THE STORY OF THE CANDY CANE: In Indiana,

a candy maker wanted to make a candy that could be a reminder of Jesus Christ, so he made the

Christmas candy cane. He started off with a stick of pure white hard candy. The white color symbolized the

virgin birth and the sinless nature of Jesus, and the hard candy symbolized the solid rock which was the foundation of the church, and firmness of the promises of God. The candy maker made the candy in the form of a J, which represented the name of Jesus and the staff of the Good Shepherds. He then stained it with three stripes which showed the scourging Jesus received, and symbolized the blood shed by Christ on the cross. When you break the cane, it reminds us that Jesus' body was broken for us.

THE TWELVE DAYS OF CHRISTMAS: The song " The twelve days of Christmas" was written to be a kind of secret catechism at a time when Catholicism was outlawed. Each verse refers to a teaching of church doctrine — with Christ being the partridge and the "True Love" being God the Father, who gave us all gifts. The twelve days of Christmas begin on Christmas Day, December 25<sup>th</sup> and end at Epiphany, January 6<sup>th</sup>.

**Partridge in a pear tree**: Jesus. **Two turtledoves**: the Old and New Testaments.

Three French hens: faith, hope and love. Four calling birds: the four Gospels. Five gold rings: the first five books of the Old

Testament.

Six geese a-laying: the six days of creation. Seven swans a-swimming: the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit.

**Eight maids a-milking**: the eight Beatitudes. Nine ladies dancing: the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit.

**Ten lords a-leaping**: the Ten Commandments. **Eleven pipers piping**: the eleven faithful Apostles.

**Twelve drummers drumming**: the twelve points of belief in the Apostles Creed.
