Raising children to be smart about energy is key to reducing energy use, keeping rates affordable, and protecting the environment. Choctaw Electric Cooperative (CEC) hopes to increase energy awareness among elementary, middle school, and high school students by offering free energy education classes.

Four different courses are available. From basic electrical safety to understanding alternative energy, each class is designed to make learning about energy fun. CEC staff provide hands-on instruction, plus course materials. Courses are customized to fit your classroom needs.

■ DANGER RANGER

CEC's Danger Ranger curriculum teaches elementary school students why electrical safety is important and how they can stay safe in their home and neighborhood. Videos, games, and other interactive tools keep students entertained and interested.

■ GET POWERED!

Where does electricity come from? How is it delivered to our homes and businesses? Get Powered helps students understand the complex process of power generation and delivery and distribution.

■ WHAT'S UP WITH GREEN?

■ GO ECO!

For middle school or high school students, Go Eco reveals the difference between kinetic and mechanical energy and how alternative energy

resources use both to create electricity. A variety of hands-on tools help students understand how electricity is generated, transmitted and delivered. Students also learn about nuclear and bio-mass power. ↗

In fact, that service-oriented mentality is a hallmark characteristic. The job requires linemen to set aside personal priorities, often at a moment's notice, to serve Choctaw Electric members.

Equally important is their support system at home. A lineworker's family understands and supports their loved one's commitment to the greater community during severe storms and power outages.

Help CEC Save Trees—And Money By Choosing Paperless Billing

Every month your electric cooperative spends a significant amount of money mailing thousands of pieces of mail. Member electric bills make up the bulk of this expense.

You can help your co-op pare down its administrative costs by shifting to paperless billing. When you choose CEC's paperless billing option, you will continue to receive monthly statements via email. How you choose to pay is up to you.

Your electronic statement will include a link to CEC's SmartHub where you can make a quick online payment. Or, you can choose from any of CEC's preferred payment methods and payment plans:

- **Budget Billing.** With this option your energy usage is averaged over 12 months, helping you avoid seasonal high bills.
- **Automatic Payment Plan.** Payments are automatically withdrawn from your checking, savings, or credit card account.



Choose paperless billing by **April 30** and receive a **\$5** bill credit. To go paperless, please call your co-op at **800-780-6486**, or sign up through SmartHub.

- **Pay-By-Phone.** Pay using Visa, Discover, American Express, or Mastercard by calling **800-780-6486**. Remember to have your account number handy when you call.
- **Payment locations.** Use the payment drop box at CEC locations in Hugo, Idabel and Antlers, or use a PaySite kiosk located near you. *For a list of PaySite locations, please see page 4.*

Energy DETECTIVE

Often the homes I visit are older and have little to no insulation. I also see new homes with little to low R-value insulation or the insulation is incorrectly installed and slips down the wall leaving no protection.

When building or remodeling a home, make sure you add the correct amount of insulation. Without it, your home will use more energy than necessary, especially in the winter and summer. There are different types of insulation available, including spray foam, rolled fiberglass and cellulose. Get the right type for your project, and remember that insulation is only as good as the seal of your home.

RECIPES



Too Much Chocolate Cake

INGREDIENTS

- 1 (18.25 oz) package devil's food cake mix
- 1 (5.9 oz) package instant chocolate pudding mix
- 1 cup sour cream
- 1 cup vegetable oil
- 4 eggs
- 1/2 cup warm water
- 2 cups semisweet chocolate chips

DIRECTIONS

Preheat oven to 350° F. In a large bowl, mix together the cake and pudding mixes, sour cream, oil, beaten eggs and water. Stir in chocolate chips and pour batter into a well greased 12-cup bundt pan.

Bake for 50 to 55 minutes, or until top is springy to the touch and a wooden toothpick inserted comes out clean. Cool cake in pan at least an hour and a half before inverting onto a plate. Dust cake with powdered sugar.
