Teaching generosity

To the Onondaga people of northeast North America, instilling in their children a spirit of gratitude and generosity is critical to the child's development and the good of the community.

When an Onondaga child is old enough to understand, the tribe gathers in a circle. The child is brought into the center of the circle and given sweet and cool things to drink. After the child has had his or her fill, a voice comes from outside the circle, crying, "I'm thirsty, I'm thirsty," and the child is encouraged to take the drink to the thirsty person.

The child is brought back into the circle and served delicious food. After the child eats, a voice outside the circle is heard, "I'm hungry, I'm hungry," and again, the child is taught to leave the circle to feed the hungry person.

The child returns to the circle and is given beautiful, warm clothes to wear — and a third time, a voice calls from outside the circle, "I'm cold, I'm cold," and the child is helped to gather up clothes and blankets to warm the freezing person.

The Onondaga people realize that the most effective way of teaching such generosity to their children is to model such kindness and empathy in their own lives.

The most important lessons we learn in life are usually the hardest; realizing that we have a responsibility to our families and communities can be a hard lesson to learn — and to teach. The Gospel can be difficult to embrace: Jesus' demand that his disciples must be forgiving and merciful runs counter to what human convention dictates; Gospel justice and compassion can make us very uncomfortable and uneasy. Many of us struggle to "endure this kind of talk" not because we don't understand Jesus but because we understand Jesus all too well. As the Onondaga people practice and teach, compassion, mercy and forgiveness are hard lessons to live in the challenging and complex lives we live but, in our struggles to act faithfully and with hope, we can "grow up" to understand that we are part of a world much greater than ourselves, that we are connected to everyone through the dignity we all share as sons and daughters of God.


SAINT ANNE'S OIL: These are available at the parish office. We ask a \$7 offering for each.

HIPPO: Born November 13 354, died August 28, 430, AD, was a Roman African, early Christian theologian and philosopher from Numidia. His writings influenced the

development of the Western Church and Western philosophy, and indirectly all of Western Christianity. He was the bishop of Hippo Regius in North Africa and for his writings in the Patristic Period is viewed as one of the most important Church Fathers of the Latin Church. Among his most important works are The City of God, De doctrina Christiana, and Confessions.
