

Message from the Coordinator

January to June was filled with exciting activities, from bracelet making and crafting to outdoor games, soccer and sports. The children especially loved unleashing their creativity through various craft projects and spending time outside, as well as engaging in make-believe adventures and playing bingo every other Friday! During the winter months, the kids liked to sit down and watch a movie too. Special highlights included bowling outings, visits to the park, and an informative walk safety- presentation by an RCMP officer. Science Day, where we made slime, was a fan favourite as well as Dog Day, where I brought my puppy for all the kids to pet and play. We did Birthday Day monthly, where we would go to the United Church and have cupcakes and iced tea or hot chocolate. Regular fire drills ensured everyone's safety, adding a touch of responsibility to our fun-filled days. We also did monthly safety Jeopardy games, including fire safety, water safety, walking safety and home alone safety.

Overall, January to June was very busy and lots of fun.

From September to December, the youth centre experienced a period of steady engagement and positive growth as the youth transitioned back into school routines and fall programming. Our focus during this time was on providing a safe, welcoming space that supported social connections, personal development, and emotional well-being.

Throughout the fall, youth participated in a variety of programs, including open drop-ins, structured recreational activities, creative activities, and book clubs at the Library. Seasonal events and theme nights encouraged a steady and consistent attendance and allowed youth to build strong peer connections.

Engagement remained strong. With many returning participants and new youth joining the centre. Youth demonstrated increased comfort in group settings, improved conflict resolution skills and leadership roles.

Challenges during this period included balancing school demands as the strike happened, and fluctuating numbers as the weather changed; however, programming was adapted to meet the youths' needs through these challenges.

This fall, efforts were directed towards streamlining programming and improving the physical environment of the centre to support youth engagement and participation better.
