85 Years Strong: Choctaw Electric Cooperative's Annual Meeting Brings Members Together

Choctaw Electric Cooperative members gathered at the Pushmataha County Fairgrounds on Sept. 27 for a morning of community, connection and celebration. With beautiful fall weather and a great turnout, the 85th Annual Meeting was a great success.

With more than 900 attendees on-site and over 1,500 mail-in ballots returned, participation was strong and CEC easily met our quorum early in the day.

Members enjoyed visiting with board directors,

exploring more than 20 local vendor booths and sharing a delicious brisket lunch prepared by Three Rivers Meat Company in Octavia. Youth Ambassador Ella Herron hosted a voter registration table.

CEO Kooney Duncan and Board President Brent Franks provided operational updates, including information about capital credits returns, ongoing projects and future plans for the cooperative. Board Treasurer Perry Thompson Jr. gave the financial report. All incumbent board directors were reelected.

A highlight of the celebration was a special 85th anniversary centerpiece: a large "cake" built from wire spools, topped with a glowing "85." In addition, CEC awarded members more than \$10,000 in prizes and bill credits.

Reflecting on the day's success, CEC Director of Communications Jia Johnson says the cooperative was thrilled by the turnout and positive energy. "We were so pleased with the great crowd and how much everyone enjoyed themselves," she says. "It was a wonderful way to celebrate 85 years together."

- **Outage response:** After reporting an outage, we asked whether the response time met your expectations. This feedback helps us improve our service and response protocols.

• **Overall cooperative experience:** Most of our members were satisfied with the co-op experience, a clear affirmation that the work we do every day is making a difference.

- Scammers exploit your trust in Choctaw Electric Co-op.
- They use pressure and surprise to confuse you.
- When you ask a question, they respond with more pressure.
- They create urgency to prevent you from verifying their claims.

IF YOU SUSPECT A SCAM:

Hang up on the phone call, delete the suspicious email or text message, close the door on the in-person scammer. Call Choctaw Electric Co-op immediately.

Pause Before You Pay: Tips for Avoiding Utility Scams

Scammers are constantly finding new ways to target utility customers—and Choctaw Electric Cooperative members are no exception. Fraudsters may call, text, email or even show up at your door, claiming you owe money and threatening to cut off your electricity unless you pay immediately. Their goal is simple—create panic so you act without thinking. Knowing the signs can protect you and your household.

Common Types of Scams

Some scammers claim your bill is overdue and demand instant payment. Others promise a refund for an overpayment or promise a discount—but to get it, they ask for banking or personal information. Whether in person, by phone, email or text, these attempts all aim to trick you into handing over money or sensitive details.

How to Protect Yourself

- **Guard personal information.** Never share or confirm details like your date of birth, account number or banking information with anyone who contacts you unexpectedly.
- **Pause before acting.** If someone pressures you to pay immediately, hang up, close the door or delete the message. Then contact CEC directly using the number on your bill to confirm your account status.

Stay Alert, Stay Safe

Choctaw Electric Cooperative will never contact you to ask for immediate payment or offer a discount by phone. If you receive a suspicious call and are uncertain, please call our office at (800) 780-6486. By staying vigilant and reporting suspicious activity, you can protect yourself from scams.

With the holiday season approaching and more time spent in the kitchen, consider ways to save energy in the heart of your home. When possible, cook meals with smaller, energy efficient appliances, such as toaster ovens, slow cookers and air fryers. When using the range, match the size of the pan to the heating element. The day also included CEC’s 5th Annual Chili Cookoff at lunch, where the competition was as hot as the chili! Congratulations to Chandy Abney, who took home 1st place with her Smackin’ Sally chili, and Brad Kendrick, who earned 2nd place with his Razorback Brew chili.

Chandy says, “My chili is my own rec-

ipe that I came up with and stuck with because it’s a favorite of many. Having our chili cookoff every year is really fun for us all.”

“When I was 23, my mom taught me her recipe, and I’ve added a few ingredients over the years to make it mine,” Brad says. “While it’s not 100% the same each time, I know the ingredients by heart and start adding a dash of this and a pinch of that—always including my two secret ingredients.”

Safety is at the heart of everything we do as a co-op, and training events like this show that learning to stay safe can be both engaging and fun.



Easy Weeknight Chili

Serves 4-6

Ingredients

- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 small onion, diced
- 2-3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 green pepper, diced
- 2 tablespoons chili powder
- 2 tablespoons cumin
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano
- 1 pound ground beef
- 15-ounce can crushed tomatoes
- 15-ounce can fire-roasted diced tomatoes
- 15-ounce can chili-ready beans
- 1 cup low-sodium beef broth, as needed (optional)

Instructions

Add the oil to a large pot, along with the onions, garlic and peppers. Cook over medium-low heat for 5 minutes, or until tender. Add the chili powder, cumin and oregano and cook for 1 minute. Increase heat to medium, add the beef and salt. Cook, breaking up the beef, until it’s browned. Stir in the tomatoes, beans and broth, as needed. Bring to a boil, reduce heat and simmer for 15-20 minutes.
