A Shelter From the Storm

CEC program helps members stay safe during severe weather

As storm season begins in Oklahoma, the best time to prepare is now. At Choctaw Electric Cooperative, we want you to have a safe place to go when bad weather strikes. With our easy and affordable storm shelter program, protecting your family has never been simpler.

Lacey Peters, coordinator of the storm shelter program says CEC has installed 32 shelters over the past year, enabling members to stay safe when the weather turns dangerous.

Members Jim and Charla Bushers had a shelter installed in 2022 right before a November 4 tornado hit Idabel, just south of their home. "It's a good investment to have a secure feeling. We have used it several times," Jim Bushers says.

CEC offers both underground and above-ground shelter options. Un-

derground shelters start at \$3,400 and above-ground safe rooms start at \$4,500. She says above-ground safe rooms are particularly popular with older members, who appreciate how easy it is to safely access the shelter.

CEC's loan program offers members an opportunity to finance a shelter through manageable monthly payments. Peters notes that the shelter install process takes about a month, sometimes longer, and encourages members to call as soon as possible. The program is available year-round, making it possible to get started at any time.

"The beauty of being a member-owned electric cooperative is we genuinely care about our members and look for programs that have a direct positive impact on them," CEO Kooney Duncan says. "We've seen first-hand experience of members whose lives were saved as a result of our shelter program."

Generator Safety

Help protect our linemen with these generator tips:

- Make sure your generator is installed safely. Improperly installed generators can create backfeed, which is dangerous to our crews and the community.
- Please let us know if you purchase a generator that you plan to connect to an electric panel.
- Before using the generator, disconnect the normal source of power coming into your home or business.
- Never plug a generator into a wall outlet or operate a generator indoors.

Disclaimer: Safety requirements may differ based on the type of generator you purchase. Thoroughly read the operator's manual and know how to shut off the generator quickly.

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Ready to Respond

Employees rise to the occasion when spring storms strike

With April upon us, we've already experienced a preview of storm season. On March 4, a powerful storm system swept across our service territory, bringing high winds and heavy rain that caused significant damage to our electric system. At the peak of the storm, approximately 3,700 members were without power, and we faced 38 broken poles.

Despite the widespread damage, our team at Choctaw Electric Cooperative sprang into action. Our linemen worked tirelessly to assess damage, while contractors assisted in replacing broken poles. Thanks to their dedication and teamwork, we were able to restore power to the majority of members within 24 hours, with all power fully restored within 36 hours. This was our most significant outage event in the past year, affecting our entire service area, and our team met the challenge head-on.

Our call center also played a critical role, handling nearly 800 calls with an average wait time of just 12 seconds. In the midst of fast-moving events, we

know that no response is perfect, but our team managed the chaos to the best of their ability, ensuring members received updates and assistance when they needed it most.

Throughout the event, CEC CEO Kooney Duncan and Board President Brent Franks will offer commentary, emphasizing the importance of electrical safety in our daily lives. In addition to the live demonstration, attendees can participate in a community blood drive, open to the public. First United of Hugo will be sponsoring lunch for all participants and attendees.

Turn Suds into Savings

Lower your energy use in the laundry room by washing clothes in cold water whenever possible, as heating water accounts for most of the energy used in a laundry cycle. Wash full loads to make the most of energy savings, and use high-efficiency detergent designed for cold washes. For drying cycles, clean the lint filter before each load to improve airflow and use dryer balls to reduce drying time.

10. They power our lives and our communities!




Chocolate Mousse Trifle

Ingredients

- 1 box brownie mix
- 16 ounces heavy whipping cream
- 1/4 cup granulated sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 3.9-ounce box instant chocolate pudding mix
- 1/2 cup water
- 14-ounce can sweetened condensed milk

Instructions: Prepare brownies according to package directions. Cool completely and cut into 1-inch squares. Whip heavy cream with sugar and vanilla until stiff peaks form. In a large bowl, combine pudding mix, water and sweetened condensed milk. Fold in half of the whipped cream. In a trifle dish, make a layer of brownies. Spread 1/3 of the chocolate mixture on top, and then 1/3 of the whipped cream. Repeat layers. Top with shaved chocolate. Chill overnight.
