"Unmasked"

Facemasks have become part of our basic wardrobe and will continue to be for a while longer. They now come in fashionable colors and prints, emblazoned with cool images and advertising logos. We still don't like wearing them — they're uncomfortable, they're hot, they make it hard to hear what someone is saying.

But we wear them. At least, most of us do.

Our masks have "unmasked "us.

These pieces of cloth make a statement. The way we see the world and our place in it is expressed in our half-hidden faces. Our wearing a mask during this pandemic is a sign of our humility before one another: that we're concerned about one another enough to wear this uncomfortable face guard. It's a sign of our love for those closest to us: that we will put our own comfort aside to protect them. It's accepting our responsibility for the common good: the safety of the larger community must take precedence to my own wants and preferences and profit. The masks we wear "unmask" our true values and beliefs.

Our masks reveal something deeper that exists within us, the Spirit of God.

It's that Holy Spirit of compassion and peace that enables us to take on the "unclean spirits" around us - and within us. We can cast out the "unclean spirits" of anger, fear and hurt that isolate us, that mire us in fear and selfishness, that blind us to the love of God in our midst. To cast out such demons requires refocusing our attention from what is missing in our lives to what we have been given, from lamenting our regrets and disappointments to finding meaning in what we can do for others. In our own acts of compassion and generosity — including wearing facemasks during this difficult time — we speak with the voice of Christ to "drive out" the unclean spirits that "possess" our minds and hearts and "dispossess" us of the things of God.

FEAST OF THE PRESENTATION OF THE LORD -**TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 2nd**. The feast was first observed in the Eastern Church as "The Encounter." In the sixth century, it began to be observed in the West: in Rome with a more penitential character and in Gaul (France) with solemn blessings and processions of candles, popularly known as "Candlemas". The Presentation of the Lord concludes the celebration of the Nativity and with the offerings of the Blessed Virgin and the prophecy of Simeon, the events now point toward Easter. In obedience to the Old Law, the Lord Jesus, the first born, was presented in the Temple by his Blessed Mother and his foster father. This is another 'epiphany' celebration insofar as the Christ Child is revealed as the Messiah through the canticle and words of Simeon and the testimony of Anna the prophetess. Christ is the light of the nations, hence the blessing and procession of candles on this day. There will be a blessing of candles at the beginning of the 7pm Mass on that day. People are invited to bring candles with them so that they can be blessed on that day. These candles then can be used in your homes and lit especially for times of prayer or anytime you wish to see the light shining in any darkness you may experience.

WORLD DAY FOR CONSECRATED LIFE - 2021

Is celebrated on the feast day of the Presentation of the Lord in the Temple -February 2nd - 40 days after He was born, On this day, we remember with gratitude the men and women who have dedicated themselves to the solemn vows of poverty, chastity and obedience and in so doing, have given themselves wholly to the Lord and His mission. Take a moment to thank, support and /or pray for those who have given themselves in our own Diocese and those whom the Lord is calling to serve His people in a complete surrender of their lives.
