

CEC's sound financial condition has allowed the co-op to consistently return capital credits to our members for the past four years. This money stays at home where it benefits our members and the local economy.

Choctaw Electric Cooperative (CEC) is more than a utility; we are an essential part of our local communities. Co-op power, co-op people, and the co-op commitment to community make that happen. Thank you for the privilege of serving you.





MEETING MINUTES

The following minutes provide details of the Choctaw **Electric Cooperative, Inc. Annual Meeting Of The Members** held September 26, 2020 at the Larry Brinkley Event Center, Idabel, Okla.

■ CALL TO ORDER

President Brent Franks called the 80th Annual Meeting of Choctaw Electric Cooperative to order at 10:00 am. Upon call from President Franks, the members stood for the Pledge of Allegiance and Invocation. Members remained standing for the National Anthem, sang by Kaelin Clay, Senior at Idabel High School and one of the 2020 Youth Tour Winners.

Mr. Franks, representing District G introduced himself and the Choctaw Electric Trustees:

Stacy Nichols, Vice-President, District C Mike Brewer, Secretary-Treasurer, District H Bill Woolsey, District D Perry Thompson Jr., District E Debbie Cody, District F Ken Autry, District I

Mr. Franks introduced the CEO and General Manager Kooney Duncan, and Council for the Cooperative J. Frank Wolf.

George Burns, former Choctaw Electric Trustee was also acknowledged.

■ DECLARATION OF QUORUM

Mr. Brewer reported the bylaws stipulate that five percent of the cooperatives' membership is required for a quorum to conduct business at the annual meeting. Mr. Brewer announced the total number of members registered has exceeded 691 required. Therefor a quorum had been reached and the business meeting could proceed.

■ PROOF OF MAILING

Mr. Brewer reported that the Notice of Member Meeting was mailed to each CEC member in accordance with the bylaws. The receipt from the post office in O'Fallon, Missouri verifies that 13,900 pieces of mail containing the Official Notice were delivered to the U.S. Post Office and mailed on September 9, 2020

■ MINUTES OF 2019 ANNUAL MEETING

President Franks reported that the minutes of the business meeting conducted during the 2019 annual meeting were published in the September 2020 Annual Report issue of "Inside Your Coop" newsletter. President Franks received a motion from CEC member Jackie Miller to approve the 2019 Annual Meeting minutes as printed in the Annual Report. The motion received a second by CEC member Robert Moffatt. The motion carried.

■ FINANCIAL REPORT

Mr. Brewer presented the audited financial summary of the cooperative. During 2019, CEC Net Operating Income in 2019 totaled \$5,372,221 compared to \$4,354,828 in 2019. CEC assets have grown by \$2,009,476 over 2019. At the end of 2019, total assets were \$122,205,463 compared to \$120,195,987 in 2018. That amount reflects mostly poles, wires, transformers, meters, buildings, trucks and equipment to provide electric service. CEC long-term debt decreased another \$3,254,571 in 2019.

Mr. Brewer concluded his report by telling the crowd the financial summary confirms Choctaw Electric is in excellent financial condition. He also indicated he would be available to answer questions after the meeting concerning the financial report.

■ PRESIDENT'S REPORT

President Franks gave his annual report. Eighty years ago, Choctaw Electric Cooperative made it possible for southeast Oklahoma to have a connection with the rest of the world. Through electrification Choctaw Electric provided hope, opportunity and support of the local rural economy.

President Franks highlighted CEC programs available to members. He also reported on the Forest Heritage Center partnership lighting project. CEC partnered with Kiamichi Technology Center, state park officials and Western Farmers Electric Cooperative to replace aging light fixtures with new energy efficient lighting.

Your electric coop is financially stable and healthy for the next generation. CEC leads the way in economic growth in southeast Oklahoma.

■ CEO'S REPORT

Mr. Duncan welcomed members to the 80th Annual Meeting, those who were in the audience and those listening via radio in their vehicles.

CEC has faced its share of challenges, but its longevity suggests smart decision have been made along the way. The journey began in 1941 when the first section of line was built at a cost of \$149,000 and serving 250 members. Today CEC serves six counties, 3,637 miles of line 19,467 meters and we continue to grow.

In 2019 CEC cleared over 535 miles of right-of-way. By the end of 2020 approximately 2,200 miles of line cleared since 2017. Right of way maintenance is one of the most important responsibilities and one of the biggest expenses at a yearly cost of approximately \$2 million dollars.

Choctaw Electric and your board of trustees are being efficient with your money. We have paid down approximately \$25 million in debt since 2014, while growing our assets over \$2 million dollars from 2018. CEC has paid to our members over \$5.5 million in capital credits since 2016 and we have not increased our price for electricity.

Safety is CEC's number one priority. Staff works approximately 130,000 hours and drives over 720,000 miles each year. In 2020, CEC has not had any recordable or lost time accidents.

CEC has made a lot of contributions to this area and members should feel proud of how far the co-op has come and confident in where we are going.

At the conclusion of Mr. Duncan's report, two former board members who resigned board seats this year were recognized; George Burns and Joe Silk. Plagues were presented to Mr. Burns, and Mr. Silk, in acknowledgement of their commitment and challenging work as a CEC board of trustee. Mr. Silk was not present to receive his plaque.

Mr. Duncan also informed the membership of the CEC Member Advisory Committee that was formed and identified each member and the district they represented.

■ KEYNOTE SPEAKER

President Franks introduced Sid Sperry, Director of Public Relations, Communications and Research for the Oklahoma Association of Electric Cooperatives and publisher of Oklahoma Living Magazine.

Mr. Sperry gave some historical background of electric cooperatives and why they were formed. He spoke about some of the challenges electric cooperatives faced during World War II. The oldest electric cooperative in Oklahoma was formed in 1936, Cimarron Electric Cooperative located in Kingfisher Oklahoma.

He has seen tremendous changes in the 40 years he has been part of electric coops and working in a variety positions throughout the years. Choctaw Electric is important to the areas we serve by being community minded and active in local communities, schools and towns. Choctaw Electric is forward minded and looking to the future.

In conclusion Mr. Sperry spoke about mutual Aid and cooperation among coperatives. Cooperatives provide help to sister co-ops and aid during a major weather event.

There were 65 Oklahoma lineman and 850 linemen throughout the United States that went to Louisiana after Hurricane Laura. He acknowledged the 5 CEC lineman who helped restore power after the hurricane; Derek Baker, Jeremy Billingsley, Joseph Antu, Jeff Rector, and Destin Moore.

Before the announcement of election results President Franks and Mr. Duncan made a few remarks concerning adjustment made to the annual meeting due to the pandemic.

■ ANNOUNCEMENT OF ELECTION RESULTS

Frank Wolf, co-op attorney announced the Bylaw Amendments and Board of Trustee Election results.






