Mark 7: 1-8, 14-15, 21-23

"We've gathered you here this evening . . . "

From the commercial, you think this company is your best friend. They understand your problem. They know the struggles you are dealing with. They've been there, too, and they want to help. They have the product or service that will make your life so much better, because they care about you — yes, you! But once you swipe your credit card, the relationship is pretty much over — save for the warranty printed out in four-point type.

We've all been to one of those dinners. The president and alumni staff of your *alma mater* come to town. You go mainly to see your old college buddies. While you catch up, the college staff is setting up "the presentation." Then the president speaks. He or she extends greetings from everyone on campus and expresses their continued pride in their many successful graduates (including, you —yes, you!). And the "presentation" is underway: *This is the future we see for our college — our college. We want you to continue to be a part of the future of your alma mater.* The evening is no longer about catching up with old pals or free drinks, but an appeal for your — yes, your — support.

We owe it to one another as responsible citizens to meet the candidates. Many of us voters make it a point to spend time listening to those seeking elected office. We're impressed with the candidates' ideas, dedication and earnestness. They project empathy and understanding; they identify with us and our dreams and wants for our families. But the cynical and jaded side of our brain remains aware that what comes out of many politicians' mouths are determined by what tests well with focus groups and what plays best in polls. In the end, it's not really about *us*.

Too often our words express concern and compassion for others — but it becomes clear that the words are prompted by another agenda. Compassion and mercy, empathy and generosity begin in our hearts, in the place where God dwells; conversely, avarice, bigotry and pride come from a heart in which self-centeredness has replaced the holy. As Jesus makes clear in today's Gospel, the kind of human being we are begins in the values of the heart, the place where God dwells with us — but the evil we are capable of, the hurt we are able to inflict on others, the degrading of the world that God created begins "within," as well. May God open our spirits and consciences to listen to the voice of God speaking in that sacred space within every heart, calling us to understanding instead of judgment, forgiveness instead of vengeance, respect instead of ridicule, reconciliation instead of division.

CONDOLENCES: We offer our prayerful condolences to the families of the late Cameron Carew and Kathryn Kays. May they rest in peace.



Christians to pray and care for God's creation. It's a time to reflect on our relationship with the environment — not just "distant" nature, but, crucially, the place where we live — and the ways in which our lifestyles and decisions as a society can endanger both the natural world and those inhabiting it, both humans and other creatures.

The ecumenical steering committee that plans and promotes the season each year put it this way:

The Season of Creation is a time to renew our relationship with our Creator and all creation through celebration, conversion, and commitment together. During the Season of Creation, we join our sisters and brothers in the ecumenical family in prayer and action for our common home.

It's a time of prayer, contemplation and, increasingly, calls to action.

The Season of Creation spans 34 days.

It begins Sept. 1, the World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation. It concludes Oct. 4, the feast of St. Francis of Assisi, the patron saint of ecology.

As it happens, the season aligns with the fall harvest season — a time when the state of the Earth might be front of mind for many people.
