# A Note from the Dastor

Dear siblings in Christ,

First, pause, and go read Exodus 4:1-15 (but especially verses 13-15) [which is included in this newsletter on page 10. Then come back and we'll dive in to this story.

As far as I know, this is the first time that God is described as getting angry. Which is actually kind of impressive. God has had to deal with so much ridiculousness from God's people in the first two books of the Bible, like: Adam and Eve doing their whole fruit eating thing, Cain and Abel's murder mystery, Noah's contemporaries being THE WORST, the superiority complex of the people building the tower of Babel, Joseph's brother's selling him into slavery, Jacob playing off two sisters (my heart aches for Leah), the people of Sodom and Gomorrah being horrible hosts...and so much more. So the fact that God hasn't been described as angry yet is shocking. And impressive.

But here we are, in Exodus, Moses is being asked to lead God's people out of slavery, and he's been given SO MANY signs that God will take care of him. And yet, Moses is *still* afraid because of his speech impediment, and so he says, "no thanks, send someone else, God." And this... THIS tips God over the edge.

Now, in this scene in Exodus, I am picturing God as a mom of a toddler. We see God trying lots of gentle strategies to coax Moses along into God's world. First, God tries a "play" strategy, where God plays with the staff Moses is holding and turns it into a snake. (A non-divine-toddler-mom would have to just pretend it was a snake, but God actually could and did make the staff into a snake and back again.)

But "playing" doesn't yield immediate results, so God moves to the next strategy, a classic "logic layout." In the real world, we might hear something like "Only hands without mittens on get frostbitten, so let's put our mittens on and get ready!" But the logic layout strategy also didn't cause Moses to jump up and say, "Okay! Let's do this!"

So God moves to strategy number three: a fun incentive, and is like "hm maybe we need a fun activity to look forward to in order to get us out of the house. Okay my sweet Moses, when we get there... we can turn water into blood! Yay!! Okay, let's go!" But still, Moses says "no" and Divine-Toddler-Mom-God loses it: "I've been trying all the strategies. Play. Logic. Fun Incentive. And none of it is working? Well then fine! I'm picking you up, putting on your shoes for you, and we're *going* whether you're screaming and crying or not. And your brother Aaron will do all the fun things instead of you. *But* you're still going and that's that!"

Pretty relatable, unfortunately. And yet, even in the moment of "divine-losing it," God was still so sweet. In Exodus 4:15, God says: "You, Moses, shall speak to Aaron and put the words in his mouth, and I, God, will be with your mouth <u>and</u> with his mouth and I, God, will teach you what you shall do." 

in the act of putting God's divine foot down and telling Moses: "too bad, you have to. Because I said so!" God is still promising to be with both Moses and Aaron in the work that is to come.

I wonder if this story of God might offer you some comfort. If you've ever been worried that God is angry at (or with) you or that God has abandoned you because God is too furious about something you've done, perhaps this story is a good one to hold on to. In the middle of a divine-rage moment over something Moses is doing (or maybe more like NOT doing), God was still tenderly committed to and compassionate with Moses. As though God was angrily shouting: "I am with you, Moses. Raging against a problem, not against you. And I will be with you – always. We will get through this together." So, if God can be so committed and compassionate to Moses, even in the middle of a rage moment, perhaps God can be committed to and compassionate with you as well. We know from the testimony of Scripture that God is slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love. As such, there is nothing you could ever do that would cause God to become so angry, that God would turn God's back on you. Rest secure in the knowledge that God did not abandon Moses in his act of defiance and refusal, and neither will God abandon you. Ever.

# **Fall 2025 Presbytery Meeting Elder Commissioner Report**

The Fall 2025 meeting of the Presbytery of Yukon was held October 9-11 at the Holy Spirit Center in Anchorage. Native Ministries met October 9, there was a presbytery retreat on October 10, and a business meeting on October 11. UCPC-affiliated attendees included Pastor Erika (Pastor Commissioner), Jim Durst (Ruling Elder Commissioner), Lois Hildenbrand (Commissioned Pastor), Paula Long (visiting ruling elder), Muffie Durst (visiting ruling elder, Bingle Camp Ministries), Rev. Charles Brower (Temporary Member of presbytery), Ron Illingworth (Ministry Commission Co-Chair), and Doreen McNeill (Stated Clerk). Guests from Outside included Rev. Tony Larson and Rev. CeCe Armstrong (Co-Moderators of PCUSA), Rev. Irv Porter (PCUSA Native American Intercultural Congregational Support), Rev. Sandra Moon (Presbyterian Foundation Ministry Relations Officer), and Rev. Jeanie Shaw (PCUSA Westcoast/Alaska Stewardship Officer).

The presbytery retreat focused on the stories we tell and hold onto—our own special times or objects, stories or events in the life of our home congregations, and stories or events in the life of the presbytery. In addition to time with each other in various groupings, we enjoyed a clear-weather afternoon visit to the Flattop observation area where all major mountains were visible. The evening worship service was a natural extension of this community building and a great dinner.

The business meeting was full of reports and substantive discussions. The presbytery continues to struggle with discerning how best to support the rural churches in a sustainable fashion as well as how and when to meet as a presbytery. The appropriate role and expectations for electronic communications remains elusive in an area as large and diverse as the presbytery. These discussions will continue and will have material short- and long-term effects on the mission and finances of the presbytery.

Presbytery examined and voted to accept transfer of Rev. Seongjin Ryu from the Korean Presbyterian Church Abroad to the PCUSA. Rev. Ryu will be pastoring Fairbanks Korean Presbyterian Church.

Presbytery examined and voted to accept Jill Jefson as a Commissioned Lay Pastor for Jewel Lake Parish. She was commissioned during the closing worship service.

The Presbytery of Yukon remains a vital body of the Church even with many challenges, successes, and uncertainties. Please continue to pray for each congregation, their leadership, and the leadership of the presbytery as we all continue to seek God's leading and vision for our mission together as the Body of Christ.

Session members welcomed Kieran Kauffman and examined him for membership. After examination, Kieran was excused from the room. It was moved and seconded to **approve Kieran Kauffman for membership.** Motion was **APPROVED** by a vote of 7 to 0. Pastor Erika will work with Kieran to schedule an appropriate date for him to join the church by reaffirmation of faith.

**Scripture and Devotion** — Matthew Bierer presented a devotion on Proverbs 17:5 & Philippians 12:3-4. It was moved and seconded to **approve the Consent Agenda, consisting of the following**

Motion was **APPROVED** by a vote of 7:0.

## Order of the Day (7 p.m.)

Deacons' report. Sarah gave the deacons' report. Deacons were thanked for their good work and service.

Comments from the Congregation were noted and discussed.

Clerk's Report. In addition to the written report, Doreen noted that the Presbytery of Yukon is working to secure a grant from Presbyterian Disaster Assistance to provide money to the Alaska Community Foundation to help people affected by Typhoon Halong.

#### **New Business:**

Further discussion of committee reports (if not already on the docket, below):

**Co-Moderators' visit to Fairbanks**. Marji reported on the visit by the Co-Moderators of the Presbyterian Church (PCUSA) to Fairbanks and UCPC. Their visit on October 8 to each of the 3 PCUSA churches in the borough were well attended by those congregations. The co-moderators were impressed by how much these 3 small churches do and enjoyed the Morris Thompson Visitors' Center.

**Pastor's Report**. Session members noted with concern for the Pastor's health that she worked 45 hours last week (her contract is for 25 hours/week) and urged her to compensate for the extra time by working less in the next weeks. The **Personnel Committee** was asked to work with Pastor Erika on discerning sick and vacation days versus days/hours of extra time worked to compensate for those days off.

Roger is gathering the **Nominating Committee** members to find a date to meet. They will be looking to fill 2 or 3 Elder positions and 3 Deacon positions, as well as a Pastor Nominating Committee.

It was moved and seconded to send the Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) designated giving line item of approximately \$2,000 directly to the Alaska Community Foundation to help people on the West Coast of Alaska affected by Typhoon Halong. After discussion, the motion was APPROVED by a vote of 7:0. This will skip the PDA middle-man.

Motion from Finance Committee to **adopt the 2026 Spending Plan.** After discussion, the motion was **AP-PROVED** by a vote of 7:0.

Motion from Finance Committee to require tenants to maintain liability and property damage insurance, per UCPC's insurance company's requirements. The 12-step programs can be exempted from the proposed new regulations because they can be considered part of UCPC's mission. Otherwise, the following paragraph is proposed to substitute for the current section on our tenants liability requirement.

Tenant shall obtain and maintain comprehensive liability for abuse or misconduct and damage to property and/or excess liability insurance in amounts not less than ONE MILLION DOLLARS (\$1,000,000), per occurrence and in the aggregate annually, together with such other coverage, deductibles, and endorsements acceptable to University Community Presbyterian Church. Tenant will provide a certificate of insurance to University Community Presbyterian Church prior to commencement of the term showing University Community Presbyterian Church as well as Presbytery of Yukon are named as additional insureds, waiving all rights of subrogation\* against University Community Presbyterian Church, and providing no less than thirty (30) days' notice to Church prior to any amendment or termination of the insurance.

\*Subrogation - the assumption by a 3rd party (such as a 2nd creditor or an insurance company) of another's legal right to collect a debt or damages.

After much discussion it was moved and seconded to **TABLE this motion until answers are secured from the insurance company.** Motion was **APPROVED** 7:0. Roger will find out if the insurance company requires that renters specifically name UCPC in their own insurance policy, ask for more information about 1-time renters, and ask what groups we can consider part of our mission, taking on that insurance risk.

Motion from Finance Committee to rekey our external doors on a certain date and only supply new keys to those tenants who comply with our new conditions on insurance. It was moved and seconded to TABLE this motion until a decision is made regarding renters' insurance. Motion to table was AP-PROVED 7:0

#### **Old Business**

Pastor and People book Matthew and Jim got the book. Paula is still reading.

Office tech issues update. Matthew has been in contact with David Rohwer to learn about drive configuration issues, security issues, and backup measures. The goal is to resolve difficulties with printer connections and software function that seem related to disk space issues. Matthew says David thinks it is sensible to hire a tech support service to assist with software issues. Matthew and David will meet soon to diagnose the issues more specifically and consider solutions.

## Transition News!

Thanks to the mission study design of our transitional consultant, Rev. Heather James, the guidance of the Holy Spirit, and hard work by the congregation, we have reached a major milestone on our journey to discern God's call to UCPC. The Ministry Commission of the Presbytery of Yukon approved UCPC's *Transition Report* and approved UCPC to form a Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) to call an installed pastor.

Why go through this process? The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) recognizes that before calling our next installed pastor, UCPC's congregation and any candidate to be our next installed pastor need to be clear about the value, significance and meaning of UCPC's life as a body of Christ. The process that culminated in the *Transition Report* helped us to do that. The session's hope is that this was a creative, healing, and vitalizing period in the life of UCPC.

Thank you everyone, for your faithful help with this journey by showing up for discernment sessions, wrestling with questions about who we are as a body of Christ, and honestly filling out questionnaires.
