## A Glimpse into the History of Old Hochatown

For John Punneo, old Hochatown isn't a page from history books—it was a place filled with memories of a life built on hard work, resilience and change. Born and raised in the original town of Hochatown—now submerged beneath Broken Bow Lake—John's family lived there until 1963, when the government bought their land.

"People see new Hochatown and think it was always like that," John says, "but what you see now is nothing like the old days." He describes the Hochatown where he grew up as a small, close-knit community. The town had a two-room school, a post office with a store and a church. Flooding was a constant challenge. Every spring, floodwaters washed away crops and cut off access to town.

Life in Hochatown revolved around farming. John's family farmed 40 acres—which his father purchased for \$500—and they raised cattle, hogs, horses and goats. As a child, he had to milk cows before school. Rather than modern farm equipment, his family used a team of horses as they farmed corn and hay, baling it by hand. His father also worked at a sawmill, making about \$40 a week.

John recalls when electricity first came to his

family's farm in the mid-1950s. He was a boy when the poles were set, first by machine and then by hand when the equipment broke. Though their setup was basic—a single pull-string light and a fuse box—he says it was a vast improvement over kerosene lamps. The family's electricity bill was never over \$4.

John remembers nights spent on horseback, protecting their crops from raccoons—which became food for the family. Hunting was a necessity, but deer were scarce in those days. His family also made bootleg "wildcat whiskey," which sold for \$4 per half gallon.

In 1969, the lake filled, permanently changing the landscape. The church, store and cemetery were relocated.

Now 74, John reflects on the demanding life of old Hochatown. "Most people can't imagine what it was really like," he says. "It was pretty hard at times—all work and no play."

Today, Hochatown is a fast-growing tourist destination, a contrast to the quiet farming town John once knew. Since 2010, Choctaw Electric Cooperative has installed 2,600 meters and 198 miles of line in the Hochatown area, serving approximately 3,000 cabins.

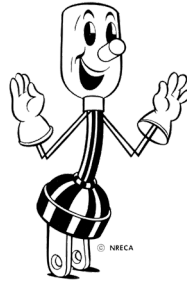

A well-maintained cooling system can save energy, help you avoid costly emergency repairs, and keep your home comfortable all summer long.

## Beware of Utility Scams

Be cautious of fraudulent websites pretending to be Choctaw Electric Cooperative. Scammers can create look-alike sites to steal your information. Always type our official web address directly into your browser instead of clicking email or text links. Watch for signs of a secure website, such as "https://" in the address bar and a padlock icon. If you're ever unsure, call CEC using our official phone number, listed on your bill, to verify payment or account details. Stay vigilant to protect yourself from utility fraud.

## Do you rely on life support?

If you rely on electricity to power life support equipment, it's time to update your records with Choctaw Electric Cooperative. CEC maintains a record of our life-support-dependent members so the co-op can notify you of scheduled outages in your area. To protect your health and safety, we ask members to submit a life support member form by March 31 each year.

## Remembering Norvin Roy Graham III: A Life of Dedication and Brotherhood

The Choctaw Electric Cooperative family is mourning the loss of Norvin Roy Graham III, who died on Dec. 29, 2024, at the age of 42.

Born on November 9, 1982, in Idabel, Oklahoma, to Norvin Roy Graham Jr. and Teresa Ann (Presley) Graham, Norvin grew up in Garvin, where he attended school through eighth grade. He graduated from Valliant High School in 2001. It was there that he met Ashlee Stuart, whom he married on December 3, 2005.

Norvin and Ashlee had three children, Kasen, Kyleigh and Kynzleigh. Together, they built a home and family, rooted in faith. "He loved spending time with his family and aggravating them every chance he got," his obituary reads. "Above all else, Norvin was a child of God."

For the past 15 years, Norvin worked as a lineman at Choctaw Electric Cooperative. His colleagues remember him as someone they could always count on, whether it was during routine tasks or storm restoration efforts.

Ryan Bryant, a longtime friend and co-

worker, describes Norvin as more than a colleague. "He was someone I could always rely on, no matter the job or the time of day. Norvin was reserved, yet always seemed to bring the crew together through his humor and camaraderie. Looking back, I consider him to be more than a friend and coworker, but think of him as a brother."

Dale Pettyjohn recalls how Norvin never hesitated to answer the call when the cooperative needed him. "No matter the time of night, Norvin always said, 'No problem, I am on the way.' Norvin was very quiet, didn't say a lot but was very dedicated to his job. I will certainly miss his positive attitude and willingness to assist when needed."

Chandy Abney, a dispatcher at CEC, comments on his unwavering work ethic and respect for those around him. "For 15 years, he never complained, always gave 100% and treated everyone with kindness."

Beyond his work, Norvin had a passion for roping and, according to his obituary, he was very proud of his stallion, Two Eyed Duo Glo.

"I not only worked weekend outages with Norvin but also traveled many hours with Norvin's family across the states competing in rodeos," fellow lineman and rodeo companion Kyle Beck says. "He was a very established, competitive horseman but chose to always have his kids be the performers. I will miss the rodeo road trips and his involvement with our rodeo family."

Norvin's presence will be missed at Choctaw Electric Cooperative. "You have your family, and then you have your cooperative family," CEO Kooney Duncan says. "We are a close-knit group, and Norvin's loss will be continually felt. He will always be in our thoughts."
