tide. We tried to get there but the bad weather came in faster than we had anticipated so we had to turn back.

As the weather deteriorated even further we drove to St Brelade's Bay, where it really began to rain hard. We stopped for a lunch sheltering in the café (with many others) – Anne's mother and father had visited this café in 1930 (just after they got married).

Once the rain had eased off a little we headed on to St Aubin which is a lovely seaside town with a nice harbour. St Aubin is on the western end of the bay from St Helier but its castle (St Aubin's Fort) is much smaller than Elizabeth Castle.

Apparently, that day had been the wettest day on record for western Jersey – with pictures in the local paper of surf boards being ridden down the street!

Anne's niece Nicola then joined us for the second week on the island, together with her son Michael for the first two days. Luckily the weather improved so we were able to be more active and explore the island as well as visit places of family history significance.

It was low tide, on our first day, so we walked across the tidal flats to St Helier's Elizabeth Castle – Sir Walter Raleigh developed the castle in the early 1600's once Mont Orgueil was deemed to be too vulnerable to attack from the land. Elizabeth Castle has been added to many times since including during the German Occupation of Jersey in WW2.

After several hours exploring the castle, we took Nicola and Michael to the southwest of Jersey for lunch at St Brelade's Bay and then on to see La Corbière Lighthouse – now being seen at high tide and in fine weather. Afterwards we drove northwards along St Ouen's Bay to the north west of Jersey.

On the 18 September, we visited the old family farm and house "Oakdale" on the border of St Peter and St Mary parishes, where the last of Anne's line of Hubert's lived until the 1960's. We were lucky to encounter David whose parents had looked after Eva Hubert before she died in 1964 and subsequently inherited the property. The "Oakdale" property has now been modified to accommodate several families but was originally a farm with substantial (for Jersey) holdings of some 10-12 acres. Sadly, the main house had to be rendered to protect the crumbling stonework, however the original granite can be seen in the courtyard at the back with parts of the building dating back to 1702.

A windmill next door to "Oakdale" was used by many of the farms for grinding corn from the surrounding area – the building has now been renovated and converted into accommodation.

After we left “Oakdale” we visited St Mary’s Parish Church a small distance to the east and where Susanne de Caen (Anne’s great-great-grandmother) is buried.

Our next drive took us to the east coast town of Rozel, a small fishing village with interesting architecture, an old barracks and good cliff top walks with views of the surprisingly close coast of France – apparently Jersey people could watch the WW2 invasion of Normandy from these cliffs.

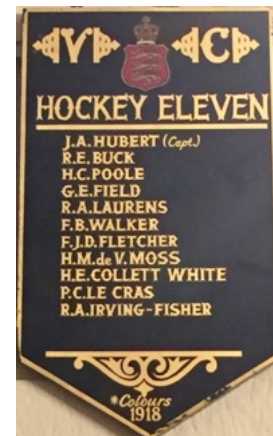
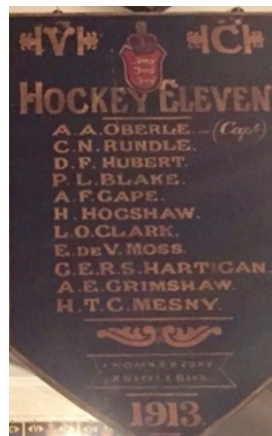

Anne had arranged for us to visit Victoria College where Donald and John Hubert (Anne's uncle and father respectively) were educated between 1905 and 1918. We had been led to believe that we would get a short tour of the school but we were treated to a very extensive tour with the current headmaster as our enthusiastic guide. We were shown the Sir Galahad memorial to Victoria College students who had lost their lives in the Great War, the list including Donald's name – D F Hubert.

We then visited the magnificent Great Hall in which past student names are placed on the backs of chairs with often 2 or 3 from one family on each chair. We also located the honour and school team boards to find both Donald and John's

names well represented – Donald had been a good shot and John was very good at running but both their names featured in various hockey teams.

On the next day, we went to look around the Parish Church of St Helier and were pleasantly surprised to see a memorial with D F Hubert's name on it – this was in a chapel dedicated to various memorials for those connected with the church.

Nicola and Michael wanted to do a cliff walk so we went to the north west of Jersey and stopped at Le Poulec at the northern end of St Ouen's Bay. After lunch Nicola and Michael set off on their cliff walk while Anne and Dave explored the area and then drove to Plemont where we all met up again.

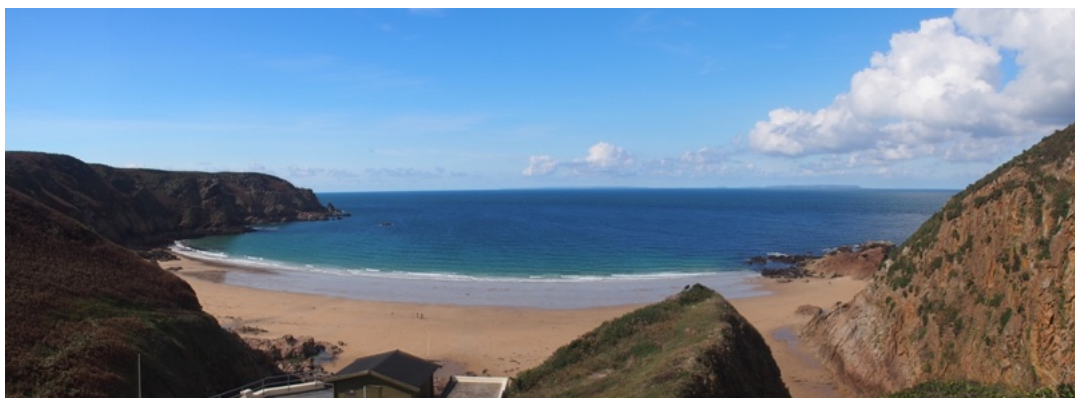

Plemont is a small town on the north coast of Jersey with a delightful beach and a good café. There are numerous walks in the area and interesting features along the steep rocky coastline.

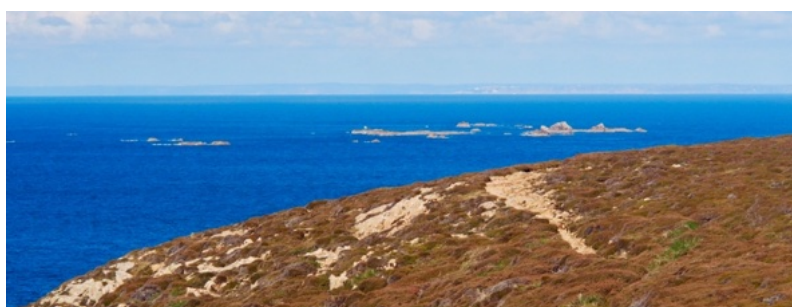
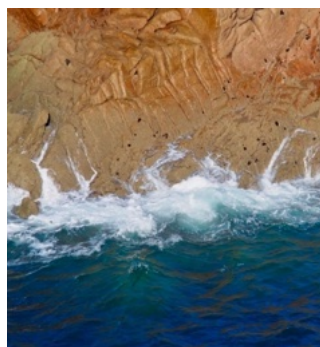
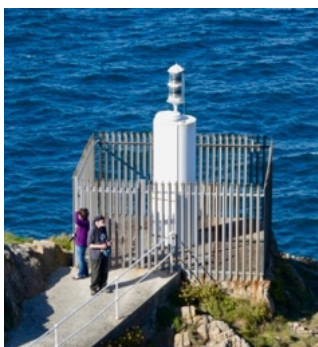


Plemont Bay north west Jersey: panorama of the bay with islands in the distance

Les Pierres de Lecq (The Paternosters) are the most prominent rocks offshore from this coast and sailors offered prayers to those who had lost their lives when shipwrecked there. After lunch at Plemont we headed back to the ruins of Grosnez Castle situated at the northwest corner of Jersey.

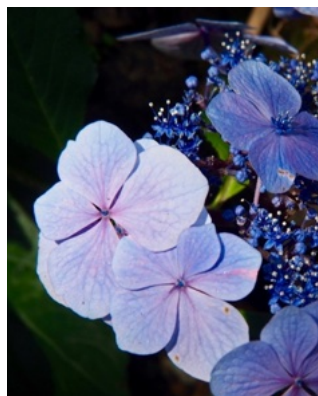
Anne and Nicola found the “town house” at Victoria Crescent where Anne’s grandfather, father and family lived in St Helier – only a five-minute walk from where we were staying!

We had an enjoyable walk starting at the St Lawrence Parish Centre near the centre of the island on the 20 September. The walk took us along narrow lanes, some of which were green lanes with appropriate vegetation and narrow width. We encountered old buildings and interesting farms along our very pleasant walk nicely rounded out by a great lunch at the “The British Union” pub.

On our last day on Jersey, we again went over to the east coast to see Archirondel Tower at the southern end of St Catherine's Bay. The weather was cloudy with occasional rain but we still enjoyed seeing the tower and its surroundings.

The tower is currently being renovated but we were able to see around the outside. The seaward side is unique in that it is painted red and white to distinguish it from the other towers along the coast.

We finished our east coast jaunt returning to Gorey, where Nicola had a quick visit to Mont Orgueil castle and we all enjoyed lunch. The return to St Helier was

along the coast past the Seymour Tower, which at low tide is accessible across seemingly miles of rocks and sand. The Round Towers at La Rocque and Le Hocq were also visited but only briefly.

Altogether our holiday in Jersey provided very rewarding research opportunities and we thoroughly enjoyed both weeks of the stay and spending time with close relatives.

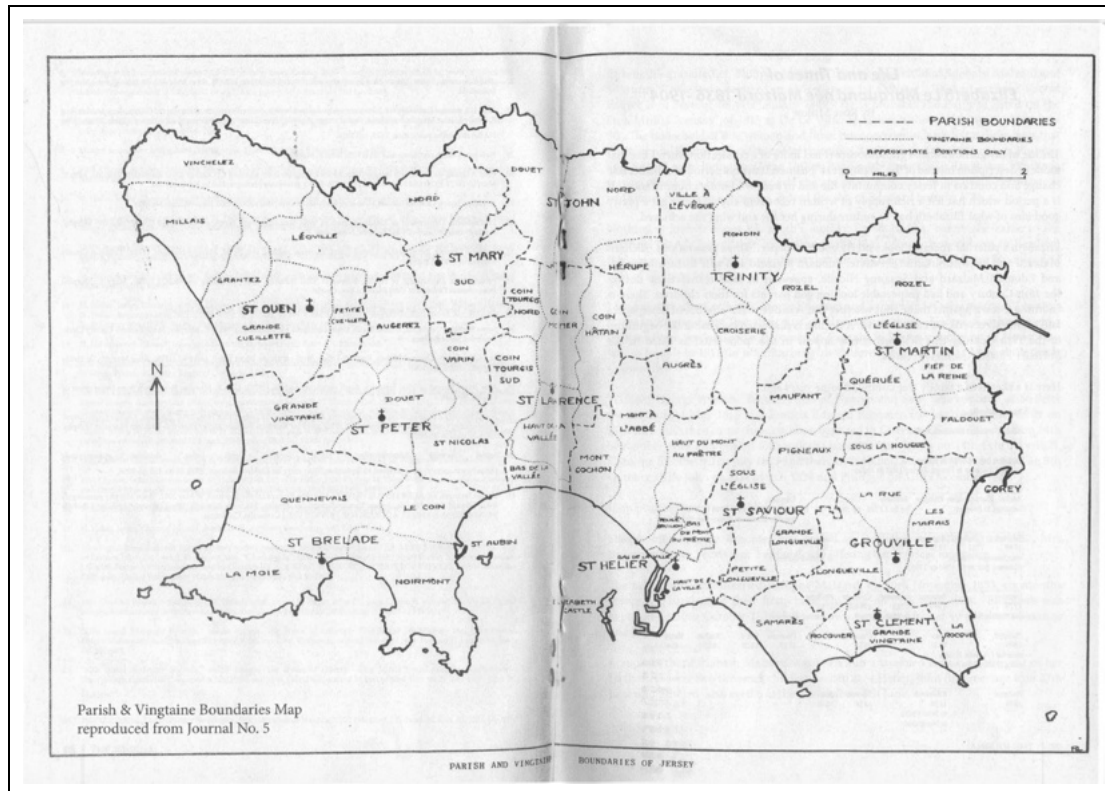

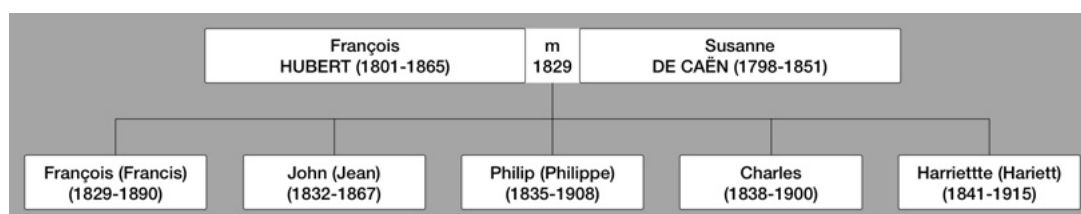

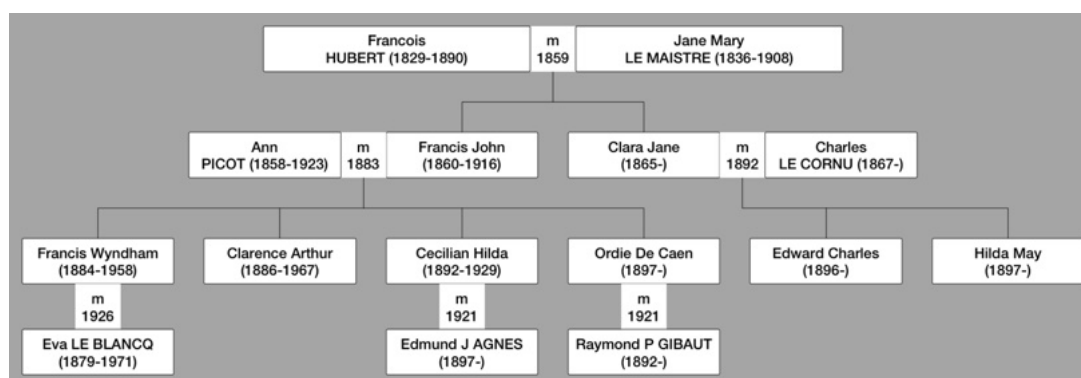
Location of Oakdale [from Google map]

Family Tree Segments

These Family Tree segments are provided to assist the reader in understanding the relationships between the people described in the following section. The two tables are linked through Francois Hubert at lower left in the top diagram and upper left in the second. Anne's great-grandfather, John (Jean) Hubert, is the younger brother of Francois.

Francois Hubert (1801-1865) and Susanne de Caën (1798-1851)

Susanne was baptised in the parish of St Mary on 28 Oct 1798, the daughter of Jean de Caën and Margueritte Syvret. Her godparents were Jean Helier Dumaesq (Gent) and Susanne Le Gros Bisson.

She married Francois Hubert in St Mary on 24 Oct 1829.

Susanne died in 1851 and her funeral service was held at St Mary's Church on August 1st. The attached diagram indicates the location of Susanne's grave at 'de Caen 81' and both Susanne and her husband Francois Hubert are marked as in this grave.

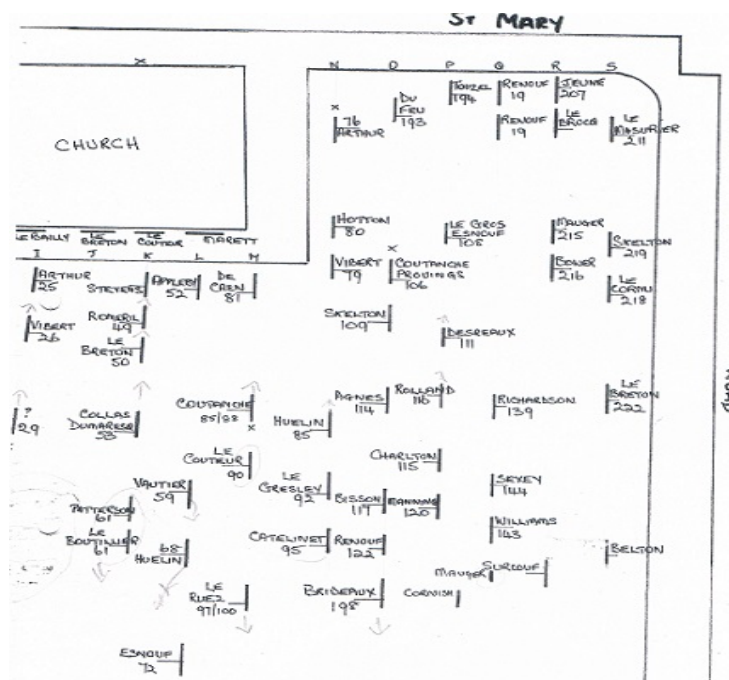

Francois Hubert (1829-1890) and Jane Mary Le Maistre (1836-)

Francois was born on 27 Nov 1829 and baptized at home in the parish of St Mary on 2 Dec 1829 suggesting that he was not expected to live. He was not presented at the church until 2 May 1830.

Francois married Jane Mary Le Maistre at St Ouen's Church on 28 Aug 1859.

Jane Mary Le Maistre was the daughter of Edouard Le Maistre and Jane Huelin. She was born in the parish of St Ouen and baptised at the parish church on 28 Aug 1836.

Burial records for Francois and his wife have not been located but they are listed in the indexes. The Registry Office would be needed to find out dates and cause of death. (St Peter 1888-1898 page 86 for Francois Hubert and St Mary 1900-1926 page 114 for Jane Mary Hubert.)

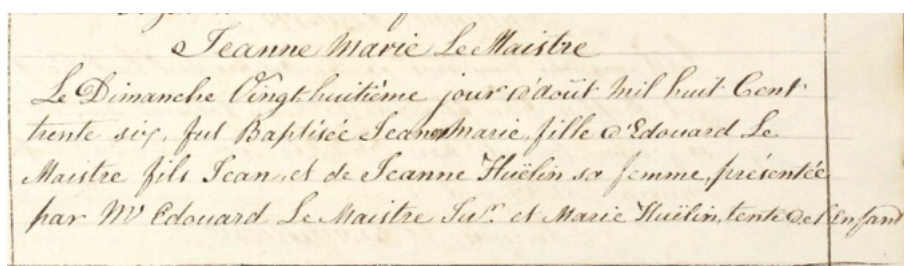

Philip (Philippe) Hubert (1835-1908)

Philip Hubert was born on 5 Sept 1835; he was baptized in the parish of St Mary but may have been born in St Peter. He was the son of Francois Hubert and Susanne de Caen who also acted as his godparents.

On the 1841 census he is to be found living with his parents and siblings in the Augerez district of St Peter.

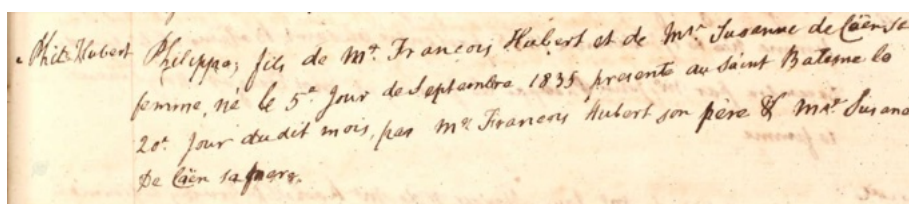
On the 1851 census (where the family have been transcribed as Nuest), they are still living in the Augerez district although no specific address is given.

In 1861 Philip, aged 25 is still at home and the address is given as Military Road, St Peter. Philip's occupation is Mariner.

From the British Merchant Seaman's records from 1853 this could be Philip although there was another Philip born in St Ouen in 1836 who was also a sailor.

Philip Hubert (1835) does not appear on any Jersey censuses after 1861. There is no record that he ever married.

There are a number of records of his activities in Newfoundland where he died in 1908.

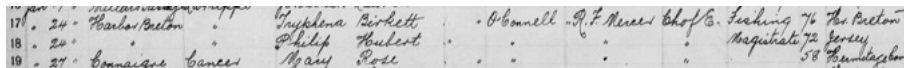

Charles Hubert (1838-1900) and Nancy Giot (-1892)

Charles Hubert was born on 22 Mar 1838 and was baptized on 1 April of the same year in the parish of St Mary. His godparents were Jean Syvret and Marguerite Syvret.

In 1841, 1851 and 1861 he was at home with his parents and siblings. In 1871 he is living with the Syvret family and described as cousin of the householder, the inclusion of the name de Caen in the names of some of the Syvret children suggests that they were indeed related on his mother's side. Charles worked as a Carpenter.

On 4 Feb 1877 Charles married Nancy Giot at St Martin's church.

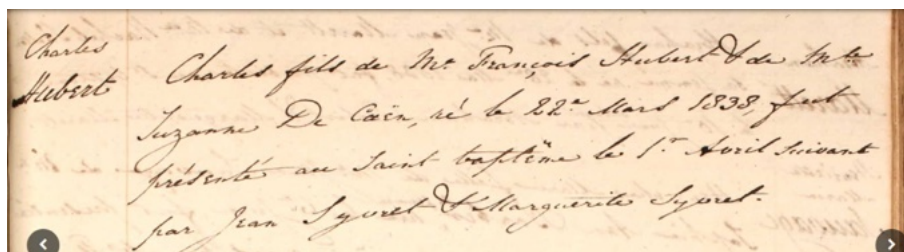
By 1881 Charles and Nancy are living in St Peter next door to Charles' elder brother Francis. He is probably living in a property belonging to the main house. Charles and Nancy have no children and Charles is farming 2 acres of land.

In 1891 Charles has returned to Carpentry and although still living in St Peter is not at the same address.

In November 1891 Nancy is admitted to the Workhouse at the General Hospital, the reason for her admission being given as 'Indigence' (a state of extreme poverty). The record states that she is wife of Charles Hubert and that her husband was also in the Hospital. There is also a note in the register saying that she died on 3 May 1892. Her funeral service was conducted at All Saint's Church in St Helier.

It seems as if Charles fell on hard times and spent nearly 10 years in the St Helier Workhouse with admission entries being recorded between 1891 and his death in 1900.

Charles died on 27 Dec 1900 and his funeral service was conducted at St Andrew's Church. He was buried in Mont a l'Abbe cemetery in St Helier at Block R, Plot 33, Grave S2.

Pam's email of 4/8/17: As an inmate of the Workhouse any expenses that arose in connection with him would have been charged to the parish of his birth. At one point he had to go before the Hospital Committee to prove that he had been born in St Mary. A neighbour testified on his behalf. I did wonder why his family were not caring for him as they didn't seem to be exactly strapped for cash but of course we will never know the full story. Perhaps they had initially tried to help, hence the smallholding on his brother's property, but had eventually been forced to wash their hands of him.

Ann Picot was baptised in 1858 and her record does not show a middle name. The name Ann S Picot appears to be that of a different person.

From the 2 census lists below we have the extraordinary coincidence of 2 Anns marrying 2 Francis John Huberts, one in Guernsey and one in Jersey..

Francis and Ann married in St Helier Town Church on 29 Nov 1883.

A rental agreement was drawn up in 12 January 1895 between first cousins Horatio John Hubert and Francis John Hubert in order that Horatio could be absolved of future liabilities from the estate.

There are no records of the funerals of this branch of the Hubert family however death records exist. (St Peter's deaths indexes for 1911-1930: Page 117 Francis John Hubert; Page 327 Ann Hubert; Page 327 Ann Picot; Page 494 Cecilian Hilda Hubert).

The funeral of Cecilian Hilda Hubert was held at St Peter's Church on 25 Nov 1929. She was the wife of Edmund John Agnes and died of Pulmonary Tuberculosis on 22 Nov aged 37 years and 10 months.

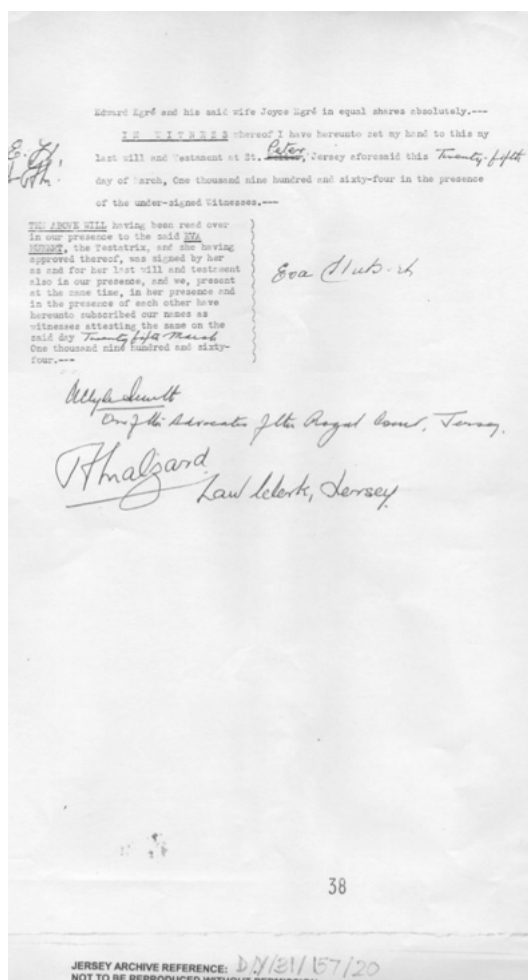
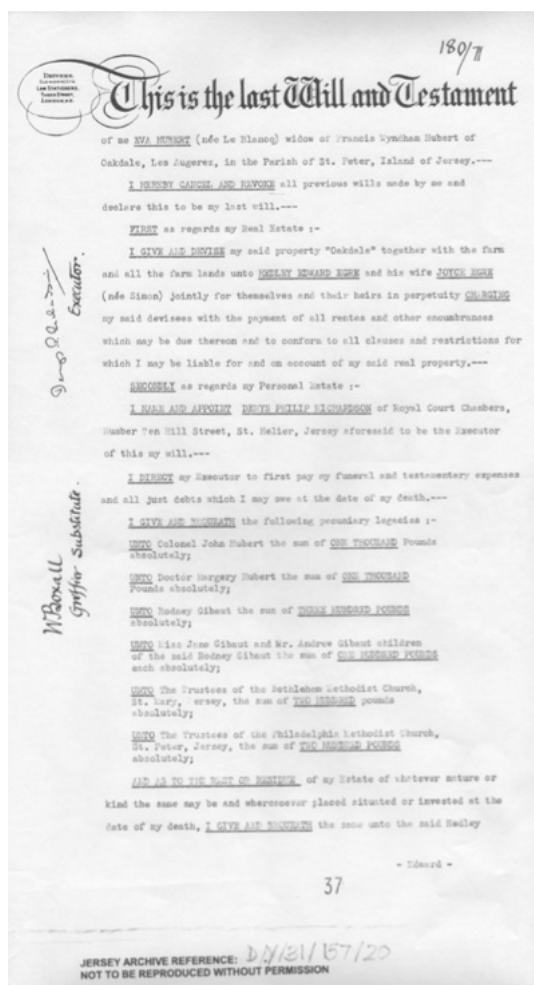

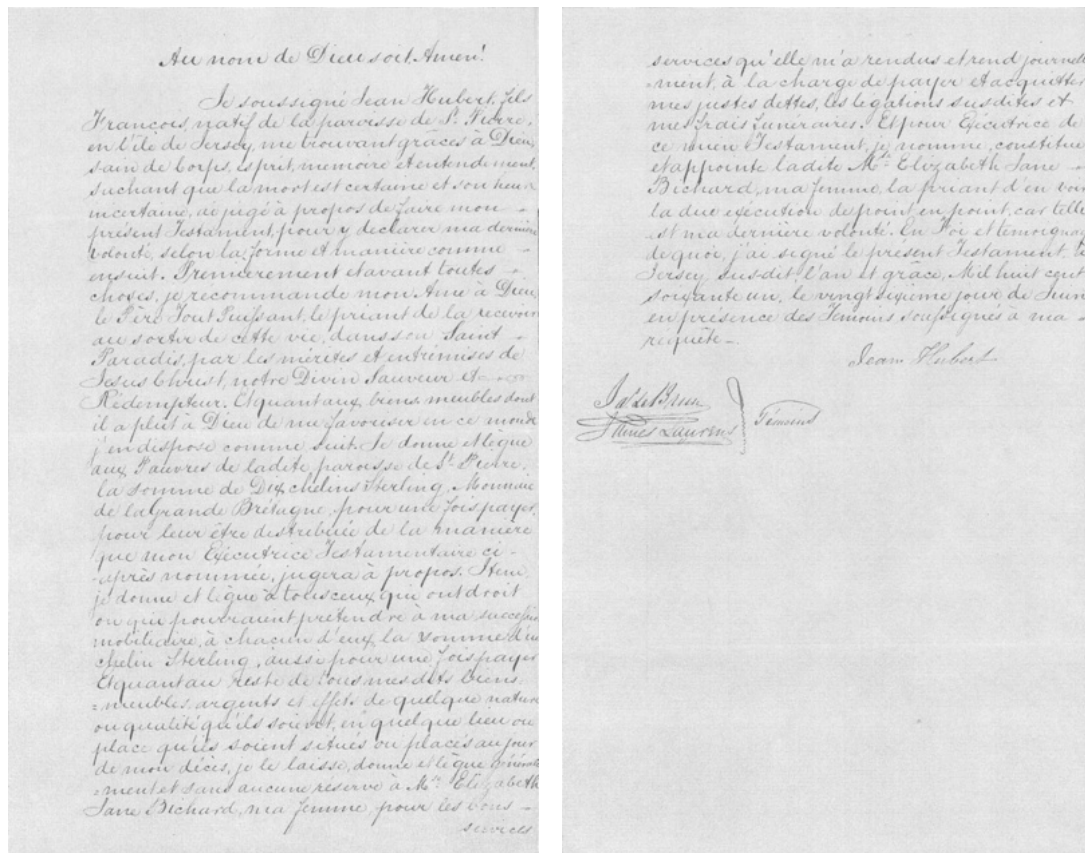
Eva and Francis Wyndham Hubert approx. 1952

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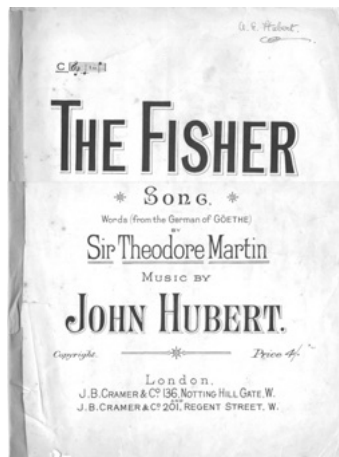
