

CEC board takes member requests to heart: Storm shelter loans are back!

Safety concerns, strong finances and the listening ears of nine Choctaw Electric Cooperative (CEC) trustees resulted in a unanimous vote to restore the co-op's storm shelter loan program. The board approved the decision at their monthly meeting in January.

"Both trustees and staff members have heard from a number of members who say they would like to see the program restored," said Kooney Duncan, CEO of CEC.

The storm shelter program makes loans available to qualifying CEC members who wish to purchase an in-ground storm

shelter. The loans pay for the cost of the storm shelter, installation and delivery. To keep loan payments low and affordable, financing is available for up to five years. Loan payments will appear on your monthly electric bill.

The storm shelter offered through the program is a manufactured concrete, in-ground model with a slope front. Options include an easy entry style with taller doors and less steep steps, or the standard unit. The shelter comes in two sizes: 6 feet by 8 feet, and 6 feet ten inches by 10 feet. Prices start at \$2,500.

CEC created the program in 2002 to make it more affordable for co-op members of all income levels to enjoy a safe haven from tornadoes.

Good Reasons To Crow

Study shows CEC in great financial shape

f you keep up with your co-op, you know we've been crowing about the notable uptick in CEC's financial health. Skepticism abounds, however, and the Doubting Thomases among us may wonder if things are genuinely rosy, or are we guilty of looking through tinted glasses?

I'm happy to report that we are not,

and the proof lies in an indepth cost of service study conducted by C.H. Guernsey and Co. The Oklahomabased company specializes in providing accurate and sometimes painful financial assessments for electric utilities across the country. When Guernsey

consultants get to work, they reveal the good, the bad, and the ugly so the utility can make adjustments to ensure it remains in business. If a co-op needs to raise rates, borrow money, reduce expenses, or alter its rate structure to ensure all rate classes bear their fair share of operating expenses, this study will shine a light on it.

I think of it as a business road map. It examines all the details that could affect CEC's progress—system growth, income and expenses, long term debt, load factor, power costs, rates and more. Basically, all the factors that influence CEC's ability to meet, and hopefully exceed, our members' expectations. Through the Guernsey lens, we see our

financial situation in hard focus—no Glamour Shots. The information allows us to examine our goals, determine if they are attainable, and weigh the possible impact of these decisions.

Granted, the cost of service study isn't a magical glass ball. It can't predict devastating storms, global events that affect energy prices, or even the wisdom

Co-op Member Learns Added Insulation Pays Offi

Several months ago, I visited a member who needed ideas on how they could lower their electric use in their home. After an inspection, I found they only had about four to six inches of insulation in their attic. I suggested they add 12 to 14 inches of insulation to increase the R-value. The member agreed and added the extra insulation. Later, we compared their monthly usage, as well as the outside temperatures, to their home's usage before they added more insulation. A notable reduction! They used fewer kilowatt-hours (kwh) with temperatures in the 20s than they did with temps in the 40s.

Their wise decision paid off by lowering their kwh usage and extending the life of their HVAC unit. A happy ending!

How Long Until My Power Comes Back On?

Check CEC's online outage map to watch the restoration process in real time

uring a power outage, the first thing members want to know is when their power will be restored. In the midst of a major outage, that question is impossible for any electric utility to answer with certainty. But by using Choctaw Electric Cooperative's online outage map, members can easily track the restoration process in real time and get a better idea of when their power will come back on.

The map allows members to view regions by zip code or county, see the number of outages in that area, and the percentage of members affected.

Color-coded icons help members to determine the severity of an outage. For example, a red circle indicates a major outage affecting more than 500 members. As outages are restored, the colored icons change, indicating that progress is being made.

Choctaw Electric's Online Outage Map Colored dots indicate the number of accounts out of power. 0 Look up your area by zip code or county to 2-10 check the number of outages and the 11-50 percent of accounts 51-100 out of power. 101-500 501+ Check it out at www.choctawelectric.coop.

GENERATORafety

FOLLOW THESE TIPS TO ENSURE EVERYONE'S SAFETY:

- Make sure there is **nothing plugged into the generator when turning it on.** Use a **heavy-duty** extension cord to connect appliances to the outlets on the generator.
- Always operate the generator on a stable, dry surface **outside the home**—and well away from garage, doors, windows, and vents leading into your home. Generators produce **deadly** carbon monoxide.
- **Never** connect your portable generator to the home directly. This **can result in potentially deadly backfeed**, which happens when electricity is fed back through the electrical system onto power lines, creating a serious hazard for line workers and others.
