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May is Mental Health Awareness Month Join FCCS in Preventing Youth Suicide

During Mental Health Awareness Month this May, Franklin County Children Services (FCCS) is focusing on preventing youth suicide. According to research conducted by the Ohio Department of Health, in 2020, suicide was the second leading cause of death among Ohioans 10-14 years of age. As youth develop, they face challenges and stressful situations that may lead to mental health crises. Teenagers, especially need the support and guidance of adults to help them recognize and address problems that occur and prevent tragedies.

It's not only important to provide youth with resources for addressing mental health issues, but also limit their access to lethal means when crisis situations arise. The Office of Ohio Attorney General Dave Yost reports that conceal carry firearms licenses issued in Ohio increased 78% in 2020, compared to 2019. Safeguarding firearms as well as medication can help keep youth safe.

FCCS is partnering with Columbus Public Health (CPH) along with Nationwide Children's Hospital to increase awareness and promote limiting access to lethal means. Through their Locks Save Lives campaign, CPH stresses the importance of limiting access to firearms and medication, especially if there are concerns about suicide.
