November 28, 2021 – 1ST Sunday of Advent

"But when these signs begin to happen, stand erect and raise your heads because your redemption is at hand."

Luke 21: 25-28, 34-36

My harshest judge: Me . . .

We can't get that photograph out of our minds. It might have been a picture or video of a lost child in Afghanistan or Haiti or Sudan, or a boy homeless on the streets of an American city, or a girl in desperate need of medical care her family can't afford. Those eyes could be the eyes of our own child; the crooked smile could be that of our own son or daughter or the child next door. It's clear that we've failed these children . . .

We recognize the number on our phone immediately. What trouble did he or she get into this time? We let the number ring through. Later, we learn what happened. If we had only taken the call . . .

We lost it. We were having a bad day — and decided everyone around us should have a bad day, too. It was a simple mistake, an innocent joke we took the wrong way, an accident. And we blew up. We took no prisoners. The silence after our blast was worse than the tears and awkwardness that followed. And we felt awful . . .

In today's Gospel, Jesus foretells the "Son of Man" coming in judgement, but in many ways, God's judgement has already come upon us. The theologian Gerhard Lohfrink writes in <u>Is</u> This All There <u>Is</u>? that we "pass judgement on ourselves in the face of the 'victims' we have created and implacably rise before our eyes in death: the many we have not helped, even though we could have; the many we could have consoled and did not; those for whom we could have been models of faith and were anything but; the many we overlooked, disappointed, shamed, despised, or led astray and misled; the many we exploited for our own purposes." May this Advent season be a season of "judgement" in which we are able to see God in the faces of those we have hurt, let down or victimized — and may our "judgement" lead to our redemption before the God of mercy and forgiveness.
