A Booster Shot

For Local Schools

Electric co-op gross receipts tax provides millions of dollars to rural schools

lectric co-ops are committed to bettering their local communities, so it makes sense they would defend a tax system that provides a direct benefit to schools in their service areas.



The electric cooperative gross receipts tax does just that by pumping millions of dollars into rural schools across Oklahoma. This year, the 26 school districts in and around the Choctaw Electric Cooperative service area will receive more than \$1.4 million in gross receipts funds. Tax dollars are distributed to schools based on the number of miles of co-op power line in each district.

\$1.4 million

CEC and WFEC gross receipts tax collections paid to local schools in 2019. Taxes are distributed based on the number of miles of co-op power line in each school district.

Oklahoma electric co-ops pay a two percent gross receipts tax on revenue at the wholesale and retail level. This tax is paid in lieu of typical ad valorem taxes paid by other utilities. Ninety five percent of gross receipts tax collections go directly to local schools. The remaining five percent is retained by the Oklahoma Tax Commission to cover administrative costs associated with collecting and distributing the money.

On a percentage basis, electric cooperatives and their members contribute more tax dollars to local school districts than other utilities. Co-ops have fought long and hard to retain the gross receipts tax because the money collected stays at home. The school boards in each district decide the best way to use the money based on their school needs.

Some of the steps we've taken in order to keep our employees and members safe include closing our lobbies to prevent the spread of germs. We have separated our line crews from other employees and even from each other to limit possible spread of the virus. New routines are in place for contractors working on our system in order to keep them away from employees. All deliveries are quarantined.

Our management team and board continue to meet to take care of business and discuss further emergency measures. We are in constant contact with the other electric co-ops in Oklahoma and with our statewide association, which in turn is working closely with our national association, the state legislature, the governor's office, and health officials.

So far, it is working well and everyone is adapting to the new norm. That's because we are experienced in handling emergencies, and nothing brings out the best in our employees better than a crisis situation.

At CEC, we continue to focus on doing our part to keep your life as normal as possible through this situation and beyond. The cooperative way has brought us this far, and the cooperative way will help us through it. In the meantime, stay healthy, stay home, and stay safe. ^ty

May Is Electrical Safety Month

Is your home up to codes?

The National Electrical Code us revised **every three years** and outlines the minimum requirements for **safe electrical installations.** Many older homes may not have an adequate electrical system to meet the electrical demands of today. If you're updating your home, **make sure to have the following devices installed** so your home is safe.



Ctudent Name (Drint)

Ground-Fault Circuit Interrupters (GFCI): Available as a circuit breaker and receptacle. GFCIs protect against electric shock and are required in areas where water and electricity may come in contact.

(SPD) protect against surges that can damage or reduce the lifespan of your electrical system and devices.

Arc-Fault Circuit Interrupters (AFCI): Available as a circuit breaker and receptade. AFCIs protect against electrical fires from malfunctions. The Consumer Product Safety Commission estimates that 50% of home electrical fires can be prevented by proper AFCI protection.
