

Holistic Divine Anthropomorphism (HDA)

- **Beyond Physicality:** HDA moves away from treating God's "hands" or "eyes" literally, focusing instead on "divine anthropopathy"—attributing the highest, purest forms of human emotion (love, compassion) and intellectual capacity (creativity, wisdom) to the divine.
- **Experiential Reality:** This paradigm relies on direct experiential, "first-person" awareness of connection to the cosmos, rather than abstract, objective, or purely intellectualized theological concepts.

In essence, Holistic Divine Anthropomorphism is a shift in consciousness from a mechanistic, disconnected, and ego-driven worldview to a participatory one, where the individual recognizes themselves as a sentient, creative, and loving node within a divine, intelligent universe.
