LANTERN WALK

Each November, Raleigh Day School celebrates The Lantern Walk as a reminder that each of us has a divine spark and inner light that we must ferry out into the world and share with others. The festival is held after dusk, when our lantern light breaks through the outer darkness of approaching winter. It marks the end of harvest and the beginning of winter.

The festival, often called Martinmas, originates from St. Martin of Tours, who started out as a Roman soldier. He was baptized as an adult and became a monk. It is understood that he was a kind man who led a quiet and simple life.

The most famous legend of his life is that he once cut his cloak in half to share with a beggar during a snowstorm, to save the beggar from dying from the cold. St. Martin is known as a friend of the children and patron of the poor.

In preparation for this annual tradition, the children hear the story of St. Martin, sing songs and make their own lanterns in class. As darkness falls, we will walk along a path through the woods, singing our lantern songs and carefully carrying our lanterns in a mood of peaceful reverence. This symbolic act brings home the deeper truth, in the words of Siddhartha Gautama, the founder of Buddhism: "There isn't enough darkness in the entire world to snuff out the light of one little candle."

Please plan to gather at the site of our Lantern Walk (location TBA) promptly at 5pm Thursday November 9th! Please dress your children warmly!!! You will be greeted upon arrival and you child(ren) will be given the lantern they made in school.

Please remember that this is a time for your children to find the light within the changing of seasons. We ask that conversations are kept to a quiet minimum in order that we may help the children uphold the reverence of the time we are together. It is not necessary to 'explain' the purpose of the festival to the children. Rather we encourage you to allow them to rest in the experience of the evening, the deeper meanings penetrating each person as they are ready to receive the message.

We look forward to sharing this beautiful, reverent evening with you and your children!
