### HISTORY OF ARROW STAMP CO.

Professional Philately, the business of buying, selling, trading, appraising and consigning stamps for collectors, although not a mainstream business, has been around since the first postage stamp was issued by Great Britain in 1840. Here in the U.S.A., the Scott Co., which still prints the sole worldwide reference catalog for American collectors, traces its beginnings back to 1868.

Stamp collecting in the USA was given a huge boost by President Franklyn Delano Roosevelt. As the only philatelist in the history of the Presidency and with his enormous popularity as President, FDR gave a huge boost to the hobby of stamp collecting and to the business prospects of those who decided to pursue professional philately as a full time vocation, like we did. FDR further uplifted the hobby by having the US Post Office print up special stamp issues for collectors and dealers.

Arrow Stamp Co. was founded by my father, John S. Norrington in 1955. He had contracted multiple sclerosis less than a year earlier, and his doctor told him that with an incurable, chronic, debilitating illness like m.s., he was basically unemployable, and since there were no welfare support programs for handicapped people back in those days, the doctor advised him to start his own business, one that was not physically taxing or strenuous.

The stamp business seemed to fit the bill, so to speak. I was the family philatelist (stamp collector), having been an active junior philatelist for more than 5 years before we started the business. However my dad, John Norrington, had an extensive knowledge in depth of business. He had earned an MBA from Stanford University Graduate School of Business in 1939 and had worked in numerous job and entrepreneurial situations before he founded the business. My mom had a degree from Stanford where her father was a professor there. The three of us worked in the business from the day we opened our retail shop, July 4th, 1956. You can see copies of our original City of San Francisco Business License and our early sales tax license in the accompanying illustrations..

When our business started up, it seemed like an auspicious time to launch a professional philatelic venture. In San Francisco alone there were from 8 to 10 retail stamp shops. I had patronized many of them as a young junior philatelist before we started our own stamp business. The H.E.Harris Co., at that time the world's largest philatelic firm, had stamp collecting sales sections and displays in all of the F.W. Woolworth "Five and Dime" stores. At that time, Woolworth's was a retail chain with thousands of outlets across the U.S.A. and even in foreign countries.

Also at the time we opened our business in 1956, there was also a chain of stamp and coin departments in numerous department stores throughout the Unite States. The stamp catalog and album producer that owned all these outlets was Jacques Minkus, a refugee from Europe who had who had established a successful philatelic enterprise centered in New York City

We met Mr. Minkus during a business trip my parents and I took to New York back 1958. He was extremely friendly and hospitable, taking us around his enormous stamp and coin department which occupied almost half of the ground floor of Gimbel's which, at that time was the largest retail

department store in New York City. In his affable way, he told us, "Mr. Norrington, in this business, you'll may have a million stamps, but you'll never have a million dollars." Actually he was only half right. We never did have a million dollars but in our 65mn years of existence as a family owned firm, we have bought, sold, traded, appraised and consigned more than 5 million stamps

Meanwhile, our business was 'lifting off' very successfully. In 1957 we put out our first U.S. Stamp price list. It was 50 pages in length, cost 25 cents(deductible with your first \$5 stamp purchase), and listed stamps of the U.S.A. and possessions, the United Nations and Canada. It was small enough to fit in your hip pocket. The prices of stamps in those days, as shown by the illustrations of the pages from our list following the cover page, were rather incredible. A set of famous Graf Zeppelin airmails(Scott # C13-C15) sold for \$107.50 mint (current price \$1600-\$1900). A sound copy of the first U.S. stamp(USA Scott #1) could be had for \$16.75 used( today costing any where from \$200-\$400). A current version of this list as of 2020 is the size of a large heavy magazine, is spiral bound, is 334 pages long and can only be carried comfortably in a small briefcase. Cost of the current edition is \$41.35.

Our success was further reflected in the photos of our store taken in the early 1960s. The handsome dude in the middle is yours truly, flanked on both sides by my mom and dad. We were putting out weekly illustrated lists of new stamps from all over the world. It was possible to do this back then because there were only 55-60 members of the U.N.. However, beginning in 1960, there was a huge surge in U.N. Membership as dozens of new independent nations from Africa and other parts of the globe joined the U.N. Today the U.N. Has in excess of 200 members, all of whom continue to issue stamps!

Also after the founding of our business, my parents continued their activities in philatelic organizations, of which I also was a member, to the extent that the business and their health allowed them to.. Meanwhile I, Denis Norrington, was a student in the public school system of San Francisco (at that time, one of the world's best). After graduating from high school in 1959, I matriculated at San Francisco State University from 1959 to 1964 and 1965 to 1969, earning a B.A. And an M.A. In International Relations. I continued my studies at the Ph.D. Level at U.C. Berkeley from 1968-1974 while serving as a lecturer and instructor at San Francisco State from 1967 to m1973, all the while continuing to work in the family philatelic business, Arrow Stamp Co.. My parents and I both thought that an International Relations major would make an excellent background for our business, as we dealt (and have continued to deal) in stamps of the entire world, every nation, every country. We were absolutely correct, as my studies have helped immensely with regard to my knowledge of stamps and setting up and expanding methods of organizing our inventory of stamps from all over the world.

In 1974 our Business took another turn when we were able to secure a contract with the H.E. Harris organization(after it had been bought by General Mills a year earlier) to assemble and produce a large number of their stamp packets which they were still placing in Woolworth stores. My father had invented an inexpensive face display mounting for packets and the Harris organization decided to let us have the contracts for packet manufacturing after yours truly had written to them with the idea of using my dad's philatelic invention in their stamp packets. Wit the aid of a heat sealer and shrink tunnel machine, we produced more than 100,000 stamp packets for the Harris Co. between 1974 and 1986, while at the same time maintaining and expanding our original line of business: buying, selling, trading, consigning and appraising stamps for thousands of satisfied customers.




