### "Somos personas"

In the July/August issue of Spirituality and Health, money writer Paul Sutherland writes of traveling to a beach in Nicaragua with his family. During the long drive in their van, they came to a narrow street in the village of Santa Teresa. THUD! Sutherland's front tire lodged in an uncovered drainage hole. Some men from the village saw their plight and came over to push the van, but it wouldn't budge.

As Sutherland tried to figure out what to do next, a farmer drove by on his tractor. He pulled ahead of the van and stopped in the middle of the narrow street and looked under the van. Without saying a word, he ran to a little nearby shop and came back with a length of blue rope. He secured the van's chassis with the rope and attached it to a chain he had with tractor. In a *minuto corto,* he pulled the van out.

Sutherland was overcome with gratitude. "Gracias. Thank you. Gracias," Sutherland said as he tried to hand the farmer some money. But the farmer refused, saying "Somos personas." "For your family," Sutherland said, but he still refused to take the money. "Somos personas," the farmer repeated.

When Paul and his family got back in the van and started on their way, his daughter Akasha asked, "Dad, do you know what he was saying?" No, Dad said.

"Dad, he was saying 'We are people.' Dad, he was saying we are the same, we are all people. We are here to help one another. We are people. Somos personas."

In today's Gospel, it is the Canaanite woman pleading for her daughter who reflects God's vision of our shared humanity. Despite the ridicule and abuse she endures, she believes in the idea of *Somos personas*, that "we are people" all held in the hand and heart of God. In honoring the goodness and love of the Canaanite mother for her sick child — who, as a Canaanite, represents one of Israel's most despised enemies — Christ opens our eyes and hearts to see one another as God sees us. Paul Sutherland comes to that realization in the generosity of a poor Nicaraguan farmer. The call to discipleship demands that we look beyond labels and stereotypes to realize that every one of us is a child of God, brothers and sisters all.
