Notice of Patronage Allocation

This Notice of Patronage Allocation is issued in accordance with the Bylaws of Choctaw Electric Cooperative, Inc.

After reviewing the 2024 year-end financial statements, CEC allocated \$5,743,131.06 in excess margins. Margins are calculated each year by subtracting total operating expenses from total operating revenues. These margins are allocated to members' capital accounts first based on their specific revenue classes gross margin and then on their total kWh of electricity purchased from CEC during 2024. This allocated patronage capital is combined with total patronage capital that has not been retired (paid) and provides working capital for the co-op.

Members can determine their amount of this allocation by selecting their Revenue Class and Rate Class (found on their billing statement) allocation factor shown below and multiplying their designated factor by their kWh purchased from CEC in 2024.

The amount of a specific allocation is available from CEC upon member request. Refund of this amount, in full or in part, at any time, shall be based on the decision of the Board of Trustees that the financial condition of the cooperative shall not be impaired by making such refund.

Keeping the Lights On: CEC Operations Update

Choctaw Electric Cooperative continues to make significant progress on key projects across our service territory, ensuring reliable power and maintaining a strong focus on safety.

Line Superintendent Mike Mahaffey reports that a three-phase conversion from the Bethel substation to Hochatown is 70% complete. In addition, crews are working on a 62-lot underground development near the Glover River, and the pole change-out project north of Antlers to Clayton is nearly 80% complete. Maintenance efforts are ongoing at the Garvin substation to keep the system running smoothly.

Operations Supervisor Darin Kirkes says right-of-way crews have worked near the Haworth feeder, clearing both

primary and secondary lines. Other ongoing efforts include work at the Garvin and Darwin substations and the completion of herbicide treatments along more than 900 miles of line.

Safety remains a top priority at CEC. Operations Manager and Safety and Loss Control Director Guy Dale notes that the co-op has gone without a lost-time accident since November 2019.

“We’re trying to keep everyone thinking about safety and prevent complacency,” he says.

To maintain this record, crews participate in ongoing training such as forklift operation and stick testing. The Safety Review Committee continues to evaluate policies and procedures

to enhance workplace safety. Recent improvements include replacing AEDs and updating a fire alarm system that had been in service for 45 years.

Looking ahead, Distribution Engineer Jake Johnson notes coordination with ODOT for a road project on Highway 37 southwest of Idabel. CEC is relocating power lines to accommodate new road shoulders. Crews are also conducting a large-scale pole inspection program in the Garvin and Haworth service areas, covering approximately 13,500 poles.

Through these projects, CEC continues to demonstrate our commitment to providing safe, reliable power while supporting the communities we serve.

Cooperative Crumbs

Sweet Potato Cake with Spiced Cream Cheese Icing

Yields 1 Cake | Recipe from the kitchen of Marcia DaVee, Soper, OK

For the cake:

- 2 cups granulated sugar
- 1 cup salted butter
- 3 room-temperature eggs
- 1 tablespoon vanilla extract
- 2 1/2 cups cooked, mashed sweet potatoes
- 2 1/2 cups White Lily all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 tablespoon ground cinnamon
- 1 tablespoon ground ginger
- 1 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup room-temperature whole buttermilk
- 1 cup pecans, chopped into large pieces

For the frosting:

- 16 ounces cream cheese, softened
- 1/2 cup room-temperature salted butter
- 1/2 cup firmly packed light brown sugar
- 1/2 cup powdered sugar
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

Preheat the oven to 350°F. Grease and flour two 9-inch cake pans, then line the bottoms with parchment paper.

In the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with the paddle attachment, beat the butter and sugar on medium speed for about 5 minutes, until light and creamy. Add the eggs one at a time, mixing well after each addition. Add the vanilla extract and sweet potatoes and mix until fully incorporated.

In a medium bowl, whisk together the flour, baking soda, baking powder, cinnamon, ginger, nutmeg and salt. With the mixer on low speed, add half of the dry mixture to the butter mixture and mix just until combined. Pour in half of the buttermilk and mix again. Repeat with the remaining dry ingredients and buttermilk, mixing only until incorporated. Remove from the mixer and gently fold in the pecans.

Divide the batter evenly between the prepared pans. Bake for 35–40 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean. Let the cakes cool in the pans for 15 minutes, then carefully remove



and transfer to a wire rack to cool completely.

While the cakes cool, prepare the frosting. In the bowl of a stand mixer, beat the cream cheese and butter together on medium-high speed until light and fluffy. Add the remaining ingredients and mix until smooth. If needed, add milk 1 teaspoon at a time to reach desired consistency.

Once the cake layers are completely cool, use a serrated knife to slice each round in half horizontally. Spread frosting between the layers, stacking them as you go, then frost the top and sides of the cake.
