Kid's Camp Grows In Popularity

Summer 2019 enjoys highest student enrollment in camp history

The rainy weather did not dampen the enthusiasm for Choctaw Electric's (CEC) Kilowatt Kid's Camp. The half-day camp took place at Choctaw Electric locations in Hugo and Idabel in June. Organizers say the camp this summer enjoyed the highest enrollment since its inaugural year in 2010.

"The maximum number of campers we can accommodate per session is 30,"

says Jia Johnson, camp coordinator. "We were disappointed that we had to turn some campers away this year, but we had a limited supply of classroom materials and snacks."

The wet weather may have played a role in the spike in 2019 camp applications.

"Kids need something fun to do when they can't get outside and play," Johnson added. "We also expanded

our enrollment this year to include an afternoon session for older kids."

Kilowatt Kid's Camp now offers a session for fourth through sixth grade students, in addition to its usual half-day camp for kindergarten through third graders. The camp uses hands-on activities and games to teach kids about electricity, and stresses good energy use habits and electrical safety. ☺

CEC board approves capital credit return to members

After a damp and gloomy spring, I'm happy to pass along some positive news: Choctaw Electric closed out 2018 in the green. By that I mean we were able to provide safe and reliable service to our members, take care of expected and unexpected expenses, and still have money left over.

Because of our profit margin and overall improved financial health, the Choctaw Electric board of trustees approved a capital credit retirement of \$913,218.20 to members belonging to the co-op in 1989. If that's you, you should expect to receive your refund sometime in September. The amount of your refund is determined by your electricity use during the 1989 year.

Living By Our Principles

Electric co-op's honor seven important cooperative principles. No. 3 is **Member Economic Participation**. Members contribute to, and democratically control, the capital of their cooperative. At least part of that capital remains the common property of the cooperative. Members allocate surpluses for any or all of the following purposes: developing the cooperative; setting up reserves; benefiting members in proportion to their transactions with the cooperative (capital credits); and supporting other activities approved by the membership. These decisions are typically made by the co-op trustees, who are elected by the members.

Over the past three years, Choctaw Electric has retired nearly \$3 million in capital credits and estate capital credits to co-op members. Because an electric co-op's annual margins fund nearly everything we do in the business of delivering electricity—not to mention serving as an important rainy day fund—the decision to retire these margins isn't made willy nilly. Your trustees must carefully evaluate the co-op's financial condition while weighing all the "what ifs" that may or may not occur in the future. Their approval to release these funds is a vote of confidence in Choctaw Electric's financial and operational stability. I think that's something we should all feel proud of.

For the past several years, Choctaw Electric has made enormous strides by shaving costs and paying down debt. At the same time, we've invested a great deal of time, labor, and money into system upgrades and maintenance to improve the safety and reliability of our service. Delivering electricity to rural areas isn't easy or inexpensive, but we're doing it and we're doing it well. The proof is the financial capital we share with you. Thank you for your support. ☺

At CEC we have the ability to view hourly usage, which helps us better evaluate a home when the usage seems too high or too low. Last month, a member called to say their central heat and air was off, and they used window units, but their bill seemed high. By checking their hourly usage, I could tell something else was running. When I got to the home, I found the fan to the HVAC unit was on and blowing warm air. This caused the window AC units, which are thermostat controlled, to run more often. When we shut off the HVAC fan, the usage dropped drastically. If your HVAC or window AC seems to be running longer than normal, or sounds differently, be sure to have it serviced as soon as possible. If not, you could end up paying for electricity you never intended to use.

FIREWORKS SAFETY TIPS

Fireworks and July 4th go hand-in-hand, and we want you to have a safe, fun-filled celebration! About two-thirds of all fireworks-related injuries occur between June 16 and July 16, so keep these safety tips in mind:

- ★ Leave professional-grade fireworks to the pro's. They aren't safe for consumer use.
- ★ Keep small children a safe distance from fireworks, including sparklers that can burn at temperatures in excess of 2,000 degrees.
- ★ Never reignite or handle malfunctioning fireworks. Keep a bucket of water nearby to soak the duds before throwing them away.
- ★ More pets go missing over July 4th than any other time. Keep your pets indoors and away from fireworks to avoid contact injuries or bad reactions to noise.



RECIPES



Summer Cucumber Pasta Salad

INGREDIENTS

- | | |
|---------------------------------|-----------------------------|
| 1 (8 oz) pkg. bow tie pasta | 1 cup white sugar |
| 1 large cucumber, thinly sliced | 1 cup water |
| 1 large onion, thinly sliced | 1 T vegetable oil |
| 1 1/2 teaspoons dried dill | 1 T prepared mustard |
| 3/4 cup white vinegar | 1/2 tsp salt |
| | 1/2 tsp ground black pepper |

DIRECTIONS

Bring a large pot of lightly salted water to a boil.

Cook the bow tie pasta at a boil, stirring occasionally, until cooked through yet firm to the bite, about 12 minutes. Drain and rinse several times with cold water until the pasta is cool.

Stir pasta, cucumber, onion, and dill in a salad bowl. Whisk vinegar, sugar, water, vegetable oil, mustard, salt, and black pepper in a separate bowl until sugar and salt dissolve. Pour dressing over the pasta mixture and toss lightly to coat. Let chill for 2 hours before serving.
