The Child Jesus at Tautra Mariakloster

On the Norwegian island of Tautra, a community of 13 Cistercian nuns live a life of prayer and service. Our Lady of Safe Island — Tautra Mariakloster in Norwegian — was first established eight centuries ago; in 1999, seven sisters from Our Lady of Mississippi Abbey in Iowa re-established the abbey on the shores of beautiful Trondheim Fjord.

In a new book, Northern Lights, four of the sisters write about their experiences as monastics living close to the land, sky and water of the island, following the rhythms of the liturgical year in the rare light and darkness of the austere Scandinavian landscape.

In a Christmas essay, Sister Maria Rafael Bartlett writes:

"... as I walk from the rectory along the stone-floored cloister to the church, I pass our smooth white statue of a young, seated Mary and the small child Jesus a naked toddler standing close beside her. It reflects the tremendous fact that at the incarnation, God became a real human being. In our statue, Jesus is a normal little boy, his legs bent casually so that he leans informally, with an intimate familiarity, against his mother's skirts. He is not portrayed as a haloed figure of precocious wisdom but as a real child. His nakedness reveals his vulnerability and his proximity to an innocent babyhood. With the fertile fire of his own Spirit, God ignited a new life within the Virgin's womb: God himself entered her womb. Who could have imagined that the all-powerful God would accomplish so intimate an entry into human life? With that instant, the world and what it means to be human changed forever."

In Jesus' birth as a vulnerable, innocent child, what it means to be human is changed forever: we are not limited by our struggle to survive but can experience a much deeper and fulfilling meaning to our time here; we are more than our race and gender and nationality but possess a dignity of the "sacred" that opens our hearts to care for one another and this gifted earth we share; we embrace God's call to realize God's dream of a world re-created in the holy wisdom of justice, mercy and peace. Christmas is both a gift and a challenge: to embrace with gratitude and wonder the sacredness of our humanity and honor the sacred dignity of every human being of every race and people, every culture and nationality, as the beloved of God.


