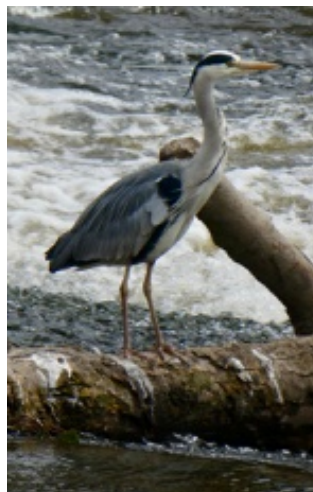

We finished our South Australian holiday with a Murray River Cruise on the famous beautifully-restored paddle-wheel steamer, the Murray Princess, and returning on the Indian Pacific train to Sydney via Broken Hill.

The adventure took us to Manchester, London, and then across the channel by Eurostar to Paris for our French river cruise. While in the UK we managed to catch up with Don and Vera, Val and Chris, Jenny and John, and Anne's niece Nicola with her younger son William to visit Buckingham Palace Mews and Westminster Cathedral on a freezing cold snowy day!

On the way we made several land tours including bus drives to see the Ardèche National Park, the World Heritage Museum of the Caverne du Pont-d'Arc, the Camargue district and Vincent van Gogh's refuge at Saint Rémy de Provence where he painted so many of his masterpieces.

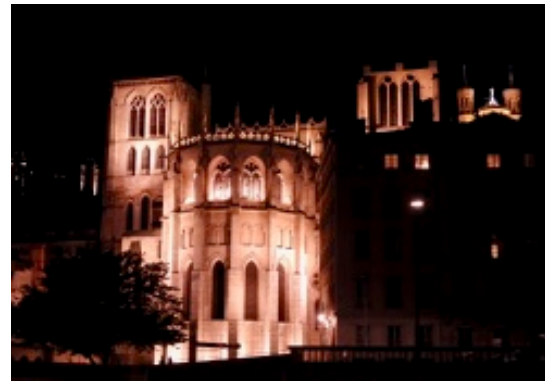
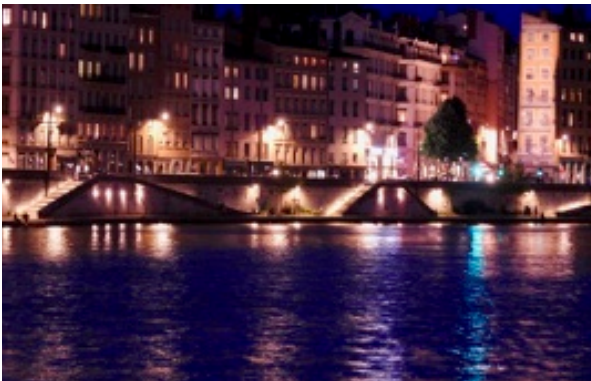

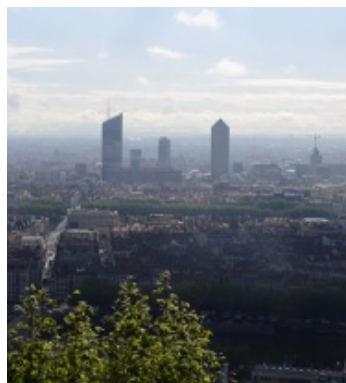
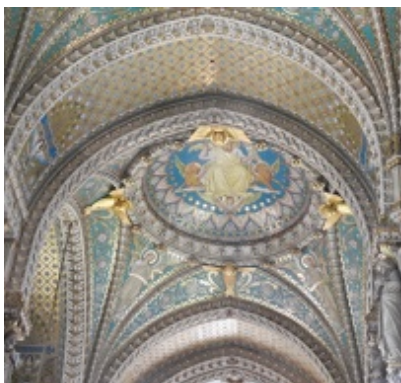

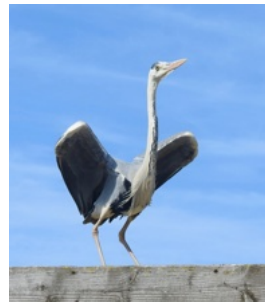

Singapore was a welcome three-day break during our return, where we rested and caught up with Derek's elder son Pete, his wife and their two sons, and did a bit of wandering round the Malay Quarter (part of Singapore we had missed on previous visits) and explored the fascinating Jewel at Changi Airport before flying home.

The trek was in mid-winter but still hot, the terrain rugged and tough but an unforgettable experience. Aboriginal art caves and dips into several pools below spectacular waterfalls made the days even more enjoyable, with of course the (not very) glamp-camping.

During the first week in October we flew via Melbourne and Launceston to Flinders Island off the north eastern tip of Tasmania. We hired a rough old car to get around staying in a very comfortable resort (the only affordable one on the Island). Being out of season we had the whole place to ourselves and were very spoiled by our host, who also helped us plan to get maximum benefit from our three days exploring and fed us excellent meals. The weather was very kind, being warm with only two showers of rain during the whole stay. It was sad to leave.

From Flinders Island we returned to Launceston to collect a car and take a leisurely drive down to Hobart, staying in an old guest-house at the top of Battery Point with fantastic views across the river Derwent.

After enjoying Salamanca Market and the Botanic Gardens, Dave set off to join a group taking the Three Capes Lodge Walk (a four-day 45 kms walk by the Tasmanian Walking Company) in style, staying at up-market lodges offering comfort, good dining, wine, and with magnificent views (helped by magnificent weather).



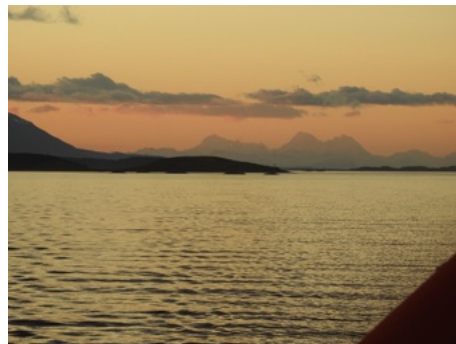

Anne in the meanwhile did her own exploring, spending a day on a small bus tour to Bruny Island, travelling across the ferry from Kettering in the north, down through the neck to the Penguin Rookery to the far southern tip and Cape Bruny lighthouse. On the way various Bruny Island delicacies were sampled – oysters, cheeses, chocolates, fudge, honey, breads and even a whiskey distillery. She also visited the Museum and Art Gallery and took a cruise on the Derwent. Our last day was occupied by a drive to the top of Mount Wellington to admire the views – it was freezing cold and very windy!

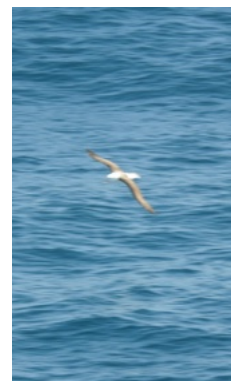
Dave was finally able to tick off a long-standing bucket list item with a fabulous cruise with Dr Karl Kruszelnicki to Antarctica in November/December. It was organised by World Expeditions with Arctic and Antarctic cruise experts Oceanwide Expeditions who were excellent throughout.

The cruise was for 12 days from Ushuaia at the tip of Argentina across Drake Passage to the northernmost part of mainland Antarctica, seeing penguins, whales, seals and many seabirds, encountering icebergs and glaciers and taking shore excursions on zodiacs to hike around on snowshoes. The ship also visited Chilean and British Antarctic base camps – the latter with a postal service for Antarctica-stamped postcards! One of the highlights of the cruise was the series of talks given by world experts on Antarctic wildlife and ecosystem as well as cosmology and global warming.

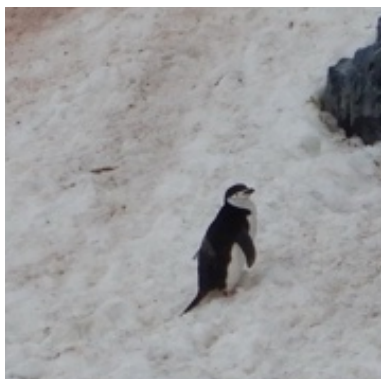

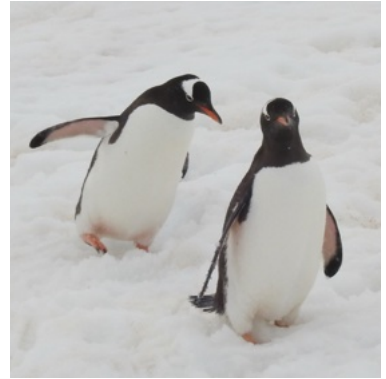

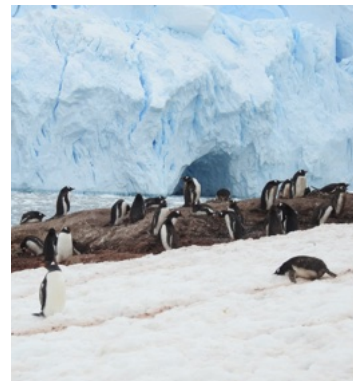
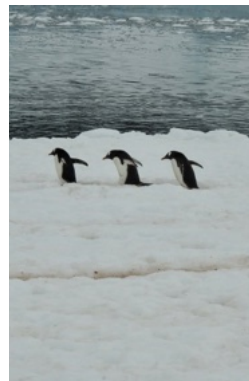
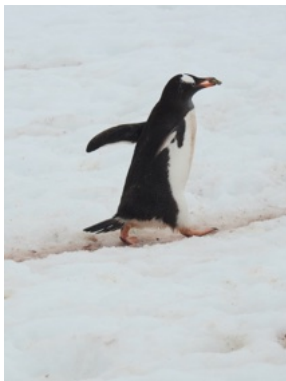
Drake Passage – A very calm crossing of the Drake Passage was accompanied by lots of seabirds, including Wandering Albatross (left) and Cape Petrel (right)

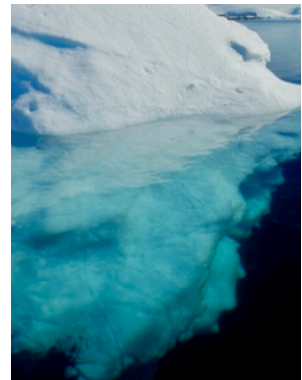
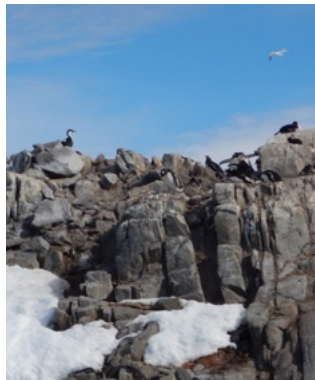
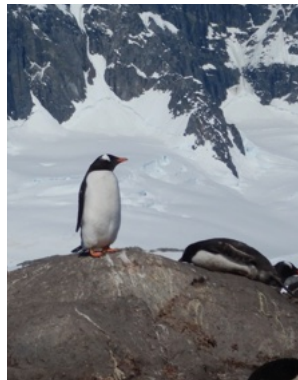

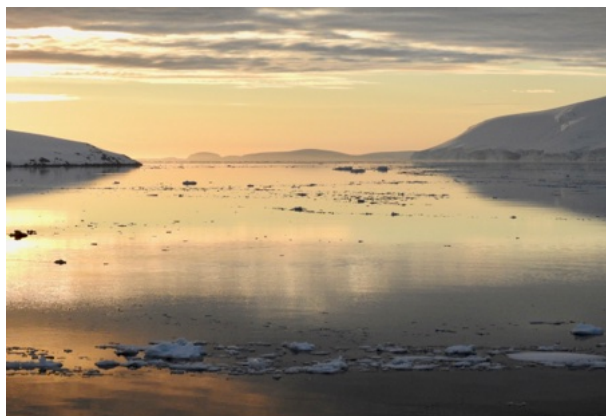

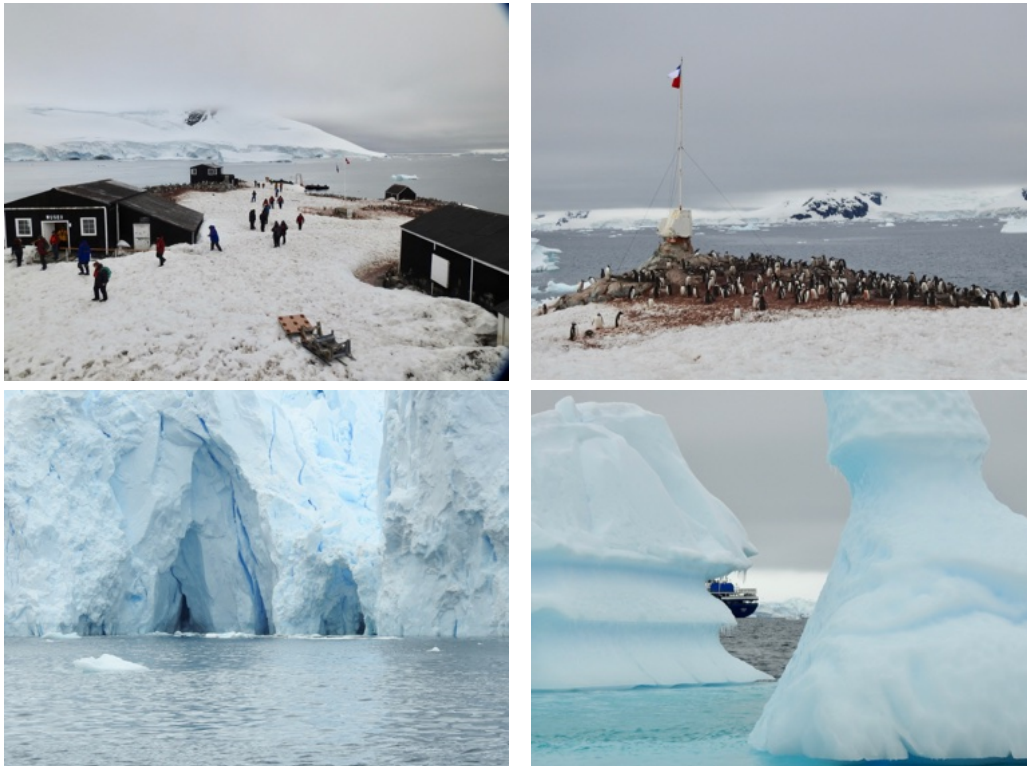
