A new dad learns to walk on water

He and his wife have just learned they're going to be parents for the first time. They're over the moon with joy.

A few weeks later, the soon-to-be dad meets his own dad for a round of golf. The future grandpa quickly realizes that his son is not into the game, that he's distracted, that he's missing simple chip shots and making mental errors that he never makes. Of course, he knows what's going on and, after the game, over beers, he asks, "Son, how are you and Sheila doing?"

"OK, fine, good," he quietly responds.

His father gently presses, "Is everything really OK?"

It's just enough of an opening.

"Dad, I gotta tell you. I'm scared to death. I don't know how to be a father. I feel like I'm still a kid myself. What if I mess this kid up for life?"

That's the beginning of a long talk between father and father-to-be. The experienced parent shares, with candor and insight, his own terror when his first child was born, the mistakes he made (none did any permanent damage), what he learned from those mistakes, and how being a dad has been the best thing he's done in his life.

His son seems to brighten; his characteristic coolness and calm begins to return. He asks all kinds of questions that his dad answers from the wisdom of his own experience.

That was the first of many conversations between father and son that continued long after the father became a father himself.

Just about every milestone, every new experience in life, can be terrifying. But the Jesus who calms the storm in today's Gospel is present to this father-to-be in the reassuring wisdom of his own dad. In the embrace of our beloved, in the helping hand of a friend, in the counsel of a wise teacher or coach, Jesus reaches out to save us in the darkest times; in the smallest acts of compassion and forgiveness that we give and receive, God reveals his presence in our midst.

SAINT CLARE OF ASSISI: August 11 is the feast



day of Saint Clare of Assisi. She was the foundress of an order of nuns known today as the Order of Saint Clare. At the age of 18, she heard Saint Francis of Assisi preach and was moved to imitate him and serve Jesus. Saint Francis himself cut her hair short and gave her a rough brown robe to wear. She went to live in a Benedictine nun's monastery and was eventually joined by her sister. The two remained there until a separate dwelling was built for them next to the church of San Damiano. Other women who wished to live a life of poverty as brides of Jesus eventually joined them. Clare and her fellow nuns wore no shoes, ate no meat, lived in a poorhouse, and kept silent most times. She is the patron saint of television, eye disease, goldsmiths and laundry.

SAINT MAXIMILIAN KOLBE: The feast day of



Saint Maximilian Kolbe is August 14. Born Raymund Kolbe, he changed his name to Maximilian Maria when he became a priest. Early in his priesthood, he operated a religious publishing press and founded monasteries in Japan and India. Poor health forced him to return to Poland and, when World War II began, he provided shelter to those fleeing the Nazis. In 1941, Father Kolbe was arrested by the Nazis and was sent to Auschwitz. While he was there, the Nazis decided to starve some prisoners to death as a warning against escapes. Father Kolbe offered to take the place of a man with a family. He was the last of the group to remain alive, and the guards finally killed him by giving him a lethal injection. He is the patron saint of drug addicts, prisoners, families, and the pro-life movement.

VIGIL LIGHTS (votive candles): Due to the pandemic we cannot have different people lighting different candles. For that reason the votive candle stand had been removed for the time being. We will however try something a little different. The votive candle stand will be put back in place but parishioners are not allowed to light candles by themselves. The candle will be lit by one of the parish representatives who is an usher or registrar for that day. Please remember at all times to maintain physical distancing. Offerings for the candles must be placed in an envelope and deposited in the offertory basket.
